VISUAL DEFECTS AND EXTERNAL EYE DISEASES.

The number of school children who were found to have some visual defect at Routine Medical Inspection was 254 as compared with 217 in the previous year.

During 1951, arrangements were made by the Regional Hospital Board for the eye clinics to be held at premises provided by the Board.

The number of cases seen by the Ophthalmic Surgeon at these clinics during the year was 804.

The number of spectacles prescribed was 491 and in each case spectacles were obtained.

EAR, NOSE AND THROAT DEFECTS.

The total number of children found to be suffering from enlarged tonsils or enlarged adenoids or enlarged tonsils and adenoids was 573 as compared with 510 during the previous year.

The total number of operations for tonsils and adenoids was 203 as compared with 169 last year.

Middle ear disease was found to be present in 38 children, as compared with 66 in the previous year and 26 of these were referred for treatment.

Defective hearing was detected in the case of 25 children and 11 of these were referred for treatment. Figures for the previous year were 72 and 59.

158 cases attended at the School Clinic during the year and were kept under supervision by the Assistant School Medical Officer. During the previous year this figure was 208.

393 cases were seen by the Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeons as compared with 513 cases during the previous year.

DENTAL INSPECTION AND TREATMENT.

It was found possible to obtain the services of four Dental Practitioners in the City to be available for eight sessions each week up to the end of August. The number of sessions was increased to eleven each week from September to the end of the year. Some of these sessions were devoted to Maternity and Child Welfare work.

Routine dental inspections were resumed during the year.

HEART DISEASE AND RHEUMATISM.

The number of children found at Routine or Special Inspections to be suffering from Heart Lesions was 35 as compared with 49 last year. These cases are kept under the supervision of the School Medical Officer and their attendance at school and the amount of exercise that they should take is regulated by medical advice, In addition a Register of Rheumatism cases is kept at the Clinic. At the end of 1951 there were 9 children on the books as compared with 12 at the end of 1950. All children known to be suffering from Rheumatism are kept under supervision and examined periodically.

There is a special Heart and Rheumatism clinic held once a month at Lindum Road and during the year 57 school children were referred to the Specialist in charge as compared with 53 during the previous year.

This clinic is also the centre for investigation of Acute Rheumatism in children up to 16 years of age.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The total number of cases of Infectious Diseases whether notifiable or non-notifiable occurring amongst school children was 182 as compared with 885 in 1950.

DISTRIBUTION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE THROUGHOUT THE SCHOOLS OF THE CITY

DURING 1951.

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DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

Facilities were offered for Immunisation of school children at the School Clinic, at the schools and at other clinics under the Health Services.

Special sessions were conducted at school premises whenever a sufficient number of acceptances was received from a school.

The number of children between 5 and 15 years of age immunised during 1951 was 307, as compared with 148 during the previous year. In addition reinforcing doses were given to 2567 children during the year. In 1950, this number was 784.

TUBERCULOSIS.

18 children were referred to the Chest Clinic during the year as compared with 10 during the previous year.

CHOREA.

1 child was found to be suffering from Chorea as compared with 6 last year.

RICKETS.

1 child was found to be suffering from Rickets as compared with 6 last year.

VACCINAL CONDITION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.

Vaccination is not now compulsory.

Notices issued to parents

During the year 15.9% of the School children were found to be vaccinated or protected against Smallpox as compared with 21.0% in 1950 and 23.6% during 1949.

"FOLLOWING-UP."

The method of "following-up" children found suffering from any defects was carried out in the same way as described in previous reports. Repeated visits, both to schools and to the homes, were paid with a view to seeing that effect was given to the remedying of defects.

PHYSICAL TRAINING.

The report on physical education for the year ended 31st August, 1951, is included in the report for that year of the Education Committee presented to the City Council.

SCHOOL BATHS.

Open Air School-8 shower baths.

St. Giles Secondary Modern School—8 shower baths.

St. Christopher's School—5 baths and 1 shower bath.

South Park High School—16 shower baths (sprinkler type) in gymnasium changing room.

South Park High School—Swimming bath. This bath is used for instructional purposes by children from Primary and Secondary schools and by Youth organisations and other bodies. There are 6 shower baths in the dressing rooms.

CO-OPERATION OF PARENTS.

The percentage of parents who attended at the medical inspection of boys was 52.5 as compared with 63.0 during last year and the percentage of parents attending medical inspection in the case of girls was 69.0 as compared with 64.9 last year.

PROVISION OF MILK AND MEALS.

The School Meals Service has continued throughout the year to supply meals to all schools in the City. A new kitchen/dining room was opened at Skellingthorpe Road Infants' School in May, 1951, and thirteen school departments now have their own kitchen/dining rooms. The remainder of the schools are supplied with carried meals from the four Central Kitchens—Boultham, St. Giles, Saxilby and Sincil Bank.

DEFECTIVE SPEECH.

The services of a Speech Therapist were not available during 1951, as the Speech Therapist employed by the Education Authority resigned her post in August, 1948, and it has not yet been possible to obtain the services of another Speech Therapist.

Special cases, however, were referred to the Speech Therapist under the Hospital Services.

CHILD GUIDANCE CENTRE.

The Psychiatric Social Worker left on 31st July, 1948, and the Educational Psychologist left in February, 1949.

On account of this, the work of the Child Guidance Centre was discontinued during the Spring Term of 1949. Both posts have remained unfilled.

The services of the Consultant Psychiatrist were, however, available for special cases.

OPEN AIR SCHOOL.

This School provides accommodation for about 90 children.

There were 92 children attending the Open Air School in December, 1951.

Skellingthorpe Road County Infants' School—the assembly hall, kitchen and dining room were completed and the whole of the new accommodation brought into use.
