Longbenton Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1914, upon the Health and Sanitary Condition of the District.

Area.

The area of the District is 5,349 acres, almost level, and practically no part covered by water.

Population.

According to the Census of 1911, the population was:—

For the purposes of this Report, the District is divided into two Sub-Districts, viz., Burradon (which includes Camperdown) and Longbenton.

34 new houses have been occupied during the year, and 3 houses were closed. Estimating on an average of 4.7 inhabitants per house, this makes an increase of population since last year of 145, of which 10 are assigned to Burradon Sub-District and 135 to Longbenton Sub-District.

By far the greater number of the inhabitants are miners, the residue consisting of tradesmen, residents engaged in business in Newcastle-on-Tyne and on the banks of the Tyne, farmers, farm workers and railway employés.

The population in Burradon Sub-District consists almost exclusively of miners.

The mining population and other workers in the District are mostly indebted to the Newcastle-on-Tyne Royal Victoria Infirmary for surgical operations and medical treatment beyond that supplied by the local medical practitioners, whilst those in receipt of Poor-Law Relief are treated in the Tynemouth Union Infirmary, when necessary, as there are no Hospitals in the District, except that for Infectious Diseases at Scaffold Hill, Longbenton, which belongs to the Earsdon Joint Hospital Board. This Hospital Board is composed of representatives appointed by the Longbenton Urban District Council and four other Councils.

Of the Births returned, 14 were illegitimate, of which 11 were in Longbenton Sub-District and 3 in Burradon Sub-District.

Details of causes of death and ages at death for the Sub-Districts of Longbenton and Burradon are given in Tables IIIA, IIIB, IVA and IVB.

Statistics for the whole District for 1914 and previous years are given in Table I.

Births.

The total number of Births registered is 389, equal to a birthrate of 30 6 per 1,000 per annum, as compared with 31.7 for 1913, and 31.3 for 1912.

In Longbenton Sub-District it is 30.

In Burradon Sub-District it is 33.8.

Deaths.

The nett number of Deaths registered is 179 (as compared with 145 for 1913, and 155 for 1912) equal to a death-rate of 14 per 1,000 per annum. (Corrected for difference in sex and age constitution the death-rate is 14·196). In 1913 it was 11·5, and in 1912 it was 12·36.

In Longbenton Sub-District the death-rate is 13.4.

In Burradon Sub-District it is 17:3.

Infant Mortality.

The Deaths of Infants under one year of age numbered 44, (in 1913 they were 42), and the Births were 389, (in 1913 they were 399), equal to an Infant Mortality of 113 per 1,000 Births.

In 1913, the Infant Mortality was 105.3, and in 1912 it was 112.

The Notification of Births' Act, 1907, has not been adopted by the District, but statistics do not shew that it is necessary, and for its proper working a Health Visitor would be required.

Deaths at under 5 years numbered 19 in Burradon Sub-District, and 55 in Longbenton Sub-District, making 74 in the District, equal to a death rate at this age-period of 5.8 per 1,000 of the population. In 1913 it was 4.3, and the same in 1912.

Zymotic Death=rate.

Equal to a Zymotic Death-rate of 1.8 per 1,000 per annum, as compared with 1.11 in 1913, and .638 in 1912. This is high for the year, chiefly owing to the epidemics of Whooping Cough, Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria; the two latter, which are Notifiable Infectious Diseases, were epidemic throughout the country during the year.

Phthisis Death-rate.

Ten deaths occurred due to Phthisis, equal to a death-rate of ·79 per 1,000 per annum. It was ·56 for 1913, and ·71 in 1912.

The cases of Tuberculosis notified were 29, of which 22 were Pulmonary (Chest) and 7 of other forms of the disease.

There were 14 deaths registered as due to some form of Tuberculosis, of which 11 were in Longbenton Sub-District, and 3 in Burradon.

Respiratory Death-rate.

Deaths from Bronchitis, Pneumonia and Pleurisy numbered 21, making the death-rate for Diseases of Respiratory Organs, other than Phthisis, 1.65, as against 1.9 for 1913, and 1.5 in 1912.

Notifiable Infectious Diseases.

The examination of Table A will shew the number of cases of each Notifiable Disease notified in each Sub-District during each month of the year, and Table II shews the cases classified in ageperiods, e.g., one case of Erysipelas, and one of Pulmonary Tuberculosis (Phthisis) occurred at 65 and upwards; also the number of cases removed to Hospital.

