The physical features and general character of the District are an undulating rural district, high on the Eastern portion, viz: the parishes of Burton on the Wolds and Lymeswold, the lands of which are mainly used for the grazing of sheep and cattle. Lower down and nearer the Borough of Loughborough come the Parishes of Prestwold, Cotes and Hooton, consisting of rich fertile land, a considerable portion of which is cultivated, and the same may be said of the Parishes of Woodthorpe, Nanterton, Thorpe Acre and Dishley. Garendon consists mostly of the demesne of that name. The Parishes of Hathern, Long Whetton, and Belton consist largely of grazing land.

The condition of the inhabitants of the district is fairly prosperous. The chief occupation of the inhabitants is agriculture. There are no occupations having a prejudicial influence on the public health.

WATER SUPPLY. The villages of Nanterton and Thorpe Acre, Prestwold Hall and Burleigh Hall have the public supply from the Borough of Loughborough. In other parts of the District the water is derived from wells, and as well water is constantly liable to change from pollution from the surface of adjoining grounds, movement of subsoil etc; this matter receives a considerable amount of attention from the Sanitary Inspector.

Nine samples were submitted to me for analysis, during the year, of these, four were so bad as to justify me in condemning them as unfit for drinking purposes. Four wells were cleansed and repaired.

MILK SUPPLY The milk supply is derived from the farms of the District. There is no milk imported, but considerable quantities are sent out of the district to London and elsewhere.

The dairies are subject to regular inspection under the Dairies, Cowsheds & Milkshops Order, and a Veterinary Inspector is appointed to examine milch cows in the district. Every precaution is taken for the detection of tuberculous milch cows, seven such being detected throughout the year. 373 inspections were made by the Veterinary Inspector, and 5289 cows inspected. The Milk and Dairies (Amendment) Act is in force. There are at present on the Register 25 Retail Purveyors and 137 Wholesale Traders and Producers. The number of inspections made and contraventions found will be seen in the Inspector's Report hereto attached.

OTHER FOODS There are no unsound foods prepared or exposed for sale in the district. A general supervision is exercised over slaughter houses, all of which are in a fair condition.

THE REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL OF HOUSE REFUSE This is done by the occupier. There is no public scavenging.

METHODS OF DEALING WITH INFECTIOUS DISEASES The compulsory Notification Act is in force. The County Council Isolation Hospital Scheme has been adopted by this Authority. Disinfection is carried out with sulphur di-oxide and formaldehyde spray.

METHOD OF CONTROL OF TUBERCULOSIS During the year five cases of pulmonary and one of other kinds of Tuberculosis were notified, and during the same period four deaths were registered from Pulmonary, and one from other kinds of Tuberculosis. Health Visitors are appointed by the County Council to visit and advise all cases of Tuberculosis. The rooms occupied by the patients are periodically disinfected by the Sanitary Inspector, and when a death occurs, or a removal takes place, the houses are disinfected and cleansed.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES NOTIFIED The total number of infectious diseases notified was 22, viz - Scarlet Fever 3, Enteric Fever 1, Diphtheria 1, Chicken Pox 6, Pneumonia 3, Encephalitis Lethargica 1, Erysipelas 1, Pulmonary Tuberculosis 5, other kinds of Tuberculosis 1, - this is 26 cases less than last year. 1 case of Diphtheria and 1 of Scarlet Fever were removed to the Isolation Hospital.

BIRTHS The total number of births registered belonging to the District was 91, which is 18 more than last year, and six above the average of the last five years, and is an annual birth rate of 19.8 per thousand of the estimated population. 49 of these births were boys and 42 girls. Three of these births were illegitimate.

MORTALITY The total number of deaths registered belonging to the District is 55, which is 11 less than last year and two above the average of the last five years, and is an annual Death rate of 12.0 per thousand of the estimated population.

INFANT MORTALITY The total number of deaths of infants under one year of age is 5, which is 3 more than last year, and is an Infant Mortality of 55.3 per thousand births registered. All of these births were of legitimate children.
