MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report of the Health of the District for the year 1952.

It will be observed that the birth rate improved slightly as compared with last year, whilst the death rate fell noticeably so that the *status quo* of the population was maintained. Unfortunately, three infants died during the first month of life—giving an infantile mortality rate of 55.

The incidence of infectious disease remained low throughout the year, no case of diphtheria was notified, and the district, after several alarms, escaped any case of Alastrim from the Rochdale outbreak.

May I take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to the members of the Health Committee, for their support and to all Officers of the Council for their ready co-operation.

## **General Provision of Health Services for the District.**

Under the National Service Act 1946, Health Divisions were set up throughout the County Administrative Area, each Health Division being responsible for the following services:—

### **MATERNITY SERVICE.**

One domiciliary Midwife serves the district. The Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Princess Street Methodist School on the 2nd and 4th Monday afternoons.

### **HEALTH VISITORS AND SCHOOL NURSES.**

Full time Health Visitors and School Nurses are employed in the area by the Lancashire County Council.

### **CLINICS.**

Held at the Princess Street Methodist School :  
Ante- and Post-Natal—2nd and 4th Monday afternoon.  
Child Welfare—Wednesday afternoon.

### **SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE.**

Clinic facilities are available at Firs Hall, Failsworth.

### **CARE OF CHILDREN UNDER THE CHILDREN'S ACT, 1948.**

The Area Children's Officer is Mrs. France, Enville House, Scotland Street, Ashton-u-Lyne.

### **DAY NURSERIES.**

There are no Day Nurseries provided by the County Council situated within the district. Two cotton mills however provide nurseries with places in the district.

### **AMBULANCE.**

The Ambulance Service is provided by the Oldham Corporation under an agency service agreement with the Lancashire County Council.

### **HOME HELP SERVICE.**

Home helps are available for emergency cases, priority being given to maternity cases, general sickness cases, and the elderly infirm. The services of a home help can be obtained on application to the Divisional Medical Officer.



#### HOME NURSING SERVICE.

Provided by the Lancashire County Council — one District Nurse resides in the area.

#### CONVALESCENCE.

Is available under arrangement by the Lancashire County Council through the Divisional Medical Officer.

#### CONVALESCENT TREATMENT.

Under arrangements made by the Regional Hospital Board through the Local Hospital Management Committee.

#### UNMARRIED MOTHERS AND ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN.

Provision for their care is made by the Lancashire County Council in conjunction with voluntary Moral Welfare Organisations.

#### WELFARE SERVICE.

Under arrangements made by the Lancashire County Council, resident accommodation is available at Boundary Park annexe.

#### TUBERCULOSIS.

The Chest Clinic is situated in Brook Street, Chadderton where all suspected cases of Tuberculosis are referred. X-ray facilities are available at the clinic.

#### HOSPITAL SERVICES.

## Sanitary Administration

### WATER SUPPLY

There is an efficient supply of water of good quality provided from the Oldham Corporation Waterworks for the whole district.

Action taken in respect of any form of contamination:

Filtration and Chlorination takes place at the source and tests are carried out by the Oldham County Borough.

No cases of lead contamination have been notified.

During the year 10 new houses built by the Council were supplied with water.

### RIVERS AND STREAMS

The River Medlock which flows along the Western boundary of the District, receives the sewage effluent from the Sewage Works at Crossbank. Two other streams converge on the Eastern boundary and join the River Medlock at the South West part of the District at Holts.

### SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE

Sewerage of the greater part of the district is conveyed to the sewers of the Oldham County Borough—the flow being checked by Lea Recorders—and is treated at their Outfall works. The remainder is treated at our own Sewage works, by the method of precipitation, continuous filters, percolating filters and humus tanks, prior to discharge of effluent in the River Medlock.

All drains are examined before being covered in, and smoke or water tests applied where applicable.

## SCAVENGING AND REMOVAL OF HOUSE REFUSE

This is carried out satisfactorily by the Sanitary authority by weekly collection and a salvage scheme is operated. Refuse is collected weekly by motor vehicle and disposed of by partially controlled tipping at the Council tip at Tumbling Bank. Approximately 1300 tons of refuse were removed.

The Council since 19th September, 1951, have operated a scheme for the provision and maintenance of Dustbins as a charge upon the General Rate fund. During 1952, 164 Dustbins were provided.

## **Sanitary Inspections during 1952 including Houses**

During the year 591 premises were visited of which 171 were dwelling houses and 420 various other premises.

In the course of these inspections 131 defects or nuisances were found and 143 were abated.

To secure the abatement of these defects and nuisances 59 informal and 7 formal notices were served upon the owners or agents in addition to personal interviews by the Sanitary Inspector.

## SCHOOLS

There are four day-schools in the District. The sanitary condition of the W.C. and lavatory accommodation at the Schools within the District is fair, some of the accommodation is obsolete and requires attention. All the schools are supplied with water from the district mains.

## SHOP ACT, 1950.

There are 91 shops in the district, which were visited at least twice during the year.



## SMOKE ABATEMENT

One case of a nuisance arising from smoke issuing from an industrial chimney situated outside the district was successfully dealt with—an automatic stoker being installed.

One lead peroxide gauge fixed at the Cemetery forms part of the joint Regional Scheme formed by seventeen Local authorities to investigate atmospheric pollution.
