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HEALTH OF LIVERPOOL
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REPORT 1881.

THE estimated population of the City for this year was 553,988, comprising 209,358 in the Parish, 110,231 in Everton, 58,915 in Kirkdale, 68,119 in West Derby, 63,965 in North Toxteth, and 43,400 in South Toxteth. The natural increase of the population during the year by the excess of births over deaths was 6,029.

The year has been one of considerable anxiety owing to the increased prevalence of fever, notably typhus; and an outbreak of small pox, which threatened a serious epidemic, but the active operations of the vaccination officers, and the facilities afforded by the Committee of the Netherfield Institution for the isolation of patients, by devoting their Wards for a time for the reception of small pox cases only, assisted very materially in staying its progress.

TYPHUS.

The extensive sanitary operations carried out during the last twenty years have greatly diminished the prevalence of fever, and an increase, though slight when compared with the condition of former times, is very disappointing, and reflects very sadly upon the character of the City. The question may naturally be asked—Why does typhus find its home in Liverpool? Are not its causes well known, and can they not be removed? Truly much has been done, and more remains to be carried out; but with the sanitary reformer there should be the social reformer, for with scarcely an exception every local outbreak is the result of “poverty, dirt, and improvidence.” There is a large and growing class amongst us who almost appear to be beyond the pale of enlightenment; they are left to themselves and forgotten, but disease fostered by their habits is apt to break through the boundaries of the unhealthy districts and spread its lethal shadow far and wide. The public should bear in mind that “as the strength of a chain is its weakest link, so the health of a community is that of the weakest member,” and as long as unhealthy areas are allowed to continue so long will the public health suffer.

Very few cases can be attributed to poverty alone, though some melancholy cases have been discovered ; but the majority of cases have been amongst those who suffer from self-inflicted poverty—people who by their improvident and dirty habits are devoid of the very necessities and decencies of life, and when attacked by disease speedily die.

The following illustrations will be of interest to the social reformer as well as to the sanitarian :—

On March 21st a death from enteric fever (no doubt typhus) was reported to have occurred at No. 2 house, 7 court, Beau Street. The tenant of the house was a gasfitter who earned plenty of money, but spent it in drink ; his wife and children were poorly clad and ill-nourished, the deceased being one of his daughters. The house was stoved on the removal of the body for interment and the bedding disinfected, a portion, however, being so filthy that it had to be destroyed. The family gradually sickened, and on April 5th the wife and two children were taken to hospital suffering from typhus, the man being too ill for removal, and dying the following day. The woman died on the 8th, one child on the 14th, and the other on the 26th of the same month.

On April 14th a case of typhus was removed to hospital from No. 10 house, 7 court, Eccles Street ; on the 20th one case from No. 11 house, and on May 5th and 7th a man and his wife from No. 8 house—all in the same court. The people were intemperate and the houses in a filthy condition, a great portion of the bedding having to be destroyed owing to its foul state. All four died. Some people, residents of 3 court, Ford Street, were friends of the sick folks in Eccles Street, and visited them. The result was five cases of typhus in No. 3 court and two deaths, and three cases at No. 14 in Ford Street. The daughter of the people at No. 11 house, 7 court, Eccles Street, was married and lived at 32a, Great Richmond Street. Communication was kept up between the houses, and the following consequences ensued :—The woman, her husband, and two lodgers in the same house were removed to hospital suffering from typhus, and three of them died. The house was very dirty, and part of the bedding had to be destroyed. The origin of many other cases was traced to the people in 7 court, Eccles Street. On April 29th it was reported that a whole family was ill at 6 house, 8 court, Oriel Street. They were found in great poverty, suffering from typhus, without any necessities, and no one to attend upon them. The father, mother, and three children were removed to hospital, and four of them died. The house was in a filthy state, and what constituted the bedding was burnt.

These illustrations might be indefinitely extended, but the above are surely sufficient to arouse the better feelings of our townsmen to the necessity of lifting

their weaker brethren from the wretched condition into which they have fallen. The difficulty, no doubt, is great, but where there is determined action it is sure to succeed.

TYPHOID FEVER.