Typhoid Fever. Three cases were notified but only one was corroborated by blood-test.

Scarlet Fever. 136 cases were notified. In 1913, 63 were notified.

Diphtheria.

28 cases were notified. In 1913, 17 were notified.

Non-notifiable Infectious Diseases.

Whooping Cough was responsible for 5 deaths.

Epidemic Diarrhœa caused 7 deaths, not excessive considering the dry summer and plague of flies.

Sanitary Circumstances of the District.

Water Supply. All houses in the District, except 10, are now supplied with water from the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Company's Mains. See Report of Sanitary Inspector.

Rivers and Streams. There are no rivers or streams in the District except the streamlet known as the Ouseburn, which receives no sewage and is not contaminated.

Drainage and Sewerage. Most houses are drained into a Main Sewer which joins the Ouseburn Sewer in Newcastle-on-Tyne area. The others have no water-carriage system of closets. At West Allotment the houses are drained into the Sewer belonging to the Earsdon Urban Council, which discharges into the North Sea.

Information concerning Closet Accommodation, Scavenging, Sanitary Inspection, Premises and Occupations controlled by Bye-Laws and Regulations, will be found in the Report of the Sanitary Inspector attached hereto.

Schools.

The sanitary condition of schools is satisfactory, all having the water carriage system, viz.: the County Council Schools at Burradon, Westmoor, Benton Square, Holystone and Forest Hall; and the National Church Schools in Longbenton Village.

It was not found necessary to close any of the Schools during the year on account of Epidemic Disease.

The School Medical Inspector has periodically inspected the school children and reported any cases requiring attention to the medical practitioners.

No complaints have been received as to the quality of Food, Food. including Milk, supplied in the District. The Slaughter-houses, Cow-byres and Dairies have been inspected and kept in order.

After receiving the Circular of the Local Government Board, Housing. upon the housing of the working classes, on March 3rd, 1914, the Council appointed a Special Committee to enquire and consider Overcrowding and the need for New Houses.

The Medical Officer of Health and Inspector of Nuisances made a Joint Report on October 26th, 1914, dealing with:

- (1) The sanitary condition of the houses occupied by the working classes throughout the District.
- (2) Overcrowding.
- (3) To what extent, if at all, new houses are required to provide for their necessary accommodation.

The Report was subsequently to be printed for submission to the Council on 28th January, 1915.

Workshops, Workplaces, &c.—See Report of Sanitary Inspector.

Sanitary Administration of the District.

A new permanent block has been added to the Hospital for Hospital Infectious Diseases, at Scaffold Hill, and there is now sufficient accommodation.

Accommodation.

These have been carried out at the Laboratory of the Northumberland County Council, in Newcastle on-Tyne, whenever required by the District Medical Officer and Medical Practitioners, free of charge and quite satisfactorily. This is of great assistance in diagnosing and treating the Infectious Diseases-Typhoid, Diphtheria and Tuberculosis.

Bacteriological Investigations.

Prevalence of and Control over Acute Infectious Disease.

Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria have been much more prevalent than last year.

In spite of efforts to check the spread of Scarlet Fever many of the inhabitants of Burradon Sub-District especially continue to shew great indifference in preventing the spread of infection, even acting in direct contravention of written and verbal instruction by the Sanitary Authority and the Medical Practitioner in attendance.

This seems partly attributable to the mild nature of the attack in very many cases, and a doubt in some cases of its genuineness.

After a trial over two years of treatment by disinfecting oils, supplied by the Council, for the throat and skin of the patient in Scarlet Fever, I am convinced that it is of benefit to the patient and a great protection for others in the house, and where it has been carefully applied from the second day of the disease and throughout its course until "peeling" was completed, no second case has occurred which could be traced to "contact." Of 62 cases in Burradon Sub-District only one was fatal, and it was in this area where the above treatment was mostly tried. Of 74 cases notified in Longbenton Sub-District four cases were fatal.

Anti-Diphtheria Serum was supplied free by the Council wherever necessary.

Prevalence of and Control over Tuberculosis.

The means for dealing with this disease are still far from satisfactory, and the great expense entailed in supplying suitable nourishment and housing often prevents their being obtained at the time required, and delay in treatment decreases the chance of success.

