The population of Liverpool at the census of 1891 was 517,980, and the Registrar General estimated the population on July 1st of that year to be 517,145, the number on which the statistics for that period were calculated.

In 1892, assuming the same rate of decrease to continue as between 1881 and 1891, the estimated population was 513,818; and for this year, 1893, the number of people living within the City Boundaries was estimated to be 510,514.

How far this estimate may be correct there are no means of ascertaining without taking a fresh census, but it does certainly seem impossible that the population should have decreased by 6,631, when we find that there is a natural increase of population by excess of births over deaths of 13,417 during the three years, namely, of 3,921 in 1891, 5,087 in 1892, and 4,409 in 1893.

By adding the natural increase 13,417 to the calculated decrease 6,631, it shows a total loss of 20,048 people, who have to be accounted for by migration either into the suburbs or elsewhere.

The estimated population for the coming year, 1894, will show a further decrease to 507,230, on which basis the statistical returns will be prepared to the apparent detriment of the sanitary reputation of the City.

Notwithstanding this decrease, Liverpool continues the most densely-peopled city of any in Great Britain; taking the whole area, 5,210 acres, within the Municipal Boundaries, the density is 97.9 persons per acre, and excluding the space occupied by the docks and quays (733 acres) the density is 114 per acre.

The total number of deaths in the City during the year was 13,919, being 1,248 more than in the previous year, 1892, giving a rate of mortality of 27·3 per 1,000 of the estimated population, and being 1·3 above the average rate of the last ten years (1883 to 1892), which was 26·0 per 1,000.

The year was marked by an exceptional amount of sickness which affected all classes and increased the death rate considerably, though not to the extent of former unhealthy years before the sanitary condition of the City was so much improved. The epidemic of Scarlatina, which commenced in the Autumn of 1892, continued throughout the whole of the year and caused 231 deaths, 100 more than in the previous year; though, comparatively speaking, a small number when contrasted with former epidemics of the same disease, as illustrated by the diagram at the end of the Report. Of the Zymotic diseases Diarrhœa was the most fatal, causing 866 deaths, the largest number in any year since 1880, when the deaths were 1,028. Of general diseases the most prevalent and fatal were those of the lungs, including Phthisis, which caused 4,515 deaths. From the large amount of sunshine and high average temperature experienced during the year, one would not have expected it to be so unhealthy and fatal, but the explanation is to be found in the absence of those strong currents of air consequent on changeable weather, which are so necessary to dissipate and neutralize the pernicious effects engendered by the aggregation of large masses of human beings on limited areas.

NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Each year's experience of the working of the Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889, demonstrates its value as an indicator of the health of the community, and the smoothness with which it is carried out is due to the cordial co-operation of the Medical Profession with the Medical Officer, in furnishing him with all information appertaining to the cases of sickness under their charge.

The number of notifications received by the Medical Officer during the year was 7,086, as follows:—

DIARRHŒA.

The most fatal of the Zymotics during the year was Diarrhea, which was equally prevalent in all other districts as in Liverpool, and was evidently the consequence of the dryness and high temperature of the Spring and Summer months. March was exceptionally warm and dry, the mean temperature being 46.5 and the rainfall 0.531; April, the temperature averaged 51.0 and the rainfall only half-an-inch; and in May the average mean temperature was 55.5 and the rainfall 1.657. In fact the average mean temperature of the whole year was 1.76 above the average, and the rainfall only reached 24.537 inches; the first six months yielding 8.573 inches and the latter months 15.964, nearly twice the amount. The disease was of a more acute form than had been experienced for many years, and though, as usual, the children were the greatest sufferers, yet a large number of adults were attacked, and in some instances fatal results followed.

CHOLERA.

The first suspicious case was that of a police constable named Cathay, of 12, Elwy Street, who died at 6 a.m. on September 19th. The history is as follows:—He had been on duty during the night of the 17th, and was apparently in good health, on the forenoon of the 18th he had a slight attack of Diarrhæa but thought nothing of it, had a hearty dinner of cold roast pork, sage and onions, and appeared quite well; at 5 p.m. he went out for a walk, returned at 6 and went to bed; shortly after 7 he came downstairs and said he had vomited and went to the w.c. From this time he got gradually worse and expired the following morning, though medical assistance was obtained.

A post mortem was made, and a portion of the bowels with fluid contents sent to Dr. Thorne, Local Government Board, who reported that "culturally the case cannot be distinguished from true cholera."