The deaths from this disease are much below the average, and, though many instances have occurred showing the injurious effect of sewer emanations, none are more melancholy than that of Mr. Betteley and his family, at 12, Bulwer Street.

The first information of sickness existing in Bulwer Street was in the Registrar's return that a child, aged five years, had died on 29th August from peritonitis; on November 13th a child, aged eight months, died from diarrhoea; on the 18th of the same month Mr. Betteley, his wife, and one child, aged two years, were taken to the hospital suffering from typhoid fever. On the 21st the two remaining children were taken to the hospital suffering from the same disease. Mr. and Mrs. Betteley died.

The property in Bulwer Street is comparatively new, respectably tenanted, the site elevated, and the district healthy. The usual defects of the sanitary arrangements were soon discovered, and were as follows:—The junction of the closet-pan with the soil pipe was defective, the waste pipe of the bath had no plug and communicated direct with the soil pipe, having a slight bend of two or three inches for a trap, and the soil pipe going direct into the drain leading to the sewer was supposed to be ventilated by a one-inch lead pipe. There had frequently been very bad smells in the house, which Mr. Betteley endeavoured to overcome by means of disinfectants—a proceeding on which too much reliance is placed; and it cannot be too widely made known that persons finding defects in the sanitary arrangements of their houses, or experiencing any offensive odours, should send notice to the Inspector of Nuisances, when the property would be examined and proceedings taken to abate the nuisance.

SMALL POX.

There were two cases of small pox reported—one on January 7th, in West Street, and the other on February 6th, in Boaler Street—but the disease did not spread until the arrival of imported cases, which commenced on March 14th, when six cases were landed from the ship "Belvidere," and on the same day a tramp was found in the streets suffering from the disease. These were followed by the subjoined cases reported to the Office or discovered by Inspectors:—

- March 23—An emigrant in a lodging-house.
- April 7—A Spanish sailor in a lodging-house.
- „ 22—A case in 15 court, Robsart Street.
- „ 26—A man who lodged at the same house with the Spanish sailor.
- May 6—A case in Scotland Road.
- „ 9—A case in 15 court, Robsart Street.
- „ „—One case landed from ship “City of Brussels.”
- „ 20—A case in Marwood Street.
- „ 23—Three cases reported.
- „ 24—Four cases.
- „ 27—Five cases.
- „ 28—Three cases, one an emigrant.
- „ 30—Twelve cases.
- „ „—Two cases landed from ship “Wisconsin.”
- „ 31—A foreigner, who had just arrived from London.

From June 1st to end of July 164 cases were reported, and from that date to the end of the year fifty-one cases were reported, making the number of reported cases 262. Other cases no doubt occurred in private houses, of which no return was made.

At the request of the Medical Officer in May, the Committee of the Netherfield Hospital devoted it to the reception of small pox cases only, and to the middle of June all patients were sent there. As the accommodation was limited and the disease increasing, the Select Vestry and West Derby Guardians arranged, as on former occasions, that Mill Road Hospital belonging to the West Derby Guardians should be used exclusively for small pox cases, and the Select Vestry's Hospital in Brownlow Hill for fever. House to house visitation was made for the discovery of children who had not been vaccinated, and increased facilities for vaccination were offered. Isolation by removal to hospital was strongly enforced, and of the 262 cases reported 199 were taken to hospital. These measures were fortunately successful in stopping what, in the summer months, threatened to be a serious epidemic.

The mortality from the disease varied in the two hospitals, which can be accounted for by the earliest and severest cases being sent to Netherfield Road, whilst the later and milder cases were sent to Mill Road.

The number of patients in Netherfield Hospital was eighty-five, of which fifteen died, being a death rate of 17·6 per cent.; the number in Mill Road was 111, of which nine died, being 8·1 per cent.

The total deaths of all cases were thirty-four within the City, and of the

reported cases three were sent to Smithdown Road Hospital, where one died, thus making thirty-five deaths in all, or a percentage death rate of 13·3.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

The number of applications for permission to carry on various businesses, which come under the designation of offensive trades, was twenty, of which eight were granted and twelve refused.

