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REPORT, 1890.



The estimated population for the year, calculated on the rate of increase between 1871 and 1881, was 613,463, and is probably slightly in excess of the actual number; not that there is any falling off in the natural increase of the people, but, owing to the want of sufficient accommodation within the city, they have removed into the suburbs beyond the boundary, which, though under the control of Local Boards are part and parcel of Liverpool, and are not included in this Report.

The area of the City and County of Liverpool contains 5,210 acres, with a density of population of 117.7 per acre, but deducting the 733 acres occupied by the docks and quays, which include the entire river frontage, the density would be 137 per acre. This density cannot possibly be increased, as there is now very little land in the city uncovered by buildings, and the natural outgrowth of the population is into the suburbs.

The total number of deaths for the year terminating January 3rd, 1891, consisting of 53 weeks, was 14,687 or 23.6 per 1,000 of the population, and the number of births for the same period was 17,972, or 28.8 per 1,000.

It is usual, for the purpose of comparison, to take the first fifty-two weeks as constituting the year, thus enabling us to compare and prepare averages for a series of years composed of the same number of weeks.

The rate for 1890 was 1.8 higher than the previous year, and 1.2 less than the average rate for the last ten years (1880 to 1889), and 5.6 less than the average of the previous ten years (1870 to 1879).

The total number of deaths (14,293) including 225 of persons whose residences were outside the City, was 1,246 more than in 1889. increased mortality was not due to any local cause, but was attributable to an influence operating over the whole country, which probably had its origin in the introduction of Influenza into London in December, 1889. The course of the Influenza epidemic was from east to west, beginning in Russia about the end of October; it appeared in Germany and France in November, and in London in December. Whether the disease was carried by the wind, which in some instances appeared to have favoured its spread, or by human intercourse, promoted by the migration from east to west, has been much discussed; but the most frequent exciting cause was contact either with the sick or articles used by them, and the disease once imported spread rapidly amongst people residing near the affected. In some cities, as in London, Paris, Berlin, &c., the epidemic affected large portions of the population, and the mortality was very great. Liverpool was fortunate in escaping an epidemic outbreak, for many cases were imported from London, and there was no diffusion of the disease, though, doubtless, there was a morbific influence in operation, which rendered diseases of the lungs more fatal; yet there was not that contagiousness about it which marked the disease in London and other large cities, only eight deaths being certified as directly due to the disease. There is every reason to believe that Influenza, like Measles, has a specific organism as its cause, and requires a special soil for its growth, without which it cannot exist. Why Liverpool, with its dense population, should have escaped so lightly and other cities suffered so severely, is not easy to determine, for in previous visitations we have suffered severely, and its effects were felt in a long-continued high death rate. The appended table gives the number of total deaths, deaths from lung diseases and Phthisis, and the mean temperature of the weeks during which the influence of Influenza was operating, though it must be acknowledged that the number of total deaths and deaths from lung diseases are not greater than we have had in many cold seasons. The increased prevalence of Measles in the first part of the year, and an epidemic of Scarlatina during six months, contributed towards the higher death rate.

THE INFECTIOUS DISEASE (NOTIFICATION) ACT, 1889.

The above Act was adopted by the Corporation, and came into operation on 1st September. Previous to that date the Medical Officer had been in communication with the Medical Institution, as representing the profession, and to obviate any difficulties that might arise, the following form of notification was decided upon, to which is appended a supplementary and optional form. By filling up the supplementary form the Medical Attendant secures his patients from the annoyance arising from the visits of the Sanitary Inspectors, unless requested, and enables the Inspectors to devote more time to other duties.

The date for notifying had been deferred, unfortunately, until an outbreak of Scarlatina, which commenced in June, had spread and assumed an epidemic character; and this was further complicated by the insufficient hospital accommodation then provided. The value of notification was well illustrated by the positive knowledge conveyed of the existence of disease, after the Act had come into operation, when compared with the limited information previously obtained, and all the fears of innumerable troubles and disasters which were to follow its adoption vanished into the thin air, and are now never heard of.

The total number of infectious cases brought under the notice of the Medical Officer from the 1st of January to the 31st August was 1,914, or an average of 239 per month. The number of notifications received by the Medical Officer during

HOSPITALS.

