# Water supplies

A mains water supply is available in the following parts of the District:—

The Parishes of Horton and Longsdon (parts) and parts of the parish of Endon and Stanley are supplied by the Rural District Council's undertaking which obtains its supply in bulk at Pool End from the Leek Urban District Council's borehole.

The Parishes of Bagnall, Norton-in-the-Moors, and parts of the Parishes of Longsdon, and Endon and Stanley are supplied by the Staffordshire Potteries Water Board.

The Council also maintains small village supplies at Longnor, Grindon and Warslow but both the quantity and quality of these supplies have to be kept under constant supervision.

It is anticipated, now that the first stage of the Eastern Parishes Water Scheme, namely the supply at Ilam, Alstonefield and Wetton is virtually complete, that the second and major portion will soon be under way and thus bring the end of these small village schemes in sight.

One hundred and twenty-one samples of water were taken during the year for Bacteriological examination and thirty three for Chemical Analysis.

#### EASTERN PARISHES WATER SUPPLY, SECTION "A" PART 1

This scheme which was commenced in October, 1954, is now to all intents and purposes complete. All the mains are laid and the large Reservoir at Wetton and the small Reservoir and Pumping Station at Ilam are also finished and it is anticipated that service connections to properties in the three parishes of Ilam, Wetton and Alstonefield will commence early in 1957.

In view of the considerable amount of work that has been met with during the laying of the mains, the progress of the work can be deemed to have been satisfactory.

It is obvious that some difficult rock will be met with when some of the service connections are being carried out.

# Drainage and Sewerage

Work continued on the Light Oaks and Brown Edge (Sytch Road) sewerage scheme during the year.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in the Light Oaks area with considerable quantities of Rock, and resort had to be made to drilling and shot firing on a number of sections.

Some inconvenience to the general public was also occasioned because of the need to close Bagnall Road, Cinder Hill and other roads during the progress of the works.

The New Electric Sewage Pump installed at the Endon Sewage disposal works has brought about some improvement, but these works like those at Baddeley Green and Norton Green are sadly overloaded and not capable of dealing with the large burden imposed upon them. Every endeavour, is of course, being made to cope with the difficult conditions at these works.

# Refuse and Nightsoil Collection and Disposal

The Collection of house refuse and nightsoil was carried out by direct labour in every parish of the Council's area, five modern low-loading type vehicles being employed for this purpose. Three are used primarily for refuse collection, one for nightsoil collection, and one for the dual purpose of refuse and nightsoil collection, the latter two vehicles being fitted with purpose-made tanks for nightsoil carriage.

The several refuse tips were kept in a reasonable order and measures were taken to keep them free from vermin from time to time.