There were two applications for licenses to slaughter cattle, both of which were refused. A deputation having waited upon the Health Committee to urge the necessity of a slaughter-house being established at 194, Wellington Road, the reconsideration of the application, together with the general subject of slaughter-houses in the City, were referred to the Medical Officer to report upon. The report contained a review of the policy of the Health Committee since its formation, its endeavour to remove the slaughter-houses outside the City, the objectionable character of such trades in the vicinity of dwelling-houses, and the opinions of a number of medical officers that such trades were injurious to health, and "in conclusion the Medical Officer respectfully observes that he entirely concurs in the opinions expressed by the medical gentlemen previously referred to; that no conditions or circumstances have arisen to necessitate the establishment of a new abattoir; that the convenience of a few should not weigh against the injury to many; that there is abundant accommodation for slaughtering animals; that this accommodation is already in excess of all requirements, and likely to increase; and, lastly, that the proposed site in Wellington Road for a new abattoir is most objectionable, being in the midst of a densely-populated district, and where it would be injurious to health."

An application was also made to the Committee to sanction plans for the erection of a new hide, skin, and fat market in Gill Street. The Medical Officer advised the Committee that, though the business was not one of those mentioned in the 112th Section of the Public Health Act, yet it was *ejusdem generis* with those trades, and would be a nuisance. The plans were not approved, and the Medical Officer was requested to report on the application, which he did as follows:—"Gill Street is situated in one of the most healthy wards, and from its geographical position should be free from those morbid influences which prevail in many districts; but, owing to the aggregation of a number of offensive trades and businesses, the epidemics of typhus and cholera were nearly as fatal in Gill Street and its neighbourhood as in the worst parts of the City.

The Corporation has expended large sums of money in purchasing property

and making alterations in the district, which has greatly improved the ventilation and lessened the sickness and mortality.

Many complaints have been made of the offensive odours emanating from the hide market already established; but as the odours are incidental to the business, and cannot be altogether obviated, the Medical Officer is to a great extent powerless in remedying the nuisance.

To test the feeling of the residents in the neighbourhood of the hide market, an inspector has visited 109 houses, and reports that the tenants of forty-nine houses complain of the bad smells, the remaining tenants being butchers or persons connected with the trade, and small shopkeepers who will not complain.

The Medical Officer would respectfully advise the Committee that the existence of slaughter-houses and the various trades connected with them in the heart of a crowded City like Liverpool is a great sanitary evil, and the establishment of an additional market for the sale and storage of hides, skins, and fat would increase the mischief and injuriously affect the public health."

INSANITARY PROPERTY.

The Town Council voted five thousand pounds for the purchase and demolition of such insanitary property as the Health Committee thought desirable; and this sum has been expended on the purchase of 128 houses, of which 117 are in possession and twelve demolished. Fifty-one houses have also been purchased under the Sixth Presentment, twenty-nine of which are in possession and ten demolished. The houses described as in possession will be demolished.

During the fifty-two weeks of the year 1881 (terminating on Saturday, December 31), the Returns of the Local Registrars record 20,762 births and 14,733 deaths within the City; the numbers for the corresponding period of the previous year, 1880, were 20,783 births and 14,811 deaths.

Of the births 10,510 were males and 10,252 were females, making the total Birth-rate of the City equal to 37.5 per 1,000; the average of the previous ten years being 38.3.

The Distribution of the births in the different wards and districts of the City has been arranged in the following table:—

DEATHS.

Of the 14,733 deaths 7,643 were of males, and 7,090 of females; 7,155 occurred in the Parish, and 7,578 in the Out-townships.

The Death-rate of the City was equal to 26.6 per 1,000. The average of the previous ten years was 28.5 per 1,000.

The following table shows the actual number of deaths registered in the Parish and Out-townships, previous to the transference to the districts from whence the patients were removed, of the deaths occurring in the Workhouses and Hospitals.