The second case was a man named Bethell, of No. 4, St. John's Place, Northumberland Street. He had been a seaman, but latterly collected mussels and sold them in the streets. On Friday morning, October 6th, he left home in his usual health, but returned in the afternoon complaining of being sick and ill, which he attributed to mussels he had eaten. Notwithstanding this, he made a hearty dinner, and then was attacked with violent vomiting and purging, and subsequently with cramps in his toes, legs and arms. Medical aid was sought, but be died on the afternoon of the 7th.

A post mortem was made, and a portion of the bowels and contents sent to Dr. Barron, of University College, who reported that he "had obtained cultivations which are indistinguishable from those of Koch's Cholera Bacillus, and that therefore the case may be practically regarded as one of true Asiatic Cholera."

Every inquiry was made as to the possibility of the above men having been in communication with persons suffering from Cholera, or clothing or other material likely to be infected with the disease, but all the evidence was nil; nor did any other cases occur in the same houses or the same neighbourhood.

TYPHOID.

This disease was much more prevalent during the year than for a long time past; the number of cases was 1,396, against 699 in 1892 and 588 in 1891. The number of deaths was 221, against 111 in 1892 and 92 in 1891. The percentage of deaths to cases was 15.8.

SMALLPOX.

During the fourth quarter of last year, 1892, there was an outbreak of Smallpox, introduced into the lodging-houses by vagrants coming from infected districts. The particulars are set out in the Report for that year. The disease continued during the first six months of this year, 1893, when 67 cases were reported, and the outbreak might be considered as stamped out. From our position, we are always liable to the importation of cases of this disease, but, as a rule, by isolating them in hospital the disease does not spread.

The total number of cases reported during the year was 75, of which 9 died, a percentage of 12.0. In the previous year, 177 were reported and 13 died, a percentage of 7.3.

Every return, without exception, shows that the mortality from Smallpox is controlled only by vaccination; in proportion as a patient is effectually vaccinated, as evidenced by the number and character of the vaccination scars, so will his illness be mild and unimportant.

DIPHTHERIA.

There was an increase in the number of cases reported this year, 210 against 185 in the previous year. The number of deaths was 47 (a percentage of 22.3), being 35 below the average of the preceding ten years.

40 cases were reported of Membranous Croup and 16 died, a percentage of 40.

MEASLES.

This disease not being one of the notifiable ones in Liverpool, only a portion of the cases came under the notice of the Medical Officer, and chiefly from the reports of the School Board Inspectors. A record of 2,316 cases was kept to enable the Medical Officer to give certificates to the Council of Education accounting for the absence of children from school, so that the Government grants to the schools might be secured and the children not deprived of the awards for regular attendance.

Whenever it is thought desirable to remove cases of this disease, as from lodging-houses or milk shops, they are taken to the hospital of the Brownlow Hill Workhouse, the Corporation paying the expense incurred in their treatment and maintenance.

During the fifty-two weeks of the year 1893 (terminating on Saturday, December 30th, 1893), the Returns of the Local Registrars recorded 18,328 births and 13,919 deaths within the City; the numbers for the corresponding period of the previous year, 1892, were 17,758 births and 12,671 deaths.

Of the births 9,324 were males and 9,004 were females, making the total Birth-rate of the City equal to 36.0 per 1,000; the average of the previous ten years being 35.2.

DEATHS.

Of the 13,919 deaths 7,070 were of males, and 6,849 of females.

The Death-rate of the City was equal to 27.3 per 1,000. The average of the previous ten years was 26.0 per 1,000.

From the returns made as to the residences of persons dying in the Workhouses and Hospitals of the town, we are able to classify 2,296 of the deaths in these establishments under the Wards from whence the patients were removed, viz.:—439 under Scotland Ward, 92 under Vauxhall Ward, 77 under St. Paul's Ward, 76 under Exchange Ward, 261 under St. Anne's Ward, 87 under Lime Street Ward, 2 under Castle Street Ward, 35 under St. Peter's Ward, 81 under Pitt Street Ward, 64 under Great George's Ward, 82 under Rodney Street Ward, 99 under Abercromby Ward, 361 under Everton, 147 under Kirkdale, 179 under West Derby Ward, 112 under North Toxteth Ward, and 101 under South Toxteth Ward. This will leave unclassified 86 deaths of persons whose previous residences were either unknown or not specified; and these, in the absence of definite information, have been placed in the Wards in proportion to the number of total deaths; and 341 who were residents outside the city.