The want of sufficient hospital accommodation was very much felt at the commencement of the epidemic of Scarlatina, for many patients were left at home, to be centres for the spread of disease, who ought to have been removed and isolated in hospital. When this fact became apparent to the Committee instructions were given for the erection of two more pavilions at Parkhill, capable of housing fifty patients, which, with some alterations in the other buildings, were sufficient to meet the pressing want, and afforded facilities for controlling the epidemic, which soon subsided on the more perfect isolation of the patients. The number of patients taken to hospital and the percentage mortality of the different diseases are set out in the appended tables.

Besides the above patients, the Select Vestry kindly allowed their hospital at Brownlow Hill to be used for cases of Measles, of which 143 were taken there.

ZYMOTIC DISEASE.

The deaths from Zymotic causes during the year were 2,459, being 96 more than in the previous year, and 171 below the average of the last ten years.

SMALLPOX.

There were only two cases of this disease reported during the year, and they were both imported by ships, and recovered. No inhabitant of the City suffered from it.

SCARLATINA.

This disease was the most prevalent and fatal of all the Zymotic diseases. It assumed an epidemic character in June, when 228 cases were reported, and reached its maximum in September, during which month 686 cases came under the notice of the Medical Officer.

The total number of persons suffering from Scarlatina was 3,520, of which 938 were removed to hospital. The number of deaths was 577, or 16·3 per cent. of the total cases reported, while of the 957 patients treated in the hospital, 100 died, or 10·4 per cent. The difference between 938 patients returned as having been removed to hospital, and 957 given as under treatment in hospital, arises from patients being sent from districts outside the City, and from patients being removed for some other supposed Zymotic disease, and subsequently developing Scarlatina.

MEASLES.

This disease was very prevalent, and fatal from being complicated with Pulmonary affections in the first six months of the year, in consequence of the prevailing low temperature and the want of proper care and attention to the young sufferers.

This great mortality of 535 infants would be very much lessened if hospital accommodation was provided for them, but at present the few patients who are removed are taken to the hospital of the Select Vestry in Brownlow Hill. In some towns Measles is one of the diseases notified and hospital provision made for it, and it is only a question of time when the same course will be adopted in Liverpool.

DIPHTHERIA.

The number of deaths from this disease was nearly double the number of the previous year, and the deaths (104) were nearly half of the total number of cases reported (212). The increased prevalence of this disease may be accounted for by the large number of children whose fauces had been rendered peculiarly adapted for the growth of the Diphtheritic Bacilli by the epidemics of Measles and Scarlatina. It is also possible that many cases which would formerly have been reported as Croup, are now returned as Diphtheria, and this view is strengthened by the decrease in the reported number of deaths from Croup, which were 46 below the average of the last ten years, and 71 lower than the average for the ten years 1870 to 1879.

FEVER.

In the returns made to the Registrar General all forms of Fever are arranged under one head, and include Typhus, Enteric or Typhoid, and Febricula. The total number of deaths reported (123) was the lowest number ever recorded in any one year, and was 160 below the average of the last ten years.

There were reported to the Medical Officer 690 cases of Fever, including 103 Typhus, 506 Typhoid, and 81 simple continued Fever.

87 Typhus patients, 296 Typhoid, and 63 simple were taken to hospital.

The total number of deaths registered was 123, inclusive of Typhus, 23; Typhoid, 99; Simple Continued, 1.

The following table illustrates the gradual decline of what was for years a standing reproach to the Municipal Government of Liverpool. Occasional outbreaks of Typhus amongst the most wretched portion of our population must be looked for, but the early removal of the sufferers to hospital, and disinfection of the houses and clothing, has the effect of entirely preventing its extension. With Typhoid there is greater difficulty, which is found to arise in many instances from the belief some persons entertain as to its non-contagious character. Granting that it is not contagious to the same degree as typhus, yet we do find case succeeding case which could have had no other origin than contagion.

CANCER.

All deaths from malignant growths are entered under the one definition, "Cancer."

Year by year this disease claims more and more victims, and though increased knowledge and correct diagnosis may add somewhat to the number, yet the yearly increase in the deaths from this disease requires some other explanation than it is possibe at present to give. The number of deaths (334) was the largest ever recorded.

