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To the Chairman and Members of the Leominster & Wigmore
Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1960, with the following comments.

Vital Statistics

The District continues to enjoy a high birth rate and low death rate, in common with most rural areas.

Infectious Diseases

This year saw a widespread outbreak of Sonne dysentery, in common with neighbouring rural and urban districts. This disease has been increasingly common since the first World War and is now probably the commonest notifiable infectious disease in the country, certainly as common as measles. It is not, however, so frequently notified as it is often considered by the sufferer as a "tummy upset". When, however, the disease involves a number of children in one school, the cause is quickly identified and notifications begin. It should be realised here that the cases of food poisoning notified were almost all in association with cases of dysentery, and were simply cases of dysentery where no bacteriological proof of dysentery infection had been obtained.

The disease is spread by personal contamination of food, towels, etc., by persons suffering from the disease, and also by flies. It is controlled by good habits of personal cleanliness and by improved sewerage systems.

The two cases of acute encephalitis were caused by the coxsackie virus, which was identified with a number of outbreaks in the Midlands during the year, chiefly in the Birmingham area. The post-infectious case followed mumps. There were no deaths.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

It is once again necessary to draw attention to the defective sewerage systems prevailing in so many parts of the area, and Mr. Bull has listed in his report the villages where some major improvement is necessary. A start has been made to do something about Kingsland, but the list is long and the need great. In view of the special request of the Minister for a report on sewerage systems this year, it is to be hoped that the Ministry intend to make some special effort in the near future to see that these improvements are brought about.

In conclusion I would like to thank Mr. Bull for preparing much of this report, and for his help and co-operation in the past year.