The results of the alterations occasioned by this re-arrangement of the deaths in the wards and districts will be shown in the following table, from which a calculated rate of mortality per 1,000 per annum of the inhabitants has been made. The rates are calculated upon a population increasing or decreasing in the same ratio as between 1881 and 1891. The same applies to the third column of figures showing the corrected average during the preceding ten years.

The Registrars' Returns show that there were 22 deaths (14 of women and 8 of men) at the age of 90 and upwards, viz., 2 males and 5 females at 90, 2 males and 1 female at 91, 2 males and 2 females at 92, 2 males and 3 females at 93, 1 female at 95, 1 female at 96, and 1 female at 97.

ZYMOTICS.

This class of diseases occasioned 2,342 deaths during the year 1893, and accounted for 16.8 per cent. of the total mortality within the City during the same period. The average number of deaths from these diseases for the preceding ten years was 2,363, and the percentage death rate for 1893 was 0.3 per cent. less than the proportional rate of zymotic deaths to deaths from all causes during the preceding decennial period. SCARLATINA.

This disease became epidemic last Autumn, and continued during the whole of the year, increasing in virulence and extent as the year advanced. The number of cases coming under the notice of the Medical Officer in January was 172, which increased monthly and reached the maximum in October with 578 cases. Of the 3,538 cases reported, 1,380 were removed to hospital. The number of deaths was 231, or 6.5 per cent. (The average number of deaths for the preceding ten years was 274).

In the previous year, 1892, the number of cases reported was 1,554, of which 603 were removed to hospital; and the deaths were 131, a percentage

LIVERPOOL SANITARY AMENDMENT ACT, 1864.

LODGING-HOUSES.

For the purposes of the inspection and registering of lodging-houses, sub-let houses, canal boats, and bakehouses, the registration of dairies, cowsheds and milk shops, a staff consisting of one Chief Inspector, ten Inspectors for lodging-houses, one for canal boats, one for bakehouses, two for disinfection, and one for milk shops is provided.

The number of common lodging-houses is gradually diminishing, and thus a false impression might be created that the migratory classes were diminishing. The contrary is, however, the case both with men and women, the common lodging-houses being superseded by what are called model lodging-houses. The amount of accommodation provided in the model lodging-houses is shewn in the following table:—

FOR MEN ONLY.

103 model lodging-houses are registered to accommodate 197 members of the keepers' families and 5,303 lodgers.

FOR WOMEN ONLY.

14 are registered to accommodate 15 members of the keepers' families and 414 lodgers.

92 informations were laid against the keepers of the lodging-houses for breaches of the Byelaws, and 1,889 against tenants of sub-let houses.

There were on the register 817 lodging-houses at the end of 1892, and 781 at the end of 1893. This difference was occasioned by the removal of 238 old licences, and the addition of 202 new ones. The visits to lodging-houses are both by day and night. The lodging-houses of the better class, and especially those provided with only single beds for each person, and only with the number of beds equivalent to the number of lodgers allowed, are not visited at night except on grave suspicion or on complaint, or in the case of foreign emigrant lodging houses. The night visits are pretty nearly restricted to the low districts and tramp houses. The number of day visits paid during the year was 34,831, and the night visits 5,056. The number of lodging-houses found overcrowded on the night visits was 18, the number of informations laid for breaches of the bye-laws was 92, with the results of fines in 90 cases to the extent of £20 5s. 0d., in sums varying from 1s. to 20s. and costs, and 2 acquitted. The number of lodging-houses found dirty was 120; notices were served to lime-wash and cleanse.

It is necessary frequently to visit houses which are not licensed either as lodging or sub-let houses, especially when emigration is brisk or at race times. There were 1,230 such visits paid during the day, and in 32 of the cases where suspicion was confirmed they were followed up by night visits. A tenant harbouring lodgers is not taken before the Justices for the first offence, but is noticed to apply to have his rooms measured and licensed. There were 133 such notices issued during the year, but in only 5 cases did the tenants refuse to comply; they were brought before the Justices and fined. A bye-law

requires that every case of infectious sickness in a lodging-house should be at once reported to the Medical Officer of Health. 12 cases of fever occurred in lodging-houses; 9 of the patients were at once sent to hospital, the remaining 3, being members of the keepers' families, were not removed; 5 cases of Smallpox occurred in lodging-houses and were all removed to hospital. In all cases of fever or infectious disease, the bedding was removed to the disinfecting apparatus and the rooms purified and cleansed. There were 65 deaths from non-contagious diseases in lodging-houses, of which 37 belonged to the keepers' families and 28 were lodgers.

