

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee.

I have the honour to present for your information and consideration the Annual Report on the health of the Borough of Leigh for the year 1960.

The health of the Borough has, on the whole, again remained satisfactory through the year. The population continued its downward trend which has been evident since 1950, the mid-year estimate being 47,240. The birth rate was 15.7 per thousand, and the infant mortality rate at 20.0 remains below the national figure (21.7). The death rate decreased to 14.6 per thousand.

It is now more than ten years since the last case of diphtheria was notified, a satisfying result of the immunisation drive of succeeding years. Whilst the percentage of the school and pre-school population vaccinated against poliomyelitis is comparable with the national average, in common with most towns the foresight of the teen-age and adult age groups is not reflected in the numbers coming forward for vaccination.

The Corporation's Slum Clearance programme continued steadily in accordance with the five year scheme - in fact it is somewhat ahead of schedule.

To implement the Council's Clean Air policy a Technical Assistant was appointed and soon afterwards a satisfying start was made on the survey of the first Smoke Control Area. It is hoped that the impetus will be increased and the hesitancy of the commencement quickly overcome. Public opinion would appear to be accepting the need for this action and much interest was shown in the Department's educational activities.

I welcome this opportunity of expressing thanks to you, Mr. Chairman, and all Members of the Health Committee for their continued interest in the Department, and to the Members of the staff and my colleagues in the Town Hall for their ever-ready help and co-operation.

BIRTH RATE

The total number of registered live births assignable to the Borough of Leigh for the year 1960 was 750 compared with 759 the previous year. The corresponding Birth Rate for the two years respectively are 15.9 and 16.0 per 1,000 estimated population.

The crude death rate is 11.7 per 1,000 of the estimated resident population, but when this is corrected and adjusted by making allowances for the age and sex distribution of the population it becomes comparable with the death rate of the country as a whole, or with the death rate of any other area. This standardised death rate, as it is then termed, is 14.6 per 1,000 estimated population for the Borough of Leigh.

AND DISINFECTION.

180 visits of investigation and 32 re-visits were paid to premises where infectious diseases had occurred. In addition 4 visits were made by the Disinfecting Staff for the purpose of carrying out disinfection on account of the occurrence of notifiable diseases. 101 Library Books were disinfected.

Sales of Disinfectant by the Department realised £220.5s.4d. as against £242.19s.6d. last year.

DISINFESTATION.

56 visits were made by the Public Health Inspectors in the course of investigation of verminous premises.

SMOKE CONTROL AREAS

Until the latter part of this year no progress was made towards the establishment of Smoke Control Areas in the Borough, although the Council has approved 1971 as the target year for the completion of its programme in this respect.

An unqualified assistant was appointed late in the year and as a consequence the survey of the No. 1 Smoke Control Area was commenced. This area covers about 154 acres and is virtually the whole of the town centre, which carries a comparatively high rate of pollution and comprises the following area:-

The boundary of this is enclosed on the North by the south side of Walmesley Road, Church Passage and Church Street, on the East by the west side of Brown Street North from its junction with Church Street to its junction with East Bond Street, the south side of East Bond Street, and the railway line running between East Bond Street and Queen Street, on the South by the north side of Queen Street from the railway line to its junction with Brown Street North, the north side of Bradshawgate and the north side of Railway Road, on the West by the railway line between Railway Road and Walmesley Road.

Visits made by the staff for the purpose of survey in the proposed area have been received cordially by the public. This may be due to the fact that a few days prior to the intended date of inspection each household receives a letter explaining the reasons for the visit and seeking their co-operation. It is anticipated that all the necessary information will have been secured and proposals for the No. 1 Smoke Control Area submitted to the Minister of Housing and Local Government in the Spring of 1961.

An exhibition stand of a semi-permanent character, designed by our own staff, was established in the Town Hall Foyer. For this exhibition a volumetric Smoke Recording Apparatus was shown as a working model and some original poster designs (also prepared by your staff) were displayed. This exhibit attracted considerable attention by members of the public who use the Town Hall.

ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION.

Few observations have been made this year on factory chimneys. Of the 36 made, only 15 were in excess of the statutory permitted period and after consultation with the management in each case improvement resulted.

This is the second full year in which the Dark Smoke (Permitted Periods) Regulations have been in operation Offences under these Regulations are classified as:-

 Emission of dark smoke from any chimney longer than 10 minutes in the aggregate in any period of 8 hours, or, if soot blowing is carried out during the period, 14 minutes.
 These periods are extended where a chimney serves more than one furnace by:-

18 - 25 minutes in the case of 2 furnaces

(The two furnace tubes of a Lancashire boiler would be classified as a single furnace).