Means for Preventing Mortality in Childbirth and in Infancy.

The Northumberland County Council being the Local Authority for the purposes of the Midwives' Act, 1902, has not delegated any of its powers to the Urban Council under Section 9 of the Act.

The question of adopting the Notification of Births' Act was considered last year, and it has not yet been adopted. There does not appear to be evidence sufficient to justify the employment of a Health Visitor in a district of this size and population, and without doing so the Act would be of little avail.

Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

The Annual Report on the administration of this Act is appended.

Billeting of Troops in the District.

The co-operation of your Sanitary Authority with that of the Military Authorities has been carried out without friction to the great advantage of sanitation of the Troops.

No change took place in the staff of the Council up to the end of the year, owing to War Emergency.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE LONGBENTON URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit to you my Third Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1914.

SCAVENGING OF HOUSE REFUSE DURING 12 MONTHS ENDING MARCH 31st, 1914.—This work was carried out regularly by the Council's employees during day time. The ashpits were cleansed 13 times during the year, ash-closets once every week, and in some instances twice a week. Ash-bins were cleansed once a week. The quantity of refuse removed was 16,665 loads or 20,830 cube yards.

At Burradon and Camperdown the quantity per house = 12 cube yards.

At Benton, in the Grove district, the average per house $=3\frac{1}{2}$ cube yards.

The average per house for the whole district = 7:3 cube yards.

The total cost of Scavenging amounted to £1,061 5s. 11d. The average cost per house=6s. 5·8d., and the cost per person=1s. 8d. Included in these expenses are £18 5s. 0d rental for refuse depôts.

It will be noted that there is a large increase in the cost as compared with last Annual Report. This is owing to the following expenditures:—

Although we are now scavenging 513 more houses than the scavenging contractors used to do, the total extra cost is only £114 17s. 5d. The saving works out at £90 per annum. This, I think, is satisfactory when the extra expenditure is considered.

About 40% of the refuse was conveyed to the refuse depôts in the district, the remainder being tipped upon the land and ploughed in by the farmers.

REMOVAL OF TRADE REFUSE.—433 sacks of shop refuse were removed, the cost being approximately 1½d. per sack.

REFUSE DEPOTS.—There are 4 depôts in the district, as follows:—Burradon (near colliery); Prospect Hill Quarry; Billy Pit, Benton; and Benton Square Quarry. An annual rental is paid for each of the first three. The latter, which is nearly filled up, is free. The dry refuse, removed from Forest Hall and Benton, where the water-closet system is chiefly in use, is tipped at Billy Pit, where a 6' 0" wire fence is erected to burn paper in.

In connection with 34 new buildings erected during the year, 40 Water-closets, 25 Ash-bins and 6 separate Ashpits have been provided.

In connection with existing property the following have been abolished:—65 Privies, 28 Ashpits in combination with Privies, 3 Ash-closets, and in their place 64 Ash-closets, 11 Water-closets, 2 separate Ashpits and 5 Dust-bins.

Towards the end of the year the Council decided to ask owners of property to provide a water-closet where the privy and ashpit are found to be defective. To this end statutory notices have been served. As the Council have adopted Section 39 of the P. H. Acts' Amendments' Act, 1907, all new buildings have to be provided with a water-closet where there is a sufficient water supply and sewer. This only applies where the plans were not approved before the 20th day of December, 1913.

DRAINAGE WORKS,—30 houses were found to have defective drains. With few exceptions the drains were entirely re-laid. The others were repaired and made smoke-tight. The work was carried out in accordance with the bye-laws of the late Tynemouth Rural District Council, such bye-laws being in use until the new ones are approved by the Local Government Board. In all 41 water tests and 55 smoke tests were applied, and 164 inspections made while the work was in progress. See Table III.

DRAINAGE WORKS ON NEW BUILDINGS.—64 new systems of new drains were inspected, 6 of these were not quite completed at the end of the year. 3 extensions to existing drains were carried out and inspected. 111 water tests and 63 smoke tests were applied and 205 inspections made. See Table IV.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES.—There are 7 in the district. 4 are of modern construction. 18 visits were made. During the year 1 Statutory Notice was served. It has been complied with, the walls being cement plastered up to a height of 4 feet. Byelaws have been approved by the Local Government Board.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS, AND MILKSHOPS ORDER, 1885. AND THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1886.—Regulations have been made under the above Order and Act. These have also been approved by the Local Government Board. There are 29 Cowsheds and Dairies and 3 Purveyors of Milk in the district. The total number of cows when last inspected was 281.