From the returns made as to the residences of persons dying in the Workhouses and Hospitals of the town, we are able to classify 2,028 of the deaths in these establishments under the wards from whence the patients were removed, viz., 463 under Scotland Ward, 221 under Vauxhall Ward, 72 under St. Paul's Ward, 114 under Exchange Ward, 264 under St. Anne's Ward, 63 under Lime Street Ward, 4 under Castle Street Ward, 20 under St. Peter's Ward, 72 under Pitt Street Ward, 82 under Great George's Ward, 74 under Rodney Street Ward, 95 under Abercromby Ward, 190 under the Out-township of Everton, 58 under that of Kirkdale, 128 under West Derby Ward, 41 under North Toxteth Ward, and 67 under South Toxteth Ward. This will leave unclassified 212 deaths of persons whose previous residences were either unknown or not specified; and these, in the absence of definite information,

have been placed in the Wards in proportion to the number of total deaths; and 158 who were residents outside the City.

The results of the alterations occasioned by this re-arrangement of the deaths in the wards and districts will be shown in the following table, from which a calculated rate of mortality per 1,000 of the estimated inhabitants has been made.

The deaths of Infants below the fifth year of their age amounted to 6,613, and thus comprised 44·9 per cent. of the whole deaths; the average number for the preceding ten years was 6,940, and the average percentage 46·9. The deaths of Infants below one year of age amounted to 3,587, or 17·3 per cent. of all the children born within the City died before attaining the age of twelve months.

The first of the following tables shows the districts where Infantile Mortality was relatively and absolutely greatest, the second table illustrates the influence of age on the death-rate of the City, and the third table places, in one connected view, the pathological history of the death registry.

ZYMOTICS.

This class of diseases occasioned 2,816 deaths during the year 1881, and accounted for 19·1 per cent. of the total mortality within the City during the same period. The average number of deaths from these diseases for the preceding ten years was 3,497, and the percentage death rate for 1881 was 4·2 per cent. less than the proportional rate of zymotic deaths to deaths from all causes during the preceding decennial period. FEVER.

Fever accounted for 292 deaths within the City of Liverpool, or for 170 in the Parish and 122 in the Out-Townships, being an increase of 36 on the previous year. (The average number of deaths for the preceding ten years was 409). The rate of its mortality was equal to 0·5 per 1,000 of the estimated population. Its percentage rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 1·6 during the first, 2·8 during the second, 1·7 during the third, and 1·9 during the fourth quarter of the year. Its annual rate relatively to deaths from all causes

was 2·0 per cent., and relatively to deaths from zymotic causes 10·4 per cent. Its deaths included 150 males and 142 females; 84 persons below the age of 15, 82 between the ages of 15 and 30, and 126 above the age of 30.

Under the term Fever every form of continued fever is included; but the registers of deaths attribute 4 cases to gastric fever, 81 to typhoid fever, 35 to enteric fever, 12 to continued fever, 2 to febris, 143 to typhus, 10 to fever, and under that of febricula 5 deaths.

The following tables are in themselves sufficiently explanatory. The first compares the averages of deaths from fever during the preceding ten years with those during 1881; the second and third tables show the districts of the town and the periods of the year in which all forms of continued fever were most fatally prevalent; the fourth marks in streets the habitats of the disease; and the remaining tables the occupations and positions of its victims.

from all causes was 2·3 per cent. in the first quarter, 1·7 in the second, 3·8 in the third, and 3·9 in the fourth quarter of the year; its annual rate relatively to all deaths was 3·0 per cent., and relatively to deaths from zymotic causes 15·4 per cent.

TUBERCULAR DISEASES.

This group of diseases includes Phthisis, Scrofula, Tabes Mesenterica, and Hydrocephalus. They occasioned 1,880 deaths in the City of Liverpool during the year 1881, of which 820 occurred in the Parish, and 1,060 in the Out-Townships. (The average number of deaths for the preceding ten years was 1,987). The death-rate was 3·4 per 1,000 of the estimated population; their percentage death-rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 12·8.

PHTHISIS.

The deaths from Phthisis amounted to 1,291, and show a gradual decrease, the average number for the preceding ten years being 1,506.

LODGING-HOUSES.

The Health Committee have, since the passing of the Sanitary Act, 1866, ruled that, as far as possible, all registered lodging-houses should have a day apartment for the accommodation of their lodgers, and that all houses where single rooms were occupied by day and night should be registered as sub-let. The space required for a night lodger in a registered lodging-house is 300 cubical feet, while the space in a sub-let house for each adult is 350 feet.