During the fifty-two weeks of the year 1890 (terminating on Saturday, December 27th, 1890), the Returns of the Local Registrars recorded 17,592 births and 14,293 deaths within the City; the numbers for the corresponding period of the previous year, 1889, were 17,676 births and 13,047 deaths.

Of the births 9,066 were males and 8,526 were females, making the total Birth-rate of the City equal to 28.7 per 1,000; the average of the previous ten years being 33.9.

DEATHS.

Of the 14,293 deaths 7,251 were of males, and 7,042 of females.

The Death-rate of the City was equal to 23.3 per 1,000. The average of the previous ten years was 24.5 per 1,000.

From the returns made as to the residences of persons dying in the Workhouses and Hospitals of the town, we are able to classify 2,016 of the deaths in these establishments under the Wards from whence the patients were removed, viz.:—401 under Scotland Ward, 90 under Vauxhall Ward, 54 under St. Paul's Ward, 65 under Exchange Ward, 291 under St. Anne's Ward, 69 under Lime Street Ward, 4 under Castle Street Ward, 33 under St. Peter's Ward, 82 under Pitt Street Ward, 86 under Great George's Ward, 77 under Rodney Street Ward, 84 under Abercromby Ward, 272 under Everton, 81 under Kirkdale, 146 under West Derby Ward, 103 under North Toxteth Ward, and 78 under South Toxteth Ward. This will leave unclassified 111 deaths of persons whose previous residences were either unknown or not specified; and these, in the absence of definite information, have been placed in the Wards in proportion to the number of total deaths; and 225 who were residents outside the city.

The results of the alterations occasioned by this re-arrangement of the deaths in the wards and districts will be shown in the following table, from which a calculated rate of mortality per 1,000 of the estimated inhabitants has been made. The rates are calculated upon a population increasing or decreasing in the same ratio as between 1871 and 1881, and may not be correct as regards the Wards, but will approximate the true rate of the whole City.

The deaths of Infants below five years of age amounted to 6,319, and thus comprised 44.2 per cent. of the whole deaths; the average number for the preceding ten years was 6,369, and the average percentage 45.2. The deaths of Infants below one year of age amounted to 3,438, or 19.5 per cent. of all the children born within the city, died before attaining the age of twelve months.

The first of the following tables shows the districts where Infantile Mortality was relatively and absolutely greatest, the second table illustrates the influence of age on the death-rate of the city, and the third table places, in one connected view, the pathological history of the death registry.

ZYMOTICS.

This class of diseases occasioned 2,459 deaths during the year 1890, and accounted for 17.2 per cent. of the total mortality within the City during the same period. The average number of deaths from these diseases for the preceding ten years was 2,630, and the percentage death rate for 1890 was 1.4 per cent. less than the proportional rate of zymotic deaths to deaths from all causes during the preceding decennial period. FEVER.

Fever accounted for 123 deaths within the City of Liverpool, being a decrease of 89 on the previous year. (The average number of deaths for the preceding ten years was 283.) The rate of its mortality was equal to 0.2 per 1,000 of the estimated population. Its percentage rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 0.6 during the first, 0.9 during the second, 1.0 during the third, and 1.0 during the fourth quarter of the year. Its annual rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 0.9 per cent., and relatively to deaths from zymotic causes 5.0 per cent. Its deaths included 69 males and 54 females; 40 persons below the age of 15; 33 between the ages of 15 and 30; and 50 above the age of 30.

Under the term Fever every form of continued fever is included; but the registers of deaths attribute 1 case to gastric fever, 65 to typhoid fever, 33

to enteric fever, 23 to typhus, and 1 to continued fever.

The following tables are in themselves sufficiently explanatory. The first compares the averages of deaths from fever during the preceding ten years with those during 1890; the second and third tables show the districts of the town and the periods of the year in which all forms of continued fever were most fatally prevalent; the fourth marks in streets the habitats of the disease, and the remaining tables the occupations and positions of its victims.

The rate of its mortality was equal to 0.9 per 1000 of the estimated population. Its rate relatively to deaths from all causes was 1.6 per cent. in the first quarter, 3.4 in the second, 5.5 in the third, and 6.0 in the fourth quarter of the year; its annual rate relatively to all deaths was 4.0 per cent., and relatively to deaths from zymotic causes 23.5 per cent.

LIVERPOOL SANITARY AMENDMENT ACT, 1864.

