To: The Chairman and Nembers of the Health Committee.

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the Health of the District in 1968 and hope that this will again be found useful as a source of easy reference.

The mid-1968 estimated population of 3,690 was again a decrease of 10 on the previous mid-year estimate. The total number of live births (71) was an increase of 6 on 1967, giving an adjusted birth rate of 23.6 to compare with a National rate of 16.9. There was one stillbirth during the year; no infant or maternal deaths and a halving of the percentage of illegitimate births. But, with a small total population, it is necessary to interpret annual fluctuations with extreme care: one must rather study general trends over a period of at least 5 years. On this basis one can discern with certainty only a gradual rise in the birth rate.

The total of deaths (64) was 16 below last years unusually high total of 80, giving an adjusted rate of 12.8 to compare with a national rate of 11.9. The total notifications of Infectious Disease (14) was unusually low. During the year the Registrar General's classification of causes of death was amended in accordance with recent revision of standard International practice. Of more direct practical consequence was the major and long awaited, revision of Infectious Disease legislation in accordance with the Health Dervice and Public Health Act 1968. Reference to this is made in the text of the report.

During the year the Council accepted my representation of one Clearance area comprising 6 properties. Sixteen houses already represented under Section 17 of the Housing act were cleared, and a total of 82 new dwellings completed in the District. Of these 39 were Council properties, including the bungalow development on the Further Hey site. Construction of the Councils special "sheltered" housing development was commenced - the completed warden-controlled flatlet scheme ("Lees House") was opened this year. The Councils first smoke control area, covering 203 premises, was submitted for kinesterial approval.

At the time of writing the future pattern of Local Government generally, and Health Services in particular, seems shrouded in mystery. What new form of organisation will emerge from reports, discussions and consultations, and what the pace of change will be is sheer speculation. However, it is my personal hope that some form of authoratitive Government statement of intention will be made in the reasonably near future; the present prolonged climate of uncertainty is damaging alike to Councillors, Council staff, and, most importantly, the electorate, especially in smaller County Districts.

Finally, Mr. Chairman, I must thank you and your Committee for your support during the year, also the Clerk and Mr. Rustidge for their ever willing assistance, not least in the preparation of this report.

(2) General Characteristics and Social Conditions of the District

The Urban District is situated on the western slopes of the Pennines between the eastern boundary of Oldham County Borough and the western boundary of Saddleworth Urban District. The latter boundary is also the County Boundary between Lancashire and the West Riding of Yorkshire.

The main source of employment within the district is by three Cotton Hills and four Factories, together with the sale of commodities by retail.

There are two major roads passing through the district, Muddersfield Road in the North Mard, being a section of the Liverpool - Leeds - Hull (...62) Trunk Road and High Street, (...669) partly dividing South and Central Mards. The Najority of the shop premises in the district are centred on High Street.

PREV.L.NCE OF NOTIFILELS DISS.SES - 1968.

During 1968 there was a modification in the lists of Notifiable Infectious Diseases under Part III of the Public Health act 1968, as amplified by the Public Health (Infectious Disease) Regulations 1968, which became operative from October 1st.

The main changes were as follows:-

- Pneumonia, rhaumatism, erysipelas, puerperal pyrexia; no longer notifiable.
- Infectious jaundice, leptospirosis, tetanus, yellow fever; now notifiable.
- Change in nomenclature e.g. acute meningitis replacing menigococcal infection.

Total notifications of 14 cases of Infectious Disease in the district were the lowest for many years.

Leasles

...lthough active immunisation against this disease was available, on a restricted basis, from the 1968, and was given to some young children in the district, it is doubtful whether this would explain the sudden decrease in prevalance of measles. ...s with other forms of immunisation it will probably be 2-5 years before one can gauge its total protective effect in the community.

Dysentery and Food Foisoning.

One single case only of dysentery was notified. The prevalence of these two diseases is a reasonably accurate index of general community standards of hygiene. and the same of the same

Immunisation.

