Council Offices, Rectory Road, Lowestoft Mr Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health of the District for the year 1972.

The population of the district continues to increase in number, continuing the trend seen over the past few years. In 1972, it reached 23,280. A small but steady rise in the number of births continues, this year the total being 375. The number of deaths is up on the previous year - 265 compared with 211 the year before. The increase in population of the district therefore, has been brought about by movement of people into the district, a fact further illustrated by the increase in inhabited houses during the year - from 8,520 in 1971 to 8,759 in 1972.

The causes of death follow the national pattern. The main causes are those associated with heart disease. Approximately one quarter of the deaths were due to cancer. Only 2 deaths were due to motor accidents, compared with 7 in 1971.

Measles continues to be the only infectious disease with any significant prevulence, 132 cases were notified in 1972, 106 in 1971 and 188 in 1970. Immunisation against measles is making steady progress, but there is need for much more encouragement to mothers to have their children immunised against this infection.

This will be the last report on the health of this District, I shall write, it will also be one of the last Health Reports I shall write as a lical Officer of Health. The future pattern of this aspect of the duties of a Community Physician have yet to be detailed. It brings to an end a long series of reports which over the years have illustrated the steady progress which has been made in improving the health of the Community. Great improvement has been made, particularly in the field of preventing infectious disease, in protecting the public against food poisoning and similar water borne diseases, in lowering the child and infant death rates, in extending the span of life, in improving housing and conditions of work, and so on. There is still a great deal of ill-health, both physical and mental, which needs much attention, and there is the ever increasing toll of accidents in the home, in industry, and on the roads. So it may be just as well, that great changes are afcot in the reorganisation of the health services, so that we are encouraged to reorient our viewpoint towards tackling some of the current problems.

I take this opportunity Mr Chairman, of thanking you and your Committee members for the interest you have shown in the past work of your Health Officers and in the courtesy and kindness you have always shown to me personally.

FOR THE YEAR 1972

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for the year 1972.

This year, owing to extreme pressure on the department, I am presenting the report in factual form.

With the division of Lothingland and its amalgamation into the larger units of Waveney and Gt. Yarmouth in April, 1974 it seemed prudent to prepare for the inevitable and formulate a forward programme for Housing, Sewerage and the other services. This has been done and the development of 5 sites to provide 64 houses, 47 bungalows and 37 old peoples flats has been initiated. Building land for the future is also in the process of being purchased. The sewerage scheme for Burgh Castle is virtually completed, likewise the extensions to Corton Treatment Works. Schemes for Hulver and extensions for Kessingland are prepared and work will start in 1973/74. The fringe areas of Lowestoft and Blundeston extensions are on the drawing board. An incentive bonus scheme for all the manual staff has been instituted and improvements to the cleansing service have been carried out.

This will be my last annual report to you. I have enjoyed 12 years as your Public Health Inspector, more than half of that time as the leader of a helpful and efficient team organised to advise and serve the people residing in, and visiting the District.

I have been assisted at all times by my own staff, both manual and office, and wish to record my thanks for their support and effort. As always, I have had the co-operation and support from Dr. Gee, Mr. Allen and the departmental chief officers and their staffs.

Finally, Mr Chairman, I would like to express my thanks to you and all the members, past and present, for the interest shown and the encouragement given me throughout my service with Lothingland.
