REPORT, 1886.

During the year, 13,716 inhabitants of the City died, and 203 persons, whose residences were outside, died within the City, making the total number of deaths 13,919. The number of births was 19,559, giving a natural increase of population of 5,843. The estimated increase was 6,671, being 828 more than the excess of births over deaths, but would comprise unrecorded births, and the immigration of strangers who take up their residence here.

The death-rate for the year was 23.7 per 1,000, the same as in the previous year. This rate is obtained by dividing the total number of deaths 13,919, by the estimated population 586,320, who may be considered permanent residents. No allowance is made for a large floating population, who are constantly passing through the city, and in case of sickness are detained either in hospitals, hotels, or lodging houses. There is no return of the persons who leave the Port, unless they are going to places out of Europe. The number of emigrants who left during the year was 191,491, but there is no return of the number who arrived by ships from foreign countries, or coastwise. This floating population has a serious effect upon the health of the community by introducing Zymotic disease, and renders constant watchfulness necessary to detect the earliest outbreaks of sickness and prevent its extension. Many epidemic visitations have had this origin.

The density of the population has also a powerful effect in spreading disease, and were it not for the constant supervision exercised by the Sanitary staff, there would be an increase instead of a decrease in the prevalence of Zymotic disease.

The City has an area, including docks, quays, &c., of 5,210 acres, and the population per acre is 112.5, being far in excess of any other city or

town. Glasgow is next to Liverpool and has 85.4 per acre, followed by Manchester with 63.6 and London 55.

Notwithstanding the many disadvantages, there is a gradual and remarkable improvement in public health. The death-rate 23.7 is 2.9 per 1,000 less than the average rate for the last ten years (1876 to 1885), and 7.1 less than the previous 10 years (1866 to 1875).

The deaths from Zymotic causes amounted to 2,212, being 311 less than in 1885, and 757 below the average of the last ten years, and the lowest number recorded in any year since 1860, when the population was in round numbers 440,000.

If there is to be any further reduction in mortality from Zymotic disease, it is necessary that proper hospital accommodation should be provided for the isolation of the earliest cases, and not depend upon the hospital attached to the Brownlow Hill Workhouse, where the majority of the patients have been taken, and which is now required by the Select Vestry for the accommodation of paupers. There is every probability that the use of this hospital will not be much longer granted to the Corporation, and the City will then be deprived of 160 beds for the treatment and isolation of infectious cases. To meet this loss and the requirements of a population of nearly 600,000 persons, the only proposition before the Council is to provide a new hospital in Grafton Street, with 68 beds, and alter Netherfield Road Hospital so as to provide 80 beds, thus, conjointly, giving only 148 beds to prevent the extension of epidemic disease, and protect the public health. The Medical Officer has, over and over again, reported on the necessity of providing proper hospital accommodation, and he is much afraid tha

little or nothing will be done until the outbreak of a serious epidemic occurs, when everyone but those who have retarded the work will be blamed and a large sum of money wasted, as it always is in periods of panic.

SMALLPOX.

This disease, which had prevailed more or less since 1883, gradually subsided, the number of cases having fallen from 73 in January to 4 in December. The long continuance of Smallpox in the City affords another illustration of the introduction of disease, and the danger which constantly threatens the inhabitants. Smallpox assumed an epidemic character in November, 1883, when there were 14 cases, and rapidly increased until it reached the highest point in June, 1884, with 189. From this period, owing to the removal and isolation of the sick, the disease rapidly declined until the following summer, when it was thought the epidemic had ceased, as only three cases were reported in August, 1885. In the following month, September, vessels began to arrive from Montreal, where a severe epidemic of Smallpox prevailed, having the disease on board; and when reported, the patients were removed to hospital, but, unfortunately, the commanders of some ships denied the presence of sickness, and allowed infected persons to land without the slightest precautions, and, consequently, the disease soon manifested itself not only in the City, but in Birkenhead and Bootle. In September there were 9 cases, October, 15, and the greatest number, 80, in Novem-The Medical Officer reported the conduct of the ships' officers to the Customs and Board of Trade, and, subsequently, more information was given to his department.