The various premises were inspected, a total of 93 visits having been made.

Sixteen informal notices were served to cleanse and limewash byres. These were speedily complied with.

HOUSING (INSPECTION OF DISTRICT) REGULATIONS, 1910.—The houses inspected number 6. Insanitary and other defects were found in each case. Informal notices were served upon the owners in 5 instances to carry out the repairs and alterations necessary. A Closing Order was served in the other case. This house has been closed, also 2 at Camperdown.

The chief defects found were damp floors and walls, leaky roofs, defective rain water gutters and down pipes, defective staircases, insanitary privy-middens, insufficient lighting area and ventilation, and unpaved areas. In connection with the 90 houses reported last year, and 46 reported in 1912 as not having been completed at the end of 1913:—

- 163 Re-inspections were made during this year.
- 41 have been brought into compliance with the notices served.
- 18 are being altered and repaired.
- 71 are in the same condition as when first inspected—34 being at Benton Square, 24 at Wapping Square, 3 at Prosperous Pit and 10 at Richardson's Buildings, West Moor.
- 1 has been closed after service of Closing Order.

INSANITARY HOUSES.—As reported last year the owners of property at West Moor, Camperdown and Burradon were carrying out certain repairs and alterations, as requested by the late Council, until the war began. Since then this work has been stopped.

At West Moor, 7 houses have had new front room floors laid with wood, and the back kitchen floors were laid with cement after making provision for the ventilation of the former. Where necessary the walls were plastered with cement and sand.

At Camperdown, 2 houses have had new floors of wood laid on the ground floor, new attic floors, new staircases, larger windows, hinged skylights, and more ventilation provided. A cement area has also been laid at the north side of 26 houses in Lane Row, and the carriageway was penned and covered with clean boiler clinker.

At Burradon, 3 new floors were also laid.

A Detailed Joint Report on the Housing of the Working Classes in the district, by the Medical Officer of Health and myself, was presented to the Housing and Sanitary Committee on October 26th, 1914. This Committee considered it and reported to the Council on January 14th, 1915. This report was forwarded to the Local Government Board.

HOUSES WITHOUT A PROPER WATER SUPPLY.— The following houses are without a proper supply from the water mains:—

* A sample of water was taken from the Well at this place for the purpose of analysis on January 20th, 1915. The Analyst reported it to be unfit for drinking purposes, and very undesirable for other domestic purposes. The Council are taking action to have a supply from the water-main.

Acting on his instructions, 45 were removed to hospital. After removal to hospital and the recovery of patients at home, 102 rooms in 89 houses were fumigated with Formic-aldehyde. Two of this number were after cases of tuberculosis.

PETROLEUM ACTS.—One license has been renewed, and another granted during the year. These stores are in accordance with the regulations.

These were inspected, a total of 60 visits were made.

STREETS AND ROADS.—New street works are required at :—

Forest Hall:—Forest Avenue, Crossley Terrace, Percy Street, Young's Road, Errington Terrace and Nicholson's Terrace back street.

SOUTH GOSFORTH: -Killingworth Road and Gallalaw Terrace.

West Allotment:—West Street, Earsdon Terrace, Holywell Terrace, and the paths in front of Eccles, Carlisle, Maude, Lamb, Buddle and Griffith Terraces.

Camperdown:—Back streets at Station Road, Atkin Street and Garden Terrace.

A Local Government Inquiry was held during the year in connection with the above streets, except Errington Avenue.

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS.—The following have been framed, and are at present before the Local Government Board for their approval:—

- (1) New Streets and Buildings.
- (2) The Drainage of Existing Buildings.

The following have been approved by the Local Government Board, and are now in force in the district:—

- (1) Slaughter Houses.
- (2) Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops.
- (3) For the Prevention of Nuisances from the keeping of Animals.

A large number of nuisances were abated forthwith on verbal notices to the persons responsible.

MILITARY BILLETS.—Much of my time has been taken up since the beginning of August in rendering assistance to the Military, who have been billeted in this Council's area since the war began. A daily cleansing of the latrines is carried out, and each receptacle is disinfected with Carbolic Powder after it has been emptied.