- 2. The continuous emission of dark smoke, caused otherwise than by soot blowing, for a period exceeding 4 minutes.

This Authority is a member of both the North Western Division of the National Society for Clean Air and the Manchester and District Regional Smoke Abatement Committee.

COLLIERY SPOILBANKS.

The Bedford Colliery Spoilbank, which in earlier years has been the cause of many complaints from fumes, has during this year been comparatively inactive. The National Coal Board has continued to carry out remedial work as occasion has arisen.

VOLUMETRIC APPARATUS

The measurement of pollution has continued during the year by the use of a volumetric apparatus, the deposit gauge and the exposure of a measured amount of lead peroxide. The results are submitted to the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, where they are co-ordinated into the National Survey of Atmospheric Pollution.

The tables on the following pages give the comparative results of the investigation and reveal a continuing improvement, small perhaps, but of significance.

The recording, which commenced in April 1958, is achieved by drawing about 70 cubic feet of air every 24 hours through a 2" circle of filter paper, the suspended matter being deposited on the paper as a dark stain, this varying of course with the amount of smoke present in the air. The stain is measured by means of a photo-electric apparatus and results expressed in milligrammes per 100 cubic metres. At the same time an estimation of the amount of sulphur is made and expressed as the average sulphur dioxide concentration in parts per 100 million.

HOUSING.

Activity in this field in line with the set programme of 85 houses per year has continued steadily, 87 houses having been dealt with during 1960. The year has been marked with increased difficulties due to not a few owner/occupied premises being interspersed amongst slum clearance properties. An increasing number of owner/occupied properties is being dealt with during the course of this work, with consequent repercussions on the costs, especially where the house has been purchased during the material period (1.9.39 - 12.12.55).

The first five years programme having been completed, this year the position was reviewed in accordance with circular 2/60 of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government, and further proposals in respect of the continuing problem were submitted as given below.

I M P R O V E M E N T G R A N T S - Housing Act 1949, Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954

Rent Act 1957, and House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959.

Two types of grant are now available with the advent of the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, when the Standard Grant was introduced. The conditions applicable to these grants are as follows:-

- (a) Standard Grants are available towards the cost of improving a house which lacks certain standard amenities, such as a bath, w.c. or hot water system. They are specially intended to help the modernisation of houses which can be equipped with these amenities without the necessity for structural additions involving much new building work. These standard grants are a new form of improvement grant which can be claimed as of right: the grant cannot be refused, provided the conditions of payment are satisfied.
- (b) Discretionary Grants are payable for a wider range and more extensive forms of improvement, including the conversion or adaptation of larger houses and other buildings. But payment of these grants is at the discretion of the local council.

The report was approved by the Minister and the works required to make each slaughterhouse comply with the Construction Regulations completed by the 31st December.

ICE CREAM

In accordance with Section 16(1)(a) of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, 9 premises were registered for the sale of Ice Cream during the year. 186 such premises now appear in the Register.

There are four manufacturers of Ice Cream licensed in the Borough.

HAWKERS

Any person who shall by himself, or any person employed by him, sell or offer or expose for sale, any meat or meat food product, or fish, fruit or vegetables from any cart, barrow or other vehicle or from any basket, pail, tray or other receptacle, must be registered.

The number of persons on the register at the end of the year was 87.

PREMISES

All premises used or proposed to be used for storage of meat, meat food products, or fish, fruit or vegetables must be registered. The number of premises registered at the end of the year was 61.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955 (Section 16)

PRESERVED FOODS, ETC.

Under the above Act all premises used for the preparation or manufacture of sausages or potted, pressed, pickled or preserved meat, fish or other food intended for sale must be registered.

The number of premises registered at the end of the year was 96.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

During the year, as a result of complaints and continuous survey, 2,653 premises were inspected. As a result 625 infestations were found and in course of treatment 5,590 visits were made by the Rodent Operator.

A free service for the destruction of Rats and Mice is given to occupiers of dwelling-houses, conditional on there being no contributory negligence. In all other cases the full cost of the work and materials is borne by the occupiers of the premises, and in this connection the sum of £84.15s.9d. was recovered during the year.

SEWER INFESTATION

The Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food procedure as to the methods of pre-baiting and poisoning is adhered to throughout this work. The disinfestation of sewers comprises what is known as an initial treatment followed by maintenance of a similar kind at six-monthly intervals.

A comparative table of all treatments undertaken since the inception of this scheme in 1945 to date is given below:-
