Section "A" Part 2

This, the major section of the Eastern Parishes Water Scheme which was commenced in June, 1959, was virtually completed at the end of this year. The whole scheme when put into complete operation will serve parts of the parishes of Alstonfield, Butterton, Fawfieldhead, Grindon, Hollinsclough, Ilam, Longnor, One-cote, Sheen, Warslow and Elkstones and Wetton. The supply is extracted from the River Manifold at Hulme End where it is treated and pumped to the service reservoirs at Grindon, Newtown, Sheen and Wetton.

The parishes of Alstonfield and Wetton (which have in the past been supplied in bulk from the South Derbyshire Water Board) and Longnor village (which was originally served by a small village scheme) were linked to the Hulme End system during the summer of this year. The village of Ilam continues for the time being to be supplied with water obtained from the South Derbyshire Water Board.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

An extension to the public sewers to serve some 53 properties at Hough Hill, Broad Lane and Hill Top, Brown Edge was commenced in June.

CONVERSION OF PRIVIES TO WATER CLOSETS

The Council makes contributions to property owners desirous of converting their toilets into water closets, the contribution being up to half the cost of the work with a maximum of £20. During the year 6 applications were approved, the Council's total contribution for these being £115.

Further to the above under the Improvement Grant conditions, 36 W.C.s were installed as part of the improvements.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Refuse and nightsoil is collected from dwellings in every parish of the district by direct labour and tipping is carried out at the various village tips which are levelled and tidied from time to time.

The tip at Stockton Brook is still taking the bulk of the refuse at which 2,700 loads (approximately 18,900 cubic yards) were disposed of in 1962.

During the year 324 visits and inspections in respect of Refuse Collection were made by the Public Health Officers.
