RUSHTON WATER SUPPLY

The water supply scheme to serve parts of the parishes of Rushton and Heaton was commenced in April of this year. A bulk supply is to be taken from the Leek Urban District Council's borehole at Pool End which will be pumped to a 75,000 gallon storage reservoir at Fair Edge Hill, Heaton. The length of mains to be laid is approximately 10 miles.

BOTTOMHOUSE WATER SUPPLY

This scheme to serve the several small-holdings in the Bottom-house area was commenced in October. The work involved consists of the laying of approximately 1,500 yards of main and a supply is to be taken in bulk from the Cheadle Rural District Council's main.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

No extensions to the public sewers were carried out during the year under review.

CONVERSION OF PRIVIES TO WATER CLOSETS

The Council makes contributions to property owners desirous of converting their toilets into water closets, the contribution being up to half the cost of the work with a maximum of £20. During the year 7 applications were approved, the Council's total contribution for these being £133.

Further to the above under the Improvement Grant conditions, 45 conversions were carried out as part of the improvements.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Refuse and nightsoil is collected from dwellings in every parish of the district by direct labour and tipping is carried out at the various village tips which are levelled and tidied from time to time.

The tip at Stockton Brook is now taking the bulk of the refuse and tipping is carried out without nuisance to the neighbourhood. A full time tip attendant levels and covers all refuse immediately and also keeps the tip rat-free. The site is comparatively dry and there is no smell nuisance. The method of tipping prevents overheating and any fires are quickly brought under control.

During the year 266 visits and inspections in respect of Refuse Collection were made by the Public Health Officers.
