

To the Chairman and Members of the Leek Rural District Council

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Annual Report for 1970 has been compiled in accordance with the Department of Health and Social Security Circular 1/71.

The mid-1970 population was estimated by the Registrar General to be 13,500, no change from 1969.

The number of live births was 194, giving a birth rate of 14.4 per thousand of population. This birth rate can be compared with the birth rate for England and Wales as a whole by multiplying the local birth rate by a factor known as the comparability factor which for this district in 1970 was 1.02. The adjusted birth rate was 14.7 compared with 16.0 for England and Wales. Further details will be found on page 4.

The number of deaths was 151 giving an adjusted death rate of 13.3 (comparability factor 1.19) compared with 11.7 for England and Wales. Diseases of the heart and circulatory system excluding hypertensive disease accounted for 79 or 58.9% of all deaths during the year, while malignant diseases accounted for 25 deaths or 16.6% of the total.

The number of confirmed cases of notifiable disease was 125 and of these measles accounted for 118, dysentery 3 and isolated cases of whooping cough, scarlet fever, meningococcal infection and encephalitis following mumps. Immunisation is now available for diphtheria, measles, whooping cough, tetanus, smallpox and tuberculosis when necessary. Parents are strongly advised to have their children protected against these diseases either by their family doctor or at one of the county clinics. German measles although generally a very mild disease, if contracted by women during the early months of pregnancy can result in damage to the unborn child. Vaccination against this disease is now recommended for all girls at 13 years of age.

Milk sampling in the Leek Rural District is carried out regularly by the Staffordshire County Council and tested for Brucellosis and Tuberculosis. No milk was found to be infected by Tuberculosis, but in six samples biological tests revealed Brucellosis. These six samples concerned two farms and in my absence for this period the farmers were requested by the Chief Public Health Inspector not to retail milk for human consumption unless adequately heat treated. Further details of milk sampling will be found on page 14.

Planning permission for the erection of four maisonettes on the Tittesworth Estate site was granted in October and it is anticipated that work will commence early in 1971. Sites at Brown Edge for the erection of old peoples bungalows are still being pursued.

The new sewage disposal works at Endon were put into operation in the New Year and work proceeded with the sewering of Bagnall and Stanley during the year.

The district is supplied with mains water by the Staffordshire Potteries Water Board and particulars relating to the supply may be found on pages 10 and 11.

The main refuse tip at Stockton Brook continued to be maintained in a most satisfactory condition. During the summer months the tip was treated daily and at weekends, to keep the fly population to a minimum and regular rodent control treatments were carried out. The life of the tip at the end of the year was becoming very limited and the possible extension of the tip or the acquisition of alternative sites were being investigated.

In recent years increased legislation especially in the field of housing has placed additional responsibilities and work on the Health Department. I should like to express my appreciation to the Council's Health Inspectors Mr. Pedley and Mr. Spencer for their extra effort needed to provide a satisfactory service without additional staff.

May I thank you Mr. Chairman and Members for the consideration and interest you have shown throughout the year.

All waters leaving the treatment plant at Hulme End and in supply were 100% free from E.Coli.I organisms and, therefore, of high bacterial purity, suitable for domestic consumption. Chemical treatment, including chlorination, maintains this high standard. The water is moderately soft, of high organic quality and contains only a slight trace of iron and manganese. No lead has been found in the water supply and the fluoride content is less than 0.05 mg/1.