Routine Immunisation of children against Diptheria, Theoping Cough, Tetanus, Policayelitis and Smallpox can be arranged at the local Clinic or through General Practitioners. Limited quantities of Measles Vaccine are now available for young children who have not had this disease.

3.C.C. vaccination (against Tuberculosis) is effored to Secondary School children showing no acquired resistance on skin testing.

Other forms of immunisation (e.g. T.A.B. Vaccine) are not normally available through the National Health Service; but can be arranged (privately) by General Fractitioners.

PROVISION OF PERSON.L HEALTH SERVICES

Services under the National Health Service act and related legislation are provided by Lancashire County Council. For these purposes, Lees forms part of Health Division No. 14. The Divisional Health Offices is situated at 'Tylon', Middleton Road, Chadderton, (Tel: 061-624-6251).

The ambulance service is administered by Health Division No. 14. and is under radio-control from a Control Centro at Whitefield (Tel: WHI 6666).

HOME HELP SERVICES

Home helps are available to attend households where necessary, in cases of confinement, illnesses, old age and infirmity. Application for the services of a home help should be made to the Home Help Organiser, Divisional Health Office, 'Tylon', Hiddleton Road, Chadderton. (Tel: 061-624-6251).

WELFARE SERVICES

Residential accommodation for elderly persons in need of care and attention, not otherwise available is provided by the County Council in eight homes for the elderly in Division 14.

Report of the Public Health Inspector.

To: The Chairman and Members of the Health Committee.

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I submit to you herewith the Annual Report on the work carried out by the Public Health Department and the Sanitary circumstances of the district for the year ended 31st December, 1968.

The completion of the Further Hey Site housing redevelopment scheme (Part 1) enabled the rehousing of several families who had waited patiently on the Housing List for several years. The completion of 48 housing units of the one, two and three bedroom traditional type also permitted some progress with the Clearance Programme.

Eight single bedroom bungalows were nearing completion on the Grigley Square redevelopment site at the end of the year and the 26 flatlets with Warden's Maisonette at Lees House were also progressing but at a very slow rate due to the financial restrictions which applied during the year.

The weekly collection of refuse has continued throughout the year, minor adjustment to the service only being required after holiday periods. The refuse collection workmen continued to work conscientiously throughout any poor weather conditions encountered in order to maintain the round, and the majority of the householders appreciate this service.

The Council agreed in the latter half of the year to take part in the setting up of a study group to consider, with nearby authorities, the question of future joint refuse disposal operations.

Details of the routine work carried out during the year are contained in the following pages.

My thanks are again due to the Medical Officer, Clerk and Council Officials for the valued assistance and the support of the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee throughout the year of 1968.

SANITARY CIRCULST. NCBS OF THE AREA.

DR.IMAGE AND SEVER.GE.

The district no longer maintains a sawage disposal works, foul drainage from the whole of the district being discharged into the adjoining Authority's sawering system by agreement with Oldham County Borough. The rate of flow is measured by Recording Apparatus at the three junctions to the Oldham County Borough Sewers: the sewage receives treatment at the Oldham disposal works at Slack Valley with the Urban District of Chadderton.

Surface water sewers convey surface water to the river hedlock at various points within the district. Thornley Brook also receives surface water and discharges into the Medlock at Holts.

62 new dwellings were connected to the sower system during the year, the separate system of drainage being required wherever possible.

FUBLIC CLE.NSING.

" regular weekly collection of domestic refuse has been maintained throughout the year by a team of two leaders and a driver/loader operating a diesel engined vehicle.

The rear loading 5. & D. 'fore and aft' collection vehicle has maintained the collection service, assisted by the increased carrying capacity of the refuse body. Some 1,134 loads of domestic refuse and 161 loads of trade refuse were disposed of at Tip Sites during the year.

Controlled tipping with levelling and covering by mechanical appliance has been maintained during the year, with the resultant discontinuing of time recovery for salvage. Satisfactory arrangements with a local motor vehicle dismantler have been operated, ensuring the disposal of derelict and unserviceable motor vehicles in the district.