TENTH PRESENTMENT.

On the 28th of February the Medical Officer of Health delivered a Report to the Town Clerk in accordance with the above Act, specifying a number of houses which, in his opinion, ought to be demolished. This Report was laid before the Council on the 5th March, and it was resolved that a copy should be sent to the Clerk of the Peace, to be placed before the Grand Jury at the next Quarter Sessions.

On the 21st day of April the Grand Jury considered the Report, and having taken evidence for and against it, a deputation of their body with the Foreman visited the various properties, and then made a presentment that the various houses should be demolished in accordance with the Medical Officer's Report, being unfit for human habitation.

The houses were situated back to back, either in courts from seven to eleven feet wide, or immediately abutting on such courts, and could not be ventilated, sunlight never entered them, and for years had been notorious for a high death rate.

THE STAFF OF INSPECTORS UNDER THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

The inspection and registering of lodging houses, sub-let houses, canal boats, and bakehouses are carried out under the special directions of the Medical Officer, as well as the disinfection of infected houses, the granting of licenses for keeping cattle, and the registration of dairies, cowsheds and milk shops. For these purposes the Medical Officer has a staff consisting of one Chief Inspector, ten Inspectors for lodging houses, one for canal boats, one for bakehouses, two for disinfection, and one for milk shops.

The constant supervision of lodging houses is equally as necessary to secure cleanliness as to prevent overcrowding, and for this purpose an additional clause in the bye-laws has been obtained to secure the cleansing of the floors of houses, which were found to be sadly neglected and often in a filthy condition. The enforcement of this bye-law has had a beneficial effect upon the inhabitants in rousing them from that dirty lethargic condition into which they are too apt to fall.

LODGING-HOUSES.

The Health Committee have, since the passing of the Sanitary Act, 1866, ruled that, as far as possible, all registered lodging-houses should have a day apartment for the accommodation of their lodgers, and that all houses where single rooms were occupied by day and night should be registered as sub-let. The space required for a night lodger in a registered lodging-house is 300 cubical feet, while the space in a sub-let house for each adult is 350 feet.

There were on the register 833 lodging-houses at the end of 1889, and 813 at the end of 1890. This difference was occasioned by the removal of 253 old licences, and the addition of 233 new ones. The visits to lodging-houses are both by day and night. The lodging-houses of the better class, and especially those provided with only single beds for each person, and only with the number of beds equivalent to the number of lodgers allowed, are not visited at night except on grave suspicion or on complaint, or in the case of foreign emigrant lodging houses. The night visits are pretty nearly restricted to the low districts and tramp houses. The number of day visits paid during the year was 33,741, and the night visits 5,437. The number of lodging-houses found overcrowded on the night visits was 13, the number of informations laid for breaches of the bye-laws was 91, with the results of fines in 88 cases to the extent of £11 14s. 6d., in sums varying from 1s. to 5s. and and costs. The number of lodging-houses found dirty was 133; notices were served to lime-wash and cleanse.

It is necessary frequently to visit houses which are not licensed either as lodging or sub-let houses, especially when emigration is brisk or at race times. There were 1,119 such visits paid during the day, and in 27 of the cases where suspicion was confirmed they were followed up by night visits. harbouring lodgers is not taken before the Justice for the first offence, but is noticed to apply to have his rooms measured and licensed. There were 209 such notices issued during the year, but in only 2 cases did the tenants refuse to comply; they were brought before the Justices and fined. A bye-law requires that every case of infectious sickness in a lodging-house should be at once reported to the Medical Officer of Health. 13 cases of fever occurred in lodging-houses; 10 of the patients were at once sent to hospital, the remaining 3, being members of the keepers' families, were not removed; all of these latter died. In all cases of fever or infectious disease, the bedding was removed to the disinfecting apparatus and the rooms purified and cleansed. No lodger died from fever or small pox in a registered lodging-house; but, not including the cases of fever, there were 85 deaths from non-contagious diseases in lodging-houses, of which 57 belonged to the keepers' families and 28 were lodgers.

SEAMEN'S LICENSED LODGING HOUSES.