There were on the register 1,088 lodging-houses at the end of 1880, and 1,104 at the end of 1881. This difference was occasioned by the removal of 282 old licenses, and the addition of 298 new ones. The visits to lodging-houses are both by day and night. The lodging-houses of the better class, and especially those provided only with single beds for each person, and only with the number of beds equivalent to the number of lodgers allowed, are not visited at night except on grave suspicion or on complaint, or in the case of foreign emigrant lodging-houses. The night visits are pretty nearly restricted to the low districts and tramp houses. The number of day visits paid during the year was 45,640, and the night visits 6,537. The number of lodging-houses found overcrowded on the night visits was 53, the number of informations laid for breaches of the bye-laws was 164, with the results of fines in 157 cases to the extent of £33 13s., in sums varying from 1s. to 20s. and costs. The number of lodging-houses found dirty was 249; notices were served to lime-wash and cleanse.

It is necessary frequently to visit houses which are not licensed either as lodging or sub-let houses, especially when emigration is brisk or at race times. There were 2,486 such visits paid during the day, and in 48 of the cases where suspicion was confirmed they were followed up by night visits. A tenant harbouring lodgers is not taken before the Justices for the first offence, but is noticed to apply to have his rooms measured and licensed. There were 233 such notices issued during the year, but in only 10 cases did the tenants refuse to comply; they were brought before the Justices and fined. A bye-law requires that every case of infectious sickness in a lodging-house should be at once reported to the Medical Officer of Health. 49 cases of fever and 3 cases of small-pox occurred in lodging-houses; in 47 of the cases the patients were at once sent to hospital, the remaining 5, being members of the keepers' families, were not removed; 4 of these latter died. In all cases of fever or infectious disease the bedding was at once removed to the disinfecting apparatus, and the rooms purified and cleansed; in the cases where the patients remained, the licenses to receive lodgers were suspended by the Medical Officer. No

lodger died from fever or small pox in a registered lodging-house; but, not including the cases of fever, there were 148 deaths from non-contagious diseases in lodging-houses, of which 86 belonged to the keepers' families and 62 were lodgers.

SUB-LET HOUSES.

The number of sub-let Houses on the Register at the termination of 1880 was 14,188, the number registered during 1881 was 515, making the total on the Register on the 31st December, 14,703. The number of visits paid during the night was 11,982, and during the day 76,066, with the result of finding 1,415 rooms overcrowded. In addition to overcrowding, the offence (though not punishable in sub-let houses) of permitting males and females not married to occupy the same room comes under the notice, and is entered in the books of the Inspectors. There were 950 rooms thus indecently occupied by 1,427 males and 1,641 females, besides having also in these rooms 709 children between the ages of 5 and 13 years. The character of the indecent occupation may be judged of from the following facts:—In 458 instances one man and two women were found in the same bedroom; in 310 instances two men and one woman; in 71 instances two men and two women; in 51 instances one man and three women; in 31 instances three men and one woman; in 11 instances two men and three women; in six instances three men and two women; in five instances one man and four women; in three instances four men and two women; in two instances two men and four women; and in two instances one man and five women.

Informations were laid against 1,180 chief tenants for permitting overcrowding in rooms, with the following results:—5 were fined 1s; 1,017 fined 1s. and 1s. costs; 1 fined 2s. 6d. and 1s. costs; 111 fined 2s. 6d. and 2s. 6d. costs; 17 fined 5s. and 4s. 6d. costs; making a total of fines levied during the year of £137 19s. Of the remaining 29 cases, 21 informations were withdrawn and 8 acquitted, the tenants having abated the overcrowding.

LICENSES FOR CATTLE.

During the year 1881, 11 applications were made to the Health Committee for licenses to keep cows; 9 of the applications for keeping 57 cows were granted. There are at present 443 shippens licensed to keep 5,460 cows. 66 of the shippens previously licensed have been transferred to fresh tenants.

