GENTLEMEN,

I beg to lay before you my report for the year ended 31st December, 1926.

Socially the year has been memorable for the great coal stoppage lasting from April almost to the end of the year, and having, through the curtailment of employment and trade, a deep, though indirect, effect upon general health and nutrition. On the other hand, the year brought with it more sunshine and less rain than the average; especially in its first and last quarters when sunshine is particularly welcome. Epidemics were not large nor serious: a small outbreak of diphtheria in the autumn was responsible for two deaths: beyond that there was a little scarlet fever, and some whooping-cough and chicken-pox with no fatalities.

The general death-rate, for the fifth year in succession, was again low: 9.7 per thousand of population, as compared with 10.4 in the previous year. The average annual death-rate over the five years 1922 to 1926 has been as low as 9.4, the most favourable rate in the Guisborough Union. The two other chief rates employed in vital statistics, birth-rate and infant mortality rate, have likewise been low. The birth-rate in 1926 was 16.4 per thousand of population, against 17.7 in 1925. The infant mortality rate reached the surprisingly low figure of $27\frac{1}{2}$ infant deaths per thousand births. Here also, as in the general death-rate, a low level has been maintained throughout the last five years, the average during them being $48\frac{1}{2}$ infant deaths per thousand births, which may be compared with 107 infant deaths per thousand births in the preceding five years, 1917 to 1927. An infant mortality rate of somewhere in the forties may be regarded as satisfactory, and considering that the district has maintained such a rate over five years, there seems no reason why such an average figure should not be maintained. Along with a low rate of death among infants goes usually a more robust early childhood, and it is as one would expect to find, that the mortality in children over one year of age and under 5 years has also been low, at the rate of 5.9 per thousand living at these ages. As the saying goes, "well begun is half done," so that the healthy start in life which children in recent years have had here augurs well for their health and strength when they reach manhood or womanhood.

The Maternity and Child Welfare Centre at Carlin How which had been closed since the end of 1923, was re-opened early in 1926.

Isolation Hospital:—The Council's Isolation Hospital is situated south of the foot-road from Loftus to Skinningrove. It consists of a stone cottage, occupied by the caretaker, and two wood and galvanised iron buildings containing ten beds for patients. The accommodation is sufficient for the ordinary needs of the district.

Smallpox Hospital Accommodation:—The Council has decided that in the event of any cases of Smallpox arising in their district, they shall be removed to one of the two ward-blocks at the Isolation Hospital. The risk of the spread of infection of cases treated there would be high, and it is to be hoped that the area maintains the freedom from smallpox it has enjoyed for so many years.

Institutional Provision for Unmarried Mothers, Illegitimate Infants, and Homeless Children in the Area: Nil.

Ambulance Facilities:— (a) for Infectious cases: The Council use an adapted cab for transporting fever cases.

(b) for Non-infectious and Accident cases: The St. John Ambulance Association maintain an ambulance at Carlin How.

Professional Nursing in the Home:—There is a District Nursing Association in Loftus, with no co-ordination with the local authority.

There is no provision for the nursing of infectious diseases, such as measles, etc., in the home.

Midwives:—The local authority make no payment to practising midwives, of whom there is one in the district.

Legislation in force in the District:—See Table 4. The Council passed a resolution adopting the Adoptive Sections of the Public Health Act, 1925, which have become effective during the current year 1927.

Comparisons between localities are open to many fallacies: differences in social composition (such as are indicated in the first row of the table) must be taken into consideration; further, before comparing birth-rates a knowledge of the relative proportion of young married women in the districts is necessary, or before comparing death-rates, information as to the relative numbers of people at ages when death is less avoidable.