Tipping and prompt sealing of the Tumbling Bank Site has taken place, with the future extension of the Hills Recreation Ground in mind.

Dustbin replacement for existing properties is provided for by the Rate Fund. 78 replacement dustbins were issued during 1968, the type of bin supplied being B.S.S. mild steel galvanised type with rubber lid, and a capacity of 2½ cu.ft. The number of movemble dustbins was estimated as 1,714 at the end of 1968.

RODENT CONTROL

Two trained employees having attended Ministry of agriculture Training Courses carry out redent control operations on a part-time basis. Complaints are given prompt attention: survey and inspection work is carried out throughout the district, at regular intervals.

Two sewer maintenance treatments were successfully carried out during the year.

147 redent infestations were recorded during the year and received treatment. Several instances of darfarin resistance were encountered once more in the 79 mice infestations discovered. The use of Alphachleralose Commatetryl and trapping with various baits were adopted to eliminate the infestations.

S.NIT.RY ..CCOM.CD.TION.

...ll dwellings within the district are served by the water carriage system. There are approximately 298 dwellings without separate fresh water closet accommodation and 29 waste water closets remain to be converted or taken out.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

Fourteen observations were taken on the three remaining chimneys serving industrial furnaces in the district. Informal procedure achieved the remedy of two faults on oil burner apparatus to two boiler installations.

WATER SUPPLY.

The whole of the district is served with Upland Surface Water by the West Fennine Water Board. The water is filtered at its source and sterilized by the Chloramine process.

Seven demostic water samples were obtained during the year and submitted to the Public Health Laboratory. ...ll were reported as satisfactory.

Continued arrangements were made by the Local Authority for the cleansing of branch service pipes serving several blocks of dwellings. On completion, all were reported to be improved and satisfactory.

RIVERS .. ND STRE.J.S.

The controlling Authority for the streams in the area is the Morsey and Meaver Authority, the two larger streams being the River Medlock and Thornley Brook (Good Brook).

Unauthorised tipping of miscellaneous material into these main water courses has again necessitated continuous inspection and cleansing of the water courses in order to prevent nuisance.

S.NITARY INSPECTIONS.

During 1968 995 visits were made to 657 premises, namely:-

494 dwellinghouses.

118 shops.

6 schools

39 factories.

In dwellinghouses 163 defects or nuisances were discovered and 156 of these were remedied. 5 Statutory batement Notices were served in order to ensure that the necessary repairs were carried out, together with 117 Informal Notices. In the majority of cases, informal notices, together with personal visits, obtained a satisfactory remedy.

DISINFEST .. TION

14 dwellings (5Council and 9 other dwellings) in the district were found to be infested with insects to a minor degree. Each was cleared satisfactorily with the use of contact insecticides (powder, liquid and/or smoke generators).

SCHOOLS.

There are 4 schools in the district. Each is served with mains water supply and connected to the drainage system.

FACTORIES.

There are 21 factories in the district to which 39 visits were made. It was necessary to serve Informal Motices under the act, the defects were found to be remedied upon reinspection.

.. total of 28 Milk samples (of which 2 were Channel Islands Milk) were taken by the Food and Drugs ..uthority, all of which were found to be satisfactory.

The District Council also submitted 45 samples of milk to the Public Health Laboratory for examination, the majority of these samples being taken as a result of brucella infection being present in one bulk sample. .. notice under Regulation 20 of the Milk and Dairies (General) Regulations 1959 was served by the Medical Officer of Health, requiring the heat treatment of the milk supply concerned before sale. This notice was withdrawn when the milk supply was proved to be free from infection.

No ice-cream is manufactured in the district except that sold from mobile vans. The majority of the product is retailed in wrapped form from registered promises in the area. S samples were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for examination, 7 Provisional Grade I results were obtained, the remaining one produced no result due to a leakage occurring in the sample container.