MEASLES caused comparatively few deaths, 273, the average of the preceding ten years being 518, and 716 in 1885, when the disease was epidemic. It is much to be regretted that the public look upon this disease as of little importance, considering the number of deaths it causes, the sufferings inflicted upon children, and the great pecuniary loss incurred in payment of expenses attendant upon sickness and funerals. If proper hospital accommodation were provided the severity of epidemic visitations would be diminished, and a large number of lives saved.

SCARLATINA caused 277 deaths, being 83 more than in 1885, while the average for the preceding ten years was 421.

In the first seven months of the year there were fewer cases, 498, than usually reported, and 70 deaths. In August the disease rapidly increased, 1,250 cases being reported in the remaining five months with 207 deaths. By seeking out the cases, and removing them to Hospital, the threatened epidemic was fortunately checked, but the utmost extent of hospital accommodation was reached, the Brownlow Hill Hospital being filled by the middle of September.

DIARRHŒA.—The deaths from this disease were above the average, being 781, while the average for ten years was 658, and for the preceding year, 1885, when the number of deaths was 422.

During the fifty-two weeks of the year 1886, (terminating on Saturday, January 1st, 1887), the Returns of the Local Registrars recorded 19,559 births and 13,919 deaths within the City; the numbers for the corresponding period of the previous year, 1885, were 19,464 births and 13,764 deaths.

Of the births 9,943 were males and 9,616 were females, making the total Birth-rate of the City equal to 33.4 per 1,000; the average of the previous ten years being 37.1.

DEATHS.

Of the 13,919 deaths 7,142 were of males, and 6,777 of females; 5,915 occurred in the Parish, and 8,004 in the Out-townships.

The Death-rate of the City was equal to 23.7 per 1,000. The average of the previous ten years was 26.6 per 1,000.

The following table shows the actual number of deaths registered in the Parish and Out-townships previous to the transference to the districts from whence the patients were removed, of the deaths occurring in the Workhouses and Hospitals. The Death-rate of the Parish was equal to 30.5, and that of the Out-townships to 20.4 per 1,000 of the population.

From the returns made as to the residences of persons dying in the Workhouses and Hospitals of the town, we are able to classify 1,995 of the deaths in these establishments under the Wards from whence the patients were removed, viz.:—396 under Scotland Ward, 152 under Vauxhall Ward, 64 under St. Paul's Ward, 87 under Exchange Ward, 267 under St. Anne's Ward, 69 under Lime Street Ward, 3 under Castle Street Ward, 22 under St. Peter's Ward, 64 under Pitt Street Ward, 75 under Great George's Ward, 80 under Rodney Street Ward, 84 under Abercromby Ward, 265 under the Out-township of Everton, 71 under that of Kirkdale, 151 under West Derby Ward, 63 under North Toxteth Ward, and 82 under South Toxteth Ward. This will leave unclassified 182 deaths of persons whose previous residences were either unknown or not specified; and these, in the absence of definite information, have been placed in the Wards in proportion to the number of total deaths; and 203 who were residents outside the City.

The results of the alterations occasioned by this re-arrangement of the deaths in the wards and districts will be shown in the following table, from which a calculated rate of mortality per 1,000 of the estimated inhabitants has been made. The rates are calculated upon a population increasing or decreasing in the same ratio as between 1871 and 1881, and may not be correct as regards the Wards, but will approximate the true rate of the whole City.

The deaths of Infants below the fifth year of their age amounted to 6,152, and thus comprised 44.2 per cent. of the whole deaths; the average number for the preceding ten years was 6,726, and the average percentage 46.1. The

deaths of Infants below one year of age amounted to 3,670, or 18.8 per cent. of all the children born within the City died before attaining the age of twelve months.

The first of the following tables shows the districts where Infantile Mortality was relatively and absolutely greatest, the second table illustrates the influence of age on the death-rate of the City, and the third table places, in one connected view, the pathological history of the death registry.

