To: Chairman and Members of the Health Committee
of the Urban District Council of Lees.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting for your consideration my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1959. The statistical details of the year's public health activities are again set out in full within the body of the report but some comment on a few points of interest follows.

The mid-year population of 3,930 indicates that since 1951 the village has lost some 6% of its inhabitants. The number of deaths at 65 was the highest for four years, but the number of births remained constant at 43. It has been at this total since 1957. 42 of the deaths occurred in the age group over 65, 19 in the group between 45 and 64, and only 4 deaths occurred below the age of 44, two of which were babies. Disease of the heart and circulatory system caused 38 deaths, cancer caused 10 deaths, pneumonia and bronchitis caused 10 deaths and there were two fatal accidents.

The number of notified cases (72) of infectious disease was twice that of 1958 but this was due entirely to 62 cases of measles occurring amongst the very young. Only one case of measles occurred in the over 5 years of age groups, the remainder were in the reception classes at the schools and their younger brothers and sisters. The district recorded its first case of poliomyelitis (fortunately non-paralytic) since 1953, but again there were no reported cases of food poisoning or diphtheria. And no deaths occurred from these diseases.

I would like to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for their encouragement and support throughout the year. I acknowledge the help received from the Clerk of the Council, and I am indebted to the Public Health Inspector and his staff for their ever-willing help and co-operation.

General Social Conditions.

It's development initially centred round the main sources of employment namely the Cotton Mills, and comprised a large number of four-roomed terraced cottages. The cotton mills now number two in active production, four converted to other industries, two used as storage places, and one empty. The terraced cottages remain and are being all too slowly replaced by modern houses.

SECTION B.

Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and Other Diseases.

The numbers of cases of infectious disease reported again were very low apart from the measles cases which showed again the 2-yearly upswing.

No food poisoning or diptheria occurred but one case of poliomyelitis (non paralytic) was reported. The first case since 1953 in this district.

And for the third year running 4 new cases of tuberculosis were reported: The total number of cases registered remains small but the continued appearance of these new cases is somewhat disturbing.

SECTION C.

The Lancashire County Council, under the National Health Service Act, is the responsible authority for the provision and maintenance of personal health services. These services e.g.,

- Maternity & Child Welfare Services.
- Midwifery Services.
- Mental Health Services.
- Home Help Services.
- Ambulance Services.
- Care of School Children.
- Care of the Aged.
- General Welfare Services.

are administered under the Divisional Health Service Scheme by Divisional Health Committee No. 14 through the Divisional Medical Officer, "Tylon", Middleton Road, Chadderton (Tel: MAIn 6251).

Ante-natal clinics are held fortnightly in the district and child welfare clinics weekly. No school clinic facilities are available so school children attend in other parts of the Division. Home helps are available to attend households where necessary in cases of confinement, illness, old age and infirmity. Over 70% of the demands on this service are for the care of the aged and infirm. A charge is made for home help services dependent on the means of the person helped.

Hospital facilities are provided and maintained through the Regional Hospital Board and Hospital Management Committees without regard to local authority boundaries.

The examination of pathological specimens and samples of milk, ice-cream, water and other foods is undertaken, without charge to the authority, by the Public Health Laboratory Service, Public Health Laboratory, Monsall Hospital, Manchester 10.

The Urban District Council is responsible for those matters likely to affect or be concerned with the maintenance of high standards of environmental health. These include:

- Inspection of houses re fitness for human habitation.
- Control of infectious disease (Including food poisoning).
- Control of slaughtering facilities and inspection of meat.
- Control of food and food preparing premises.
- Provision of suitable water supplies.
- Detection and prevention of nuisances.
- Prevention of atmospheric pollution.
- Control of rodent and insect infestations.
- Collection and disposal of refuse
- Provision of sanitary accommodation and public conveniences.

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the Sanitary Administration of the District during the year 1959.

The clearance of the sites of two more proposed Clearance Areas was accomplished again without direct building for the rehousing of the occupants of the houses concerned, and one of these sites will next year hold the first combined block of public conveniences to be erected in the district. The completion of this work will result again in improving the face of the village. Lasting proof that demolition and redevelopment properly tackled must result in betterment.

The small terrace of new bungalows under construction at the end of the year provide another landmark. These will be the first bungalows provided by the Council and the anticipated success with the proposed occupants will surely lead to an extension of this type of development and provide more opportunity for the removal of the outworn stone cottages so prevalent in the village centre.

I would like again to express my thanks and appreciation to all Members of the Committee, to Dr. T.P. O'Grady, and to my fellow officers and staff for their help and support throughout the year.

SECTION D.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The whole district is drained and sewered but the authority possesses no sewage disposal works. Sewage is conveyed to sewers of the Oldham County Borough via three main junctions, the respective flows being measured by Lea recorders, and is treated by that authority at their disposal works in Slacks Valley, Chadderton.

Public Cleansing.

A weekly collection of household refuse is maintained throughout the year; collection being direct from household bins to a motor vehicle and disposal by tipping. Tins are recovered for salvage whilst the refuse is being hand levelled at the tip face and some paper is removed for incineration on the tip top.

Dustbins are replaced by the Council, the cost being borne by the general rate fund. 73 dustbins were supplied during the year as replacements. The number of moveable dustbins in the district is some 1500.

Rodent Control.

No full-time rodent operative is employed, all necessary works being carried out by members of the road maintenance staff who have attended Ministry courses of instruction in rodent destruction. The sewer system receives a twice yearly treatment irrespective of other matters and complaints of rodent infestation are handled as the circumstances permit. 17 infestations were successfully treated throughout the year.

Sanitary Accommodation.

All houses in the district are on the water carriage system although not all possess a separate fresh water closet. 51 waste water closets still remain and progress in their elimination is painfully slow. Three were converted during the year under review.

Smoke Abatement.

The authority co-operates in the joint scheme for the investigation of atmospheric pollution formed by 27 local authorities and has one lead peroxide gauge for the determination of sulphur pollution sited in the Cemetery grounds.

Smoke emissions from factory chimneys during the year did not call for any action other than verbal cautions.

Water Supply.

The district is served by upland surface water from the Oldham County Borough supply. Filtration and sterilization by the chloramine process takes place at the source of the supply. Six bacteriological samples taken in the district were reported as satisfactory.

Sanitary Inspections.

During the year 500 visits were made to 283 premises, namely,
178 dwellinghouses.
90 shops and business premises.
10 factories.
5 schools.

In the dwellinghouses 147 defects or nuisances were found and during the year 131 of these matters were remedied. It was found necessary in 4 cases to serve formal notices to ensure that the repairs were carried out, but otherwise 45 informal notices and personal visits obtained the desired results.

3 houses were found to be verminous but each infestation responded to a lindane/DDT treatment and was satisfactorily cleared.

No legal action was called for during visits to the shops and in general conditions are satisfactory.

There are 5 schools in the district, one being a private school. Although each is drained and has a water supply, two schools still possess and have to make use of obsolete trough-type closets, four schools have unsatisfactory washing facilities and three schools have unsatisfactory drinking water facilities.

There are 27 factories among which 17 visits were made. No notices or prosecutions under the Act were found necessary.