SEAMEN'S LICENSED LODGING HOUSES.

The Corporation have made bye-laws, with the sanction of the President of the Board of Trade, for the licensing of Seamen's Lodging Houses, under the Merchant Shipping (Fishing Boats) Act, 1883, section 48, which enacts that "The Sanitary Authority within whose district any seaport town is situate may, " with the sanction of the President of the Board of Trade, from time to time, "make, revoke, alter, and amend bye-laws and regulations relating to Seamen's "Lodging Houses in such town, which shall be binding upon all persons and "bodies keeping houses in which seamen are lodged, and the owners thereof, "and persons employed therein. Such bye-laws and regulations shall, amongst "other things, provide for the licensing of Seamen's Lodging Houses, the "inspection of the same, the sanitary conditions of the same, the publication of "the fact of a house being licensed, the due execution of the bye-laws and "regulations, and the non-obstruction of persons engaged in securing such "execution, the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out "as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses, and the exclusion from "licensed houses of persons of improper character, and sufficient penalties for "the breach of such bye-laws and regulations not exceeding in any case the sum "of fifty pounds. All offences under such bye-laws and regulations shall be "deemed to be offences within the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1883, and "be punishable accordingly."-And on the written application of the keeper of any registered common lodging house or registered lodging house, made in such form and stating such particulars as the Council require, the Council will, if they see fit, grant to such keeper a license authorizing him to designate his registered house a Seamen's Licensed Lodging House.

During the year no applications were made for registration, but 15 of the licenses previously granted were renewed, leaving the number on the Register 15.

SUB-LET HOUSES.

The number registered during 1893 was 510, making the total on the Register on the 31st December, 20,358. The number of visits paid during the night was 15,471, and during the day 99,897, with the result of finding 1,259 rooms overcrowded. In addition to overcrowding, the cases of permitting males and females not married to occupy the same room comes under the notice, and are entered in the books of the Inspectors. There were 517 rooms thus indecently occupied. The character of the indecent occupation may be judged of from the following facts:—In 294 instances one man and two women were found in the same bedroom; in 162 instances two men and one woman; in 20 instances two men and two women; in 24 instances one man and three women; in 8 instances three men and one woman; in 2 instances two men and three women; in 4 instances one man and four women; in 1 instance four men and one woman.

Informations were laid against 1,889 chief tenants for breaches of the byelaws, with the following results:—3 fined 1s.; 1,830 fined 1s. and 1s. costs; 15 fined 1s. 6d. and 1s. 6d. costs; 8 fined 2s. and 2s. costs; 27 fined 2s. 6d. and 2s. 6d. costs; 3 fined 5s. and 4s. 6d. costs; 2 fined 10s. and 4s. 6d. costs; and 1 fined 20s. and 4s. 6d. costs; making a total of fines levied during the year of £197 17s. 0d. Of the remaining 29 cases, 23 informations were withdrawn and 6 acquitted, the tenants having complied with the bye-laws.

CANAL BOATS.

The following Report on the execution of the Canal Boats Acts, 1877 and 1884, by the Liverpool Sanitary Authority during the year 1893, was sent to the Local Government Board.

The Leeds and Liverpool Canal Company are proprietors of the only Canal having direct communication with Liverpool, and the length of the water-way within the city, exclusive of the locks which lead to the Docks, is about three miles.

The duties of measuring and inspecting the boats are discharged by Mr. Wilson, Chief Lodging-house Inspector, and Mr. Thornthwaite, Lodging-house Inspector. There is no additional salary paid them beyond that of Lodging-house Inspectors.

The number of visits and inspections of Canal Boats during the year was 4,955.

- 158 Cabins, used as dwellings, were found in a dilapidated and insanitary state, caused by leaky decks (91), general leaky condition of boats (39), no doors to lockers (4), broken scuttle covers (2), defective ventilation (12), defective stoves (2), and broken floors (8).
- 158 Notices were sent to the owners—156 abated, and 2 not seen since by the Inspectors.
- 42 had defective second bulkheads; 42 notices were sent-abated.
- 73 required the cabins painting; 73 notices were sent to owners—59 abated, 2 notices not expired, 10 not seen since by the Inspectors, and 2 discontinued as dwellings.
- 38 had dirty cabins and required cleaning; 21 verbal notices given to masters—abated, and 17 notices sent to owners—16 abated, and 1 not seen since by the Inspectors.