The Corporation have made bye-laws, with the sanction of the President of the Board of Trade, for the licensing of Seamen's Lodging Houses, under the Merchant Shipping (Fishing Boats) Act, 1883, section 48, which enacts that "The Sanitary Authority within whose district any seaport town is situate may, " with the sanction of the President of the Board of Trade, from time to time, " make, revoke, alter, and amend bye-laws and regulations relating to Seamen's "Lodging Houses in such town, which shall be binding upon all persons and "bodies keeping houses in which seamen are lodged, and the owners thereof, " and persons employed therein. Such bye-laws and regulations shall, amongst "other things, provide for the licensing of Seamen's Lodging Houses, the "inspection of the same, the sanitary conditions of the same, the publication of "the fact of a house being licensed, the due execution of the bye-laws and " regulations, and the non-obstruction of persons engaged in securing such "execution, the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out "as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses, and the exclusion from "licensed houses of persons of improper character, and sufficient penalties for "the breach of such bye-laws and regulations not exceeding in any case the sum " of fifty pounds. All offences under such bye-laws and regulations shall be "deemed to be offences within the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1883, and "be punishable accordingly."-And on the written application of the keeper of any registered common lodging house or registered lodging house, made in such form and stating such particulars as the Council require, the Council will, if they see fit, grant to such keeper a license authorizing him to designate his registered house a Seamen's Licensed Lodging House.

During the year 1 application was received, and a license granted; 17 of the licenses previously granted were renewed, making the number on the Register 18.

SUB-LET HOUSES.

The number registered during 1890 was 712, making the total on the Register on the 31st December, 19,730. The number of visits paid during the night was 17,042, and during the day 103,642, with the result of finding 1,649 rooms overcrowded. In addition to overcrowding, the offence (though not punishable in sub-let houses) of permitting males and females not married to occupy the same room comes under the notice, and is entered in the books of There were 592 rooms thus indecently occupied by 880 males and 994 females, besides having also in these rooms 403 children between the ages of 3 and 12 years. The character of the indecent occupation may be judged of from the following facts:-In 305 instances one man and two women were found in the same bedroom; in 208 instances two men and one woman: in 37 instances two men and two women; in 16 instances one man and three women; in 10 instances three men and one woman; in 7 instances two men and three women; in 5 instances three men and two women; in 1 instance one man and four women; in 1 instance one man and five women; in 1 instance three men and three women; and in 1 instance five men and one woman.

Informations were laid against 2,326 chief tenants for breaches of the bye-laws, with the following results:—2,242 fined 1s. and 1s. costs; 40 fined 2s. 6d. and 2s. 6d. costs; 9 fined 5s. and 4s. 6d. costs; 2 fined 2s. and 1s. costs; 3 fined 2s. and 2s. costs; 5 fined 10s. and 4s. 6d. costs; and 1 fined 20s. and 4s. 6d. costs; making a total of fines levied during the year of £244 4s. 6d. Of the remaining 24 cases, 21 informations were withdrawn and 3 acquitted, the tenants having complied with the bye-laws.

BAKEHOUSES.

7,721 visits have been made to Bakehouses during the year. 614 Bakehouses were found dirty, and notices were served to limewash and cleanse them. 10 notices were served to remedy defective drains. All notices were complied with.

CANAL BOATS.

The following Report on the execution of the Canal Boats Acts, 1877 and 1884, by the Liverpool Sanitary Authority during the year 1890, was sent to the Local Government Board.

The Leeds and Liverpool Canal Company are proprietors of the only Canal having direct communication with Liverpool, and the length of the waterway within the City, exclusive of the locks which lead to the Docks, is about three miles.

The duties of measuring and inspecting the boats are discharged by Mr. Wilson, Chief Lodging-house Inspector, and Mr. Thornthwaite, Lodging-house Inspector. There is no additional salary paid them beyond that of Lodging-house Inspectors.

The number of visits and inspections of Canal Boats during the year was 4,103.

57 Boats were found to be used as dwellings, and not registered.

19 Notices were sent to the owners.

4 Informations were laid.

- 43 Cabins, used as dwellings, were found in a dilapidated and insanitary condition, caused by leaky decks and broken floors; 43 Notices were sent to the owners—35 abated, 2 notices not expired, and 6 not seen since by the Inspectors.
- 31 had defective second bulkheads; 31 Notices were sent—29 abated, 1 notice not expired, and 1 not seen since by the Inspectors,

- 43 required the cabins painting; 43 notices were sent to owners—38 abated, 2 notices not expired, and 3 not seen since by the Inspectors.
- 13 had dirty cabins and required cleaning; 9 verbal notices given to masters—abated, and 4 notices sent to owners—3 abated, and 1 notice not expired.
 - 7 found carrying offensive cargoes and not having a second bulkhead; 9 informations were laid and summonses issued, 7 against the masters and 2 against the mates: the two against the mates were withdrawn.

