

I beg to submit the Annual Report on the Health of the District for the year 1949. I have pleasure in announcing that the general health remains good. A notable feature being the reduction in the Infantile Death Rate over the year 1948, from 39 per 1000 live births in 1948 to 22 per 1000 live births in 1949. Again there were no maternal deaths during the year.

On the 5th July, 1948, this work was transferred to the Lancashire County Council who are now the responsible authority under the National Health Service Act, 1946.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES are provided by arrangement with Oldham for (a) Infectious Cases, (b) Non-Infectious and Accident Cases.

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES

A School for Mothers and an Ante-natal Clinic is provided in the District by the Lancashire County Council at Princess Street School, on Wednesdays from 2 to 3 p.m.

Sanitary Administration

WATER SUPPLY

There is an efficient supply of water of good quality provided from the Oldham Corporation Waterworks for the whole district.

Action taken in respect of any form of contamination:

Filtration and Chlorination takes place at the source and tests are carried out by the Oldham County Borough.

No cases of lead contamination have been notified.

During the year 12 new houses on the Council Housing estate were supplied with water.

RIVERS AND STREAMS

The River Medlock which flows along the Western boundary of the District, receives the sewage effluent from the Sewage Works at Crossbank. Two other streams converge on the Eastern boundary and join the River Medlock at the South West part of the District at Holts.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE

Sewerage of the greater part of the district is conveyed to the sewers of the Oldham County Borough—the flow being checked by Lea Recorders—and is treated at their Outfall works. The remainder is treated at our own Sewage works, by the method of precipitation, continuous filters, percolating filters and humus tanks, prior to discharge of effluent in the River Medlock.

Extensive overhaul and repairs are required to provide an efficient effluent.

All drains are examined before being covered in, and smoke or water tests applied where applicable.

SCAVENGING AND REMOVAL OF HOUSE REFUSE

This is carried out satisfactorily by the Sanitary authority by weekly collection and a salvage scheme is operated. Refuse is collected weekly by motor vehicle and disposed of by partially controlled tipping at the Council tip at Tumbling Bank. Approximately 1210 tons of refuse were removed.

Excrement is disposed of on the water carriage system,

Sanitary Inspections during 1949 including Houses

During the year 800 premises were visited of which 458 were dwelling houses and 342 various other premises.

In the course of these inspections 166 defects or nuisances were found and 226 were abated.

To secure the abatement of these defects and nuisances 99 informal and 2 formal notices were served upon the owners or agents in addition to personal interviews by the Sanitary Inspector.

SCHOOLS

There are four day schools in the District. The sanitary condition of the W.C. and lavatory accommodation at the Schools within the District is fair, some of the accommodation is obsolete and requires attention. All the schools are supplied with water from the district mains.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

No action was taken with regard to smoke abatement.

RODENT CONTROL

Two maintenance treatments of the sewers in the district involving the baiting and poisoning of 181 man holes were carried out under the Infestation Order 1943 and good results obtained.

Minor infestations at various places were dealt with, 30 visits being made for this purpose.

The Council tip and Sewage works also had two treatments and the numbers of rats at these points are now much reduced.