This class of diseases occasioned 2,212 deaths during the year 1886, and accounted for 15.9 per cent. of the total mortality within the City during the same period. The average number of deaths from these diseases for the preceding ten years was 2,969, and the percentage death rate for 1886 was 4.4 per cent. less than the proportional rate of zymotic deaths to deaths from all causes during the preceding decennial period. FEVER.

Fever accounted for 198 deaths within the City of Liverpool, or for 93 in the Parish and 105 in the Out-Townships, being an increase of 16 on the previous year. (The average number of deaths for the preceding ten years was 347.) The rate of its mortality was equal to 0.3 per 1,000 of the estimated population. Its percentage rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 1.1 during the first, 1.2 during the second, 1.5 during the third, 1.9 during the fourth quarter of the year. Its annual rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 1.4 per cent., and relatively to deaths from zymotic causes 9.0 per cent. Its deaths included 100 males and 98 females; 48 persons below the age of 15, 74 between the ages of 15 and 30, and 76 above the age of 30.

Under the term Fever every form of continued fever is included; but the registers of deaths attribute 7 cases to gastric fever, 85 to typhoid fever, 48 to enteric fever, 3 to continued fever, 1 to low fever, 47 to typhus, 3 to fever,

I to relapsing fever, and under that of febricula 3 deaths.

The following tables are in themselves sufficiently explanatory. The first compares the averages of deaths from fever during the preceding ten years with those during 1886; the second and third tables show the districts of the town and the periods of the year in which all forms of continued fever were most fatally prevalent; the fourth marks in streets the habitats of the disease, and the remaining tables the occupations and positions of its victims.

Its rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 1.0 per cent. in the first quarter, 0.7 in the second, 1.7 in the third, and 4.3 in the fourth quarter of the year; its annual rate relatively to all deaths was 2.0 per cent., and relatively to deaths from zymotic causes 12.5 per cent.

TUBERCULAR DISEASES.

This group of diseases includes Phthisis, Scrofula, Tabes Mesenterica, and Hydrocephalus. They occasioned 1,886 deaths in the City of Liverpool during the year 1886, of which 785 occurred in the Parish, and 1,101 in the Out-Townships. (The average number of deaths for the preceding ten years was 1,934). The death-rate was 3.2 per 1,000 of the estimated population; their percentage death-rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 13.5.

PHTHISIS.

The deaths from Phthisis amounted to 1,329, the average number for the preceding ten years being 1,375.

LODGING-HOUSES.

The Health Committee have, since the passing of the Sanitary Act, 1866, ruled that, as far as possible, all registered lodging-houses should have a day apartment for the accommodation of their lodgers, and that all houses where single rooms were occupied by day and night should be registered as sub-let. The space required for a night lodger in a registered lodging-house is 300 cubical feet, while the space in a sub-let house for each adult is 350 feet.

There were on the register 949 lodging-houses at the end of 1885, and 902 at the end of 1886. This difference was occasioned by the removal of 339 old licences, and the addition of 292 new ones. The visits to lodging-houses are both by day and night. The lodging-houses of the better class, and especially those provided with only single beds for each person, and only with the number of beds equivalent to the number of lodgers allowed, are not visited at night except on grave suspicion or on complaint, or in the case of foreign emigrant lodging houses. The night visits are pretty nearly restricted to the low districts and tramp houses. The number of day visits paid durin

the year was 41,946, and the night visits 5,736. The number of lodging-houses found overcrowded on the night visits was 26, the number of informations laid for breaches of the bye-laws was 93, with the results of fines in 88 cases to the extent of £19 8s. 6d., in sums varying from 1s. to 20s. and costs. The number of lodging-houses found dirty was 203; notices were served to lime-wash and cleanse.