In 8 cases the Inspectors on visiting the boats between 6 and 8 a.m. found the sexes mixed, and summoned the masters.

Informations were laid in 21 cases, and in 19 instances fines were inflicted varying from 2s. 6d. and 2s. 6d. costs to 10s. and 4s. 6d. costs, and 2 were withdrawn.

There was 1 case of measles on board the boat "Jane," No. 454, during the year; the boat, bedding, etc., were disinfected and cleansed by the master.

28 notices were sent to the School Board of children living on Canal Boats and not attending any school.

The number of boats on the register is 494, of which 178 have been re-registered, viz.:—5 in 1884, 60 in 1885, 21 in 1886, 25 in 1887, 20 in 1888, 24 in 1889, and 23 in 1890.

During the year 24 new boats were registered and 23 re-registered on account of changes of owners.

New certificates were issued to one boat, owing to structural alterations and new certificates were issued to five boats by other authorities on notice sent by the local Inspectors.

There were 55 changes of masters reported and the necessary records made on the register.

Of the patients removed to Hospital the following were conveyed by the Sanitary Officers:—380 cases of Fever, 927 cases of Scarlatina, 2 cases of Small Pox, 2 cases of suspected Small Pox, 109 cases of Measles, 34 cases of Diphtheria, 6 cases of Erysipelas, and 1 case of Leprosy, making a total of 1,461 persons. 625 were taken to Netherfield Road Hospital, 109 to the Parish Workhouse Hospital, Brownlow Hill, 282 to the City Hospital, Park Hill, and 445 to the City Hospital, Grafton Street.

In accordance with the arrangements made with the School Board, 4,290 postcards were sent to the Head Masters of the various schools, informing them that children from infected houses attended their schools. Similar information was sent to the School Board.

DISINFECTION OF HOUSES.

In all cases of in ectious disease the houses were disinfected, free of cost, with sulphurous gas, by Officers appointed by the Health Committee; but whenever there was sickness in any room of the house, so as to endanger health by the use of sulphurous gas, disinfectants were given to the tenants for use in the sick room until the sulphurous gas could be used safely. No house is considered properly disinfected until sulphurous gas has been used. The existence of sickness, and the consequent employment of carbolic acid powder, necessitate many visits by the persons in charge of disinfection. There were in all 9,502 visits paid during the year to houses for the purpose of disinfection, the number of houses properly disinfected being 3,086.

MORTUARIES.

During the year 22 bodies were, by order of the Justices on the certificate of the Medical Officer, removed to the Mortuaries provided by the Council under Section 142 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

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THE DISINFECTING APPARATUS.

The number of articles disinfected at the Apparatus during the year amounted to 39,767.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

This Act and the Orders issued under it by the Board of Agriculture were reterred by the City Council to the Medical Officer of Health to carry out, in conjunction with the Veterinary Inspector, the Inspector of Nuisances, and the Meat Inspectors.

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA ORDER OF 1890. (4,062).

By the above Order the Board of Agriculture takes charge of all cattle suffering from the disease, or having been in contact with cattle so suffering, directs their slaughter, and pays such compensation to the owner as may be deemed necessary. This Order did not come into operation until the 1st of September, and only one cow-shed was affected during the remaining period of the year.

Previous to the 1st of September 9 cow-sheds were affected, and there were on the premises 80 cows, 1 calf, and 1 goat.

60 healthy cows, 1 calf, and 1 goat were killed, for which full value was given by the Corporation; 11 diseased cows were killed, for which three-fourths their value was given, and 9 diseased animals were killed by the owners, and no compensation was given.

The one shippon affected after the 1st of September contained 1 diseased and 11 healthy cows, which were slaughtered, and compensation paid by the Board of Agriculture.

Four cases were found in the slaughter-houses, and one in a knacker's yard, having been brought from outside the City, of which notice was sent to the County authorities. Four of the cases occurred before the 1st of September, and one afterwards.