24 applications were made during the year to keep pigs in styres separate from, and unconnected with, shippens; 7 of the applications for keeping 18 pigs were granted. 31 piggeries, licensed to keep 126 pigs, have been given

up during the year. 1 piggery previously licensed has been transferred to a fresh tenant. The total number of premises or styres now licensed in the City is 129, for keeping 353 pigs.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

This Act and the orders issued under it by the Privy Council were referred to the Medical Officer to carry out in conjunction with the Veterinary Surgeon, the Inspector of Nuisances, and the Meat Inspectors. During the year Pleuro-pneumonia was found in 5 shippens, affecting 14 cows, which were slaughtered by order of the owners or of the Corporation; and 33 cows, which were not diseased, but had been either in contact with the affected ones or in the same cowsheds, were slaughtered by order of the owners.

Foot and Mouth Disease was found in 1 shippen, and only one cow was affected.

Pig Typhoid was found in one styre, where 7 young pigs died out of a stock of 10.

Of the patients removed to Hospital the following were conveyed by the Sanitary Officers:—424 cases of Fever and Scarlatina, 130 cases of Small Pox, 8 cases of Measles, and 2 cases of Diphtheria, making a total of 564 persons. 150 were taken to Netherfield Road Hospital, 342 to the Parish Workhouse Hospital, 2 to Toxteth Workhouse Hospital, 68 to West Derby Union Hospital, and 2 to Children's Infirmary, Myrtle Street.

In accordance with the arrangement made with the School Board, 2656 post cards were sent to the Head Masters of the various schools, informing them that children from infected houses attended their schools. Similar information was sent to the School Board.

DISINFECTION OF HOUSES.

In all cases of infectious disease the houses were disinfected, free of cost, with sulphurous gas, by officers appointed by the Health Committee; but whenever there was sickness in any room of the house, so as to endanger health by the use of sulphurous gas, carbolic acid powder was freely sprinkled in the rooms and passages of the house until the sulphurous gas could be used safely. No house is considered properly disinfected until sulphurous gas has been used. The existence of sickness, and the consequent employment of carbolic acid powder, necessitate many visits by the persons in charge of disinfection. There were in all 5,484 visits paid during the year to houses for the purpose of disinfection, the number of houses properly disinfected being 2,040.

SCAVENGING OPERATIONS.

The difficulty and expense in disposing of town refuse are yearly increasing, as the local tips or places of deposit are being gradually filled up or rendered unsuitable by the erection of dwelling houses in their proximity. Until very recently it has been possible to get rid of a large quantity of the less objectionable ashpit refuse, and Macadam in disused quarries, clay-pits, &c., but this has now to be sent into the country, where the places of deposit, within a moderate distance of the city, are also being gradually closed.

The town is divided for scavenging purposes into North and South districts. The total amount of unsaleable refuse collected during the year was 226,597 tons, which was disposed of as follows:—86,276 tons were deposited at the Northern tips, and 68,171 tons sent by canal into the country, 11,444 tons were deposited at the Southern tips, 56,429 tons sent out to sea by the steam hopper barge, and 4,277 tons sent away into Cheshire and up the Lancashire canal during periods when the barge was laid up for repairs, or could not work through stress of weather. After two years experience the steam hopper barge "Alpha" is found to be the cheapest and most efficacious method for the disposal of all unsaleable refuse. The "Alpha" made 156 trips during the year, giving an exact average of three per week; and the average of her cargoes, calculated by displacement, was 360 tons. The cost per ton for sending the refuse thirty miles out to sea was an average of 1s. 3½d., which contrasts very favourably with the cost by canal, which averages 2s. 2d. per ton. The cost may be further slightly reduced by the provision of proper landing appliances.

Having regard to the daily increasing quantity to be sent up the canal, and the extra cost incurred by canal as against sea carriage, the Scavenging Committee have under consideration the advisability of procuring a second steam hopper barge to work the Northern division.

The scavenging operations have been well and efficiently conducted during the year; and a detailed statement of this great work is given in the following tables, which have been kindly supplied by the Veterinary Superintendent, Mr. Richard S. Reynolds, M.R.C.V.S., who has charge of the scavenging department:—