It is necessary frequently to visit houses which are not licensed either as lodging or sub-let houses, especially when emigration is brisk or at race times. There were 2,668 such visits paid during the day, and in 34 of the cases where suspicion was confirmed they were followed up by night visits. A tenant harbouring lodgers is not taken before the Justices for the first offence, but is noticed to apply to have his rooms measured and licensed. There were 234 such notices issued during the year, but in only 8 cases did the tenants refuse to comply; they were brought before the Justices and fined. requires that every case of infectious sickness in a lodging-house should be at once reported to the Medical Officer of Health. 13 cases of fever and 6 cases of small-pox occurred in lodging houses; in 15 of the cases the patients were at once sent to hospital, the remaining 4, being members of the keepers' families, were not removed; all of these latter died. In all cases of fever or infectious disease the bedding was at once removed to the disinfecting apparatus, and the rooms purified and cleansed; in the cases where the patients remained, the licenses to receive lodgers were suspended by the Medical Officer. No lodger died from fever or small-pox in a registered lodging-house; but, not including the cases of fever and small-pox, there were 92 deaths from non-contagious diseases in lodging-houses, of which 66 belonged to the keepers' families and 26 were lodgers.

SUB-LET HOUSES.

The number of sub-let Houses on the Register at the termination of 1885 was 19.467; the number registered during 1886 was 1,289, making the total on the Register on the 31st December, 20,756. The number of visits paid during the night was 17,593, and during the day 114,716, with the result of finding 2,202 rooms overcrowded. In addition to overcrowding, the offence (though not punishable in sub-let houses) of permitting males and females not married to occupy the same room comes under the notice and is entered in the books of the Inspectors. There were 777 rooms thus indecently occupied by 1,173 males and 1,337 females, besides having also in these rooms 461 children between the ages of 5 and 13 years. The character of the indecent occupation

may be judged of from the following facts:—In 406 instances one man and two women were found in the same bedroom; in 216 instances two men and one woman; in fifty-two instances three men and one woman; in forty-eight instances two men and two women; in thirty-eight instances one man and three women; in twelve instances two men and three women; in one instance one man and four women; in one instance four men and one woman; in one instance three men and two women; in one instance nine men and one woman; and in one instance four men and three women.

Informations were laid against 1,684 chief tenants for permitting overcrowding in rooms, with the following results:—1,574 fined 1s. and 1s. costs; 6 fined 2s. and 1s. costs; 6 fined 2s. and 2s. costs; 73 fined 2s. 6d. and 2s. 6d. costs; 7 fined 5s. and 4s. 6d. costs; 1 fined 10s. and 4s. 6d. costs; making a total of fines levied during the year of £181 16s. 0d. Of the remaining 17 cases, 12 informations were withdrawn and 5 acquitted, the tenants having abated the overcrowding.

BAKEHOUSES.

7,063 visits have been made to Bakehouses during the year. 628 Bakehouses were found dirty, and notices were served to limewash and cleanse them.

LICENSES FOR CATTLE.

During the year 1886, 10 applications were made to the Health Committee for licenses to keep cows; 7 of the applications for keeping 56 cows were granted. There are at present 423 shippons licensed to keep 5,737 cows. 65 of the shippons previously licensed have been transferred to fresh tenants.

8 applications were made during the year to keep pigs in styes separate from and unconnected with shippons, none of which were granted. The total number of premises or styes now licensed in the City is 57, for keeping 167 pigs.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

This Act and the Orders issued under it by the Privy Council were referred to the Medical Officer to carry out, in conjunction with the Veterinary Inspector, the Inspector of Nuisances, and the Meat Inspectors.

On the 1st October the Meat and Cattle Inspectors were transferred from the Nuisance to the Medical Officer's Department, to carry on their work under the supervision of Dr. Hope, the Assistant Medical Officer. During the year pleuro pneumonia was found in 6 cowsheds, affecting 47 cows, 46 of which were slaughtered by order of the owners or of the Corporation, and 1 died; 40 cows, which were not diseased, but had been either in contact with the affected ones or in the same cowsheds, were slaughtered by order of the owners.

The Meat Inspectors found in the slaughter-houses the carcases of 3 cows, which the Veterinary Inspector certified, on examination of the lungs, to have suffered from pleuro pneumonia. These cows were brought to the slaughter-houses from different places outside the city. The local authorities of the districts from which the animals came were immediately informed of the circumstances.

Pig typhoid was found on one premises, affecting twelve pigs, all of which were slaughtered by order of the owner.

Pig typhoid was detected in 21 pigs, 17 in the slaughter-houses and 4 in Gill Street Market, the diseased animals having been imported from Ireland.