SWINE FEVER.

This disease was found to exist in two pigs brought from Ireland, one in Gill Street Market, and one at the Abattoir slaughter-houses.

RABIES.

Twenty dogs were said to have suffered from Rabies; but on post-mortem examination by the Veterinary Superintendent they were found not to have had the disease.

There were no cases of Anthrax, Glanders, or Farcy during the year.

LICENSES FOR CATTLE.

During the year 1890, 2 applications were made to the Health Committee for licenses to keep cows; 1 of the applications for keeping 14 cows was granted. There are at present 378 shippons licensed to keep 5,104 cows. 65 of the shippons previously licensed have been transferred to fresh tenants.

3 applications were made during the year to keep pigs in styes separate from and unconnected with shippons; 1 of the applications for keeping 2 pigs was granted. The total number of premises or styes now licensed in the City is 29 for keeping 98 pigs.

The changes in the method of dealing with the courts and alleys recently adopted have been continued and are attended with satisfactory results, both in ensuring constant cleanliness in the courts and alleys, and also economising the time of the inspector by employing it in the most efficient manner. The aim has been to keep the courts and alleys uniformly clean throughout the week, and with this view the district inspectors are instructed that every tenant in each court is in turn to be held responsible for the cleanliness of the court for a period of one week; the inspector records in his visiting book whose turn it is, and duly informs that tenant. Failing compliance with his requirements, an information is laid under a bye-law of the Local Sanitary Act.

The magistrate has rendered great help to the department by imposing a small fine in each case in which a prosecution was necessary. As a consequence there is a marked improvement in the condition of the courts, and also in the apparent willingness of the people to cleanse them.

Samples of milk are purchased on Sundays, this course being necessary by reason of the frequent adulteration of milk sold on that day. During the year 212 samples were purchased on Sunday, of which 29 were adulterated. Samples of various kinds, such as buttered bread, milk, bread and butter, &c., were purchased from cafés and restaurants, and were found to be satisfactory. It will be seen that the proportion of adulterations varies very widely in different articles, the reason being that prosecutions for pernicious adulteration are usually commented upon in the press and the articles cease to be offered for sale. In the case of others, milk for example, the profits of adulteration are so large that the prosecutions and fines have not the same prohibitory effect, and the proportion of adulterated samples of milk during the last three years has been 13·3, 8·3, and 8·4 per cent. respectively.

It must, however, be borne in mind that several dealers have been convicted two, three, or even four times.

Several of the other articles submitted to analysis are deserving of special mention.

Certain samples of cheese were found to have been made from skimmed milk, the place of the cream having been supplied by grease and other fats, which had been added to fraudulently conceal the inferior quality of the cheese.

Imported tins of preserved meat labelled "Superior Roast Mutton" were found to contain beef, with a little mutton fat melted into the tin. Mutton is twopence per tin dearer than beef, hence the fraud. In each of the foregoing cases a conviction was obtained. In the case of one sample of adulterated lard purchased from a retail dealer, a written warranty from the manufacturers was produced in court, and the information against the retail dealer was dismissed. Proceedings were then taken against the manufacturers for giving a false warranty, and they were convicted and fined 40s. and costs by the magistrates. The defendants appealed against this decision to the City Sessions, but the Recorder upheld the conviction.

SCAVENGING OPERATIONS.

Mr. Richard S. Reynolds, M.R.C.V.S., the Veterinary Superintendent, has charge of the Scavenging Staff, and has kindly supplied the following tables.

The health and comfort of the inhabitants of all large towns and cities depends to a very great extent upon the efficient working of the staff in the collection and removal of refuse. The following tables show the magnitude of the work done in Liverpool, but there are some disadvantages with which Mr. Reynolds has to contend, and which the Health Committee will no doubt, as far as they are able, remedy. The water carriage of refuse was greatly impeded by the freezing of the Canal, and rough and foggy weather prevented the Hopper Barges making so many trips out to sea as was desirable; the consequence being the storing up in the City of a larger quantity of refuse than was usual, and which could not but have an injurious effect on the public health. The erection of the destructor, now in progress, will reduce the refuse in bulk; but the difficulty will have to be faced, and that shortly, whether another Hopper Barge should not be provided.


