

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

# To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Lees.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

Once again I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report on the health of the district.

Tables showing statistical details of births, deaths and causes of death, and the incidence of infectious diseases during the year, are given in the body of the report. While caution must be exercised in drawing any conclusions from such figures in relation to a small population, it is safe to say that nothing seriously wrong is revealed. Indeed, it is satisfying, to say the least, to note that only one infant death occurred and that during the year no death resulted from the notifiable infectious diseases.

Measles and dysentery were the two most frequent notifiable infections. The latter disease was prevalent over a wide area and it's control presents extrems difficulties. Although usually mild, and rarely fatal, the total effect of widespread infections can be very great, both as regards the amount of illness and also the disorganisation of industry. The essential measure of protection is the adoption by the general public of strict attention to personal hygiene - particularly in respect of "clean hands".

The chief causes of death were heart and circulatory diseases cancer, and diseases of the respiratory system, which together accounted for 52 out of the total of 58 deaths (76%). While to a large extent, this is a reflection of the increasing number of the population in the older age-groups, an ever-increasing accumulation of evidence points to the importance of other possible factors such as atmospheric pollution and tobacco smoking.

Only six new houses were available for re-housing during the year. While it must be conceded that your Council is faced with considerable difficulties both as regards finance and land availability, nevertheless, it is hoped that vigorous efforts will be made to make a start with the slum clearance plans - delay will likely increase rather than decrease the problems.

At the same time, I would like to express my appreciation of your action during the year in offering accommodation to a family when no legitimate reason other than the medico-social one of preventing the break-up of a family unit could be put forward. Your action might well commend itself to large authorities.

Regarding the Personal Health Services administered by the Lancashire County Council, while the people are well served by midwifery, home nursing and health visiting services, one regrets that the small population does not allow of improved clinic facilities for the children, especially the school children. The main purpose of such clinics is Health Education, and such education does not confer any direct and obvious financial reward or material gain, it must be brought to the people rather than expect the people to travel to it.

Finally, Mr. Chairman, I thank you and the members of your Committee for your unfailing courtesy and co-operation throughout the year. Once again, I acknowledge gratefully the ever-willing and unstinted help given by Mr. Oakes, and I thank Mr. Cropper, Clerk of the Council, for his willing co-operation.



# GENERAL PROVISION OF PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES.

These services are adminstered by the Lancashire County Council and for this purpose, Lees forms part of Health Division No. 14.

The Medical Officer of Health is also Divisional Medical Officer and the address of the Divisional Office is "Tylon", Middleton Road West, Chadderton, Telephone nu ber MAIN 6251/2.

# Maternal and Child Health Services.

One midwife Mrs. B. Horwood, 70, Spring Lane, Lees, Telephone number MAIN 3993, is employed to serve the district and ante-natal clinics are held at the Princess Street Methodist School on the afternoons of the second and fourth Monday in each month. The Health Visitors and School Nurses serving the Failsworth part of the Division also serve Lees, and Child Welfare Clinics are held on Wednesday afternoons at the Princess Street Methodist School.

Velfare foods such as National Dried Milk, Cod Liver Oil, Orange Juice etc., are now available at the Child Welfare sessions.

No school clinic facilities are available in Lees and children attend at the clinic at Firs Hall, Failsworth.

# Ambulance Service.

This service is now administered by the Lancashire County Council and Lees district is served from the County Ambulance Station at Mossley, which is in Health Division No. 17.

# Home Help Service.

Home Helps are available for emergency, priority being given to maternity cases and the elderly sick. The services of a Home Help can be obtained on application to the Divisional Medical Officer and a charge is made for this service, according to the means of the applicant.

## Home Nursing Service.

A full time district nurse is employed in Lees, Mrs. F. Knight, 80, Thomas Street, Lees, Telephone Number MAIN 5668.

#### Hospital Services.

Hospitals available for the residents of Lees are:-

# Tuberculosis.

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# SANITARY ADMINISTRATION.

## WATER SUPPLY.

There is an efficient supply of water of good quality provided from the Oldham Corporation Waterworks for the whole district.

Action taken in respect of any form of contamination.

Filtration and Clorination takes place at the source and tests are carried out by the Oldham County Borough.

No cases of lead contamination have been notified. 6 new houses built by the Council were supplied with water.

# RIVER AND STREAMS.

The River Medlock flows along the Western boundary of the District. Two other streams converge on the Eastern boundary and join the River Ledlock at the South West part of the District at Holts.

# SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

Sewerage of the whole of the district is conveyed to the sewers of the Oldham County Borough - the flow being checked by Lea Recorders - and is treated at their Outfall works at Slack's Valley.

All drains are examined before being covered in, and smoke or water tests applied where applicable.

# SCAVENGING A D REMOVAL OF HOUSE REFUSE.

This is carried out satisfactorily by the Sanitary authority by weekly collection and a salvage scheme is operated. Refuse is collected weekly by motor vehicle and disposed of by partially controlled tipping at the Council tips at Tumbling Bank and old sewage works. Approximately 1400 tons of refuse were removed.

The Council since 19th September, 1951 have operated a scheme for the provision and maintenance of Dustbins as a charge upon the General Rate Fund. During 1955 84 Dustbins were provided.

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# Sanitary Inspections during 1955. including Houses.

During the year 878 premises were visited of which 325 were dwelling houses and 553 various other premises.

In the course of these inspections 104 defects or nuisances were found and 90 were abated.

To secure the abatement of these defects and nuisances 67 informal and 21 formal notices were served upon the owners or agents in addition to personal interviews by the Sanitary Inspector.

# SCHOOLS.

There are four day-schools and one private school in the District. The sanitary condition of the W.C. and levatory accommodation at the schools within the District is fair, in two cases the accommodation is obsolete and requires attention. All the schools are sup lied with water from the district mains.

## SHOP ACT, 1950.

There are 91 shops in the district, which were visited at least twice during the year.

## SMOKE ABATEMENT.

One lead peroxide guage fixed at the Cemetery forms part of the joint Regional Scheme formed by seventeen Local Authorities to investigate atmospheric pollution.