CANAL BOATS.

The following Report as to the execution of the Canal Boats Acts 1877 and 1884 was sent to the Local Government Board.

During the year 1886, ten new boats were registered, and twenty-one were re-registered on account of change of owner, or loss of certificate of registration.

The number of Boats on the register is 400, of which 86 have been reregistered, viz.:—5 in 1884, 60 in 1885, and 21 in 1886.

The number of visits paid during the year to the Canal Boats was 4,952. It was found necessary to lay informations in 15 cases; in six for using boats as dwellings without being registered, in six for carrying offensive cargoes in boats used as dwellings, and not having a second bulkhead; and in three for not producing certificate of registration when requested. Fines were imposed by the Magistrates in all the cases.

Besides the above, the cabins of six boats were found dirty, when notices were served on the owners, who had them at once cleaned and repainted.

The cabins of fourteen boats were found insufficiently ventilated, which the owners remedied on receiving notice.

There has been no case of infectious disease on any of the boats while in that part of the Canal under the supervision of the Liverpool Authority.

MORTUARIES.

During the year 51 bodies were, by order of the Justices on the certificate of the Medical Officer, removed to the Mortuaries provided by the Council under Section 142 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

Of the patients removed to Hospital the following were conveyed by the Sanitary Officers:—386 cases of Fever, 292 cases of Scarlatina, 192 cases of Small Pox, 30 cases of Measles, 11 cases of Diphtheria, and 6 cases of Chicken Pox, making a total of 917 persons. 194 were taken to Netherfield Road Hospital, 529 to the Parish Workhouse Hospital, and 194 to the City Hospital, Park Hill.

In accordance with the arrangements made with the School Board, 2,332 post cards were sent to the Head Masters of the various schools, informing them that children from infected houses attended their schools. Similar information was sent to the School Board.

DISINFECTION OF HOUSES.

In all cases of infectious disease the houses were disinfected, free of cost, with sulphurous gas, by Officers appointed by the Health Committee, but whenever there was sickness in any room of the house, so as to endanger health by the use of sulphurous gas, carbolic acid powder was freely sprinkled in the rooms and passages of the house until the sulphurous gas could be used safely. No house is considered properly disinfected until sulphurous gas has been used. The existence of sickness, and the consequent employment of carbolic acid powder, necessitate many visits by the persons in charge of disinfection. There were in all 5,710 visits paid during the year to houses for the purpose of disinfection, the number of houses properly disinfected being 2,062.

SCAVENGING OPERATIONS.

As evidence of the satisfactory way in which the Scavenging work is done, and the beneficial effects resulting from it, the Medical Officer has much pleasure in submitting some extracts from a Report, drawn up by a Commission sent over from France to enquire into the various methods employed in English towns for the removal or destruction of refuse material.

EXTRACTS:

"The work of the last 25 or 30 years has altered the sanitary condition of Liverpool from top to bottom completely; without entering in detail upon the various works undertaken, such as the construction of sewers, the filling up of cesspools, the rendering wholesome of houses by the regulation of middens, closets, and ashpits, suffice it to say that to-day, Liverpool is, if not the cleanest, one of the cleanest and best cared for towns in England."

"The magnitude of the evil led, without hesitation, to the adoption of the best measures."

"In short, the Corporation of Liverpool have held in view, less the maximum utilisation of refuse, than its rapid and complete removal. The Sanitary aspects have been kept in the foreground, and the results have speedily repaid the intelligent efforts of the Council."

"In confirmation of this it is only necessary to quote the death-rate, which has gradually fallen from 36 in 1850, down to 23.7 per 1,000 in 1885. This is less than Manchester and Newcastle-on-Tyne, whose figures of mortality have only fallen to 26.4 and 26.0, but it is still a little higher than London, where the death-rate is only 19.6 per 1,000 inhabitants."

The following tables have been compiled by the Veterinary Superintendent, Mr. Richard S. Reynolds, M.R.C.V.S., who has charge of the scavenging staff, and under whose superintendence the work has, as usual, been well and satisfactorily conducted.