Informations were laid in 9 cases for infringements of the Acts and Regulations, viz.:—causing unregistered boats to be used, 4; non-separation of sexes, 5. In 8 of the cases fines were inflicted, varying from 5s. and 4s. 6d. costs, to 20s. and 4s. 6d. costs, and 1 was acquitted.

There was no infectious sickness on the boats during the year,

50 notices were sent to the School Board of children living on canal boats and not attending any school.

The number of boats on the register is 587, of which 236 have been re-registered, viz.:—5 in 1884, 60 in 1885, 21 in 1886, 25 in 1887, 20 in 1888, 24 in 1889, 23 in 1890, 23 in 1891, 16 in 1892, and 19 in 1893.

During the year 36 new boats were registered and 19 re-registered on account of changes of owners.

New certificates were issued to 4 boats, owing to structural alterations.

There were 66 changes of masters reported, and the necessary records made on the register.

LICENSES FOR CATTLE.

During the year 4 applications were made to the Health Committee for licenses to keep 42 cows, of which 2 were granted to keep 21 cows. There are at present 344 shippons licensed to keep 4,634 cows. 36 of the shippons previously licensed have been transferred to fresh tenants.

6 applications were made during the year to keep pigs in styes separate from and unconnected with shippons; 2 were granted. The total number of premises or styes now licensed in the City is 28 for keeping a total number of 98 pigs.

In addition to the above, 7 applications were made to keep 24 cows beyond the number for which licenses had been granted. 6 of the applications were granted in respect to a total of 18 cows.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

This Act and the orders made under it by the Board of Agriculture, were referred by the City Council to the Medical Officer of Health to carry out in conjunction with the Veterinary Inspector, the Inspector of Nuisances, and the Meat Inspectors.

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.

There was no case of this disease in Liverpool during the year. There was a suspected case in Bootle which the Veterinary Inspector examined; he sent the lungs to the Board of Agriculture, where it was decided to be a case of non-infectious pleuro-pneumonia. The Veterinary Inspector, by order of the Board, examined and frequently re-examined 20 head of cattle, which had been in contact with the suspected beast, he found them healthy and they remained well.

TUBERCULOSIS.

When cattle are slaughtered in Liverpool and the animals found to be affected with tuberculosis, the lungs are examined by the Veterinary Inspector, and table No. 2 gives the results of his examinations.

The number of affected cows from Liverpool Dairies was found to be fewer than was thought to be the case, considering the reports made in other Cities.

There is a considerable increase over the preceding year in the number of cattle slaughtered in the City slaughterhouses, upwards of 6,000 more being slaughtered than in the preceding year, but there is a falling off in the carcases of dead meat imported for sale; the total being about 7,000 less than in the preceding year. The live cattle are not brought to the market in such large numbers when there is a large importation of carcases, but with regard to sheep there is an increase of about 4,000 in the number killed in the City, and an increase of about 48.000 in the number of carcases imported for sale.

The quantity of meat found to be unfit for human food is 197 tons, and of fish 91 tons.

There is a large increase in the number of smothered and injured cattle. These are mainly cattle imported from Ireland, the cross channel traffic being attended with more injury and damage to the cattle than is sustained by cattle which have been brought across the Atlantic.

The advice and assistance of the Department were sought more frequently during the past year than in any preceding year, the applications made by the inhabitants being 6,664, an increase of several hundreds over the year 1892. Many of these applications were in respect to large and important public buildings and offices, such as Insurance Buildings, Banks, Hospitals, Clubs, and Offices. A great deal of time of the Inspectors was taken up by these special examinations.

The references to the Water Engineer comprise, mainly, defective fittings, resulting in waste of water; also cases in which the supply was insufficient, owing to various accidental causes.

The changes made in the method of dealing with the courts and alleys have been attended with satisfactory results, both in ensuring constant cleanliness in the courts and alleys, and also economising the time of the inspector by employing it in the most efficient manner. The aim has been to keep the courts and alleys uniformly clean throughout the week, and with this view the district inspectors are instructed that every tenant in each court is in turn to be held responsible for the cleanliness of the court for a period of one week; the inspector records in his visiting book whose turn it is, and duly informs that tenant. Failing compliance with his requirements, an information is laid under a bye-law of the Local Sanitary Act.

The magistrate has rendered great help to the department by imposing a small fine in each case in which a prosecution was necessary. As a consequence there is a marked improvement in the condition of the courts, and also in the apparent willingness of the people to cleanse them. The attention of the officer is, however, very necessary, since when the visits are lessened the dirty conditions are soon apparent.

