#### Scarlet Fever.

The 75 cases of Scarlet Fever occurred during the year as follows:-

With regard to the outbreak at the end of the year, it is probable that some infection was introduced into the district by the many visitors to the town. The infection was of a very mild character, in some instances a slight rash being the only symptom. Consequently, missed cases were attending school, with the result that the infection spread. The County School Medical Officers carried out several inspections of the school children and swabbing revealed both throat and nasal carriers.

#### Diphtheria.

The 10 cases of Diphtheria occurred during the year as follows:-

Two cases originated from an outside area and the remaining cases were, in general, friends and contacts with each other. No further cases occurred after the finding of a child who, on swabbing, proved to be a carrier. Vive of the cases had previously been immunised and five had not been immunised.

#### Diphtheria Immunisation.

Diptheria Immunisation has again been carried out during the year by the County Council. At the end of the year the position was as follows:-

## Food Poisoning.

In October last there was a sudden outbreak of food poisoning at two premises. On investigation it was found that all the sufferers had partaken of corned boot that originally come out of one tin. Specimens were sent to the County Laboratory and to the E.P.H. Laboratory, Oxford, and it appeared that stephylococcal contamination

was responsible for the outbreak. No further cases occurred. A report was sent to the Ministry of Health.

#### Scabies.

During the year 39 cases of Scabies were brought to the notice of the Health Department, namely:-

4 adults 29 school children

6 children under school age.

All cases were treated with Benzyl Benzoate Emulsion with satisfactory results. Clothes and bedding were disinfected by washing or hot ironing.

#### Water.

There is an abundant supply of pure water. The supply is constant and all the houses in the area are served direct. The water is not liable to have plumbo-solvent action.

12 samples of raw water and 6 samples of water after chlorination were sent for bacteriological examination. All the results were satisfactory. One sample was sent for chemical analysis and proved satisfactory.

#### Sewers.

There were no important extensions of existing sewers or disposal works made during the year.

#### Rivers and Streams.

Observations are kept on that part of the River Arun which runs through the town to prevent offal and waste materials being thrown into the river.

Sulphur Dioxide, D.D.T., Zaldecide, Vermoose, and Matafli, are used. All Woodwork, such as skirtings and picture rails, is eased away from the wall. The burning of sulphur candles and spraying with insecticide have proved very effective.

# Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919.

64 complaints were received and dealt with during the year.

Infestations were found to be mostly of a minor character, and in the majority of cases, due to the keeping of poultry etc. in back gardens. The main infestations were at the land used for controlled tipping, the Admiralty Wharf and slipway, the Railway Station and Goods Yard, and Army billets. Extermination work was carried out satisfactorily by the use of Red Squill and Zinc Phosphide and also Hydrogen Cyanide Gas. The sewers were also systematically treated.

The estimated number of rats killed was 4,016 (Ministry of Food Formula)
