To the Chairman and Members of the Leominster & Wigmore Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1956, which has been prepared jointly by the Public Health Inspector and myself.

Though there were no outbreaks of infectious disease of a major or serious character during the year, a minor epidemic of Scarlet Fever occurred. Twentysix cases were notified, and of these, thirteen were from one parish; the remainder from six other parishes. None of the cases was severe, but as isolation in the home was not always possible, several were removed to hospital. As I have said before, the severity of this disease appears to have dimished, and effective treatment, for example, by penicillin, is readily available with the result that many uncomplicated cases can be safely treated at home. Nevertheless, in order to limit the opportunities for persons who had been in close contact with these cases to spread the disease, those engaged in food trades were temporarily excluded from work.

One case of Paralytic Policevelitis occurred within the district. One case of Paralytic Poliomyelitis occurred within the district. Research into the methods by which this disease is usually disseminated throughout a community after the occurrence of the first cases, points to personal hygiene as being of paramount importance. The adoption of "house and garden" quarantine which aims at localising infection, was therefore recommended to all who had been in close, household contact with the case. No other cases occurred, so it may be that our efforts to limit the possibility of spreading the disease were, in this instance anyhow, successful. But, on the other hand, one has to bear in mind that the occurrence of Poliomyelitis is frequently quite inexplicable; and that sporadic cases, entirely unconnected with other known cases, appear in our midst from time to time.

The appointment of Dr. O.L. Evans as District Medical Officer of Health for the Northern Districts and as Assistant County Medical Officer, was made on December 5th, 1956. It was arranged that he would commence duty on March 1st, 1957, on which date my temporary appointment as Acting Medical Officer of Health will terminate.

In view of my recent change of appointment, this will be the last annual report that I shall present to you as your Medical Officer of Health. I shall retain very warm memories of my years of service, and of the happy relations that exist among officers and between members of the council and staff, - a spirit of harmony that contributes much to the effectiveness of work in the local government service.

Sampling

One hundred and fiftythree samples of water for bacteriological analysis were taken during the year and sent to the Laboratory at Hereford. These samples produced the following results.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Sewage Disposal Works on council house estates have received frequent inspection. These plants are working satisfactorily. The Settling Tank at Brimfield is to be enlarged. The contents of the Settling and Humus Tanks are removed at regular intervals, ensuring efficient operation.

Sowage disposal in the district is mainly by private soptic tanks and filter bode; in other cases by the conservancy system.

RIVERS AND STREAMS

No pollution of any river or stream occurred during the year.

REFUSE COLLECTION

A satisfactory house-to-house refuse collection is carried out by the Local Authority. Collections are made twice monthly in the larger parishes, and once a month in the smaller ones.

Tips are situated at Shobdon; Fidler's Elbow, Leintwardine; Bodenham, and Brimfield.

DISINFECTION - INFECTIOUS DISEASE

Twentyeight inspections and re-inspections were made in connection with infectious disease, and disinfection was carried out in fourteen houses.

FACTORIES ACTS, 1937 and 1948

Sixtyfive inspections have been made at various factories with and without mechanical power in the district. Three informal notices have been served for minor defects. Two of these were for want of cleanliness, and one for insufficient sanitary conveniences. On the whole the regulations are carried out satisfactorily.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

A survey of all premises is being carried out under the above Act. Private dwelling houses are treated free of charge. The sewers were test baited, but no evidence of rats was found. Refuse Tips and sewer outfalls received periodic treatment.