The increase in the number of cases of infectious disease notified during the year threw a large amount of additional work upon the department, and, in fact, occupied the whole time of several Inspectors who otherwise would have been employed in general sanitary purposes.

There is an increase of upwards of 2,000 over the preceding year in the number of infected houses. In all cases of Smallpox and in all cases of Typhus Fever, a special visit is paid by the Inspector to the house from which the patient has been removed, to ascertain whether any further sickness has developed. These inquiries are made at intervals of a day or two for one month, and any case of sickness, however trifling it may appear to be, is at once reported to, and visited by, the Medical Officer. The utility of this practice will be apparent, when it is stated that by these inquiries many cases of infectious disease are discovered and removed to the hospital at the earliest possible stage of the disease, and before any serious risk of infection had arisen. Without these inquiries, which have occasioned no inconvenience to anyone, the patients would have remained at home for a longer or shorter period, constituting centres of infection to the neighbourhood.

Of the patients removed to Hospital the following were conveyed by the Sanitary Officers:—769 cases of Fever, 1,337 cases of Scarlatina, 63 cases of Small Pox, 51 cases of Measles, 36 cases of Diphtheria, and 15 cases of Chicken Pox, and 14 cases of suspected Small Pox, making a total of 2,285 persons.

The collection, removal, disinfection and return of infected bedding has been carried on as hitherto by the officers of the Sanitary Department.

A Steam Disinfector of the pattern of Messrs. Manlove, Alliot & Co. was opened at Chisenhale Street, at the beginning of 1894, to replace the dry-heat apparatus at Ford Street.

DISINFECTION OF HOUSES.

In all cases of infectious disease the houses were disinfected, free of cost, with sulphurous gas; but whenever there was sickness in any room of the house, so as to endanger health by the use of sulphurous gas, disinfectants were given to the tenants for use in the sick room until the sulphurous gas could be used safely. No house is considered properly disinfected until sulphurous gas has been used. The existence of sickness, and the consequent employment of carbolic acid powder, necessitate many visits by the persons in charge of disinfection. There were in all 8,193 visits paid during the year to houses for the purpose of disinfection, the number of houses properly disinfected being 4,393.

PRINCE'S DOCK MORTUARY.

The Mortuary at the Prince's Dock is for the reception of the bodies of persons who have been drowned, killed, &c., and over which the Coroner has to hold inquests. Bodies are taken there by the police, and when it may be necessary to make post-mortem examinations, any medical gentleman may have the assistance of an Inspector on sending a communication to No. 9, Milton Street, Scotland Road.

The samples obtained under this Act are not subjected to analysis when the vendor admits that the sample is Margarine, but in all proceedings taken in respect to Margarine, under the Food and Drugs Act, the sample is of course submitted to analysis in compliance with the requirements of the Sale of Food and Drugs Act. The application of the Sale of Food and Drugs Act to

Margarine is of essential importance, inasmuch as any adulterations of Margarine, noxious or otherwise, can be readily dealt with under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act.

It is desirable that attention should be called to the salutary effects of the increase in the amount of the fines inflicted by the Stipendiary Magistrate—thus, in general conditions prejudicial to health described under the common heading of nuisances—it was necessary to send practically as many notices as in the preceding year, but the notices were more readily complied with, as evidenced by the fact that 600 fewer informations were laid than in the preceding year, 1,286, as against 1,833. The same thing is noticed in connection with the inspection of milkshops and dairies, and nuisances arising from excessive smoke, and, what is more important than any, in connection with articles of food and drugs.

SCAVENGING OPERATIONS.

Mr. Richard S. Reynolds, M.R.C.V.S., the Veterinary Superintendent, has charge of the Scavenging Staff, and has kindly supplied the details of the work done by his department.

The amount of manure and refuse collected during the year was 255,208 tons, besides 1,726 tons deposited on tips and new macadam, making a total of 256,934 tons, against 274,802 tons during the previous year. This falling off of 17,868 tons can be accounted for by the long, warm summer, and the high price of coal, consequent on the strike.

The large amount of refuse, amounting to 134,031 tons, was sent out to sea, and the remainder, with the exception of 26,868 tons dealt with by the Destructor, in Chisenhale Street, was disposed of to farmers and contractors.

The unusually hot and dry weather during the year necessitated increased attention to the courts and alleys, and the more frequent flushing of the trough closets, and the Medical Officer has much pleasure in recording his entire satisfaction with Mr. Reynolds' exertions in advancing the sanitary condition of the City.


