The district death rate is 12.23 as against 11.6 for England and Wales and the average age at which death took place is again high.

Out of the 204 deaths during the year, 137 were of persons of 60 years and upwards, i.e., a percentage of 67.8 and a further analysis of these gives the following figures—

Deaths of Infants under 1 year of age.

There were 19 deaths of Infants under 1 year of age as against 7 in 1937.

Deaths from Cancer.

There were 25 deaths from cancer as against 24 the year before, the average age at which death took place being 62 (69 in 1937). In 16 of these cases the site of the disease was in the Alimentary canal, the areas affected being as follows—Tongue 1, Stomach 3, Intestines 7, Rectum 1, Liver and Gall Bladder 2, Pancreas 2.

Other areas affected were—Larynx 1, Lungs 1, Breast 1, Female Organs 5, Male Organs 1.

Control of Infectious Disease.

On the occurrence of a case of Infectious Disease, steps are taken at once to trace the source of infection.

Instructions are given as to the isolation of the patient, and disinfectants are supplied. When the medical practitioner in charge of the case reports that the patient has recovered sufficently, the house is disinfected with Formalin by the Sanitary Inspector.

Any case of small-pox occurring in the district will be removed to the Small-pox Hospital, at Osgodby, and the necessary steps will be taken to disinfect all clothes, etc., and to vaccinate, or re-vaccinate all contacts.

Patients suffering from other infectious diseases are in exceptional circumstances, e.g.—difficulty of isolation, other illness, or an impending confinement in the house, removed to the Isolation Hospital at Osgodby, and cases needing Surgical or other Special Treatment, to Grimsby Isolation Hospital at Scarthoe,

Patients so sent away are expected to pay a reasonable share of the cost of their maintenance whilst in Hospital.

A stock of disinfectants which are supplied free for use in cases of infectious diseases, is kept at the following places-

Diphtheria Antitoxin is supplied free of charge, and can be obtained from the Sanitary Inspector, Council Offices Cannon Street, Louth; or from me.

4 Other Causes of Sickness.

INFLUENZA

was conspicuous by its absence,

MEASLES.

Occurred in epidemic form at Kelstern in January and the school was closed for a fortnight, but except for that there were only a few odd cases in the district.

WHOOPING COUGH

Was epidemic at Ludford, Binbrook, Burgh-on-Bain and Grimoldby in the early part of the year, and at South Elkington in July. The Schools affected were closed.

CHICKEN POX.

There were many cases, chiefly in the Marsh Villages, during the year, but it was not necessary to close any of the schools.

5 Summary of Nursing Arrangements, etc.

General. There are District Nurses at North Somercotes, Hainton, North Cotes, Grimoldby, Authorpe and Binbrooke.

For Infectious Disease. There is a Nurse stationed at Louth by the County Council, to visit cases of Measles and Whooping Cough reported by the School teachers, and to help in the nursing if necessary.

She is also available to help in nursing cases of Puerperal Fever and Ophthalmia Neonatorum, if required by, and under the instructions of, the doctor in charge of the case.

Ambulance Facilities.

A Motor Ambulance, maintained by the British Red Cross is available for the conveyance of non-infectious and accident cases. It is stationed at the Mason's Arms Yard, Louth.

6 Sanitation.

A summary of the work done during the year, will be found in Appendix Table 2.

7 Food Supply.

(a) MILK.

Mr. Adams, M.R.C.V.s., reports as follows :

During 1938 I have inspected the premises of all the Milk Producers in the district on various occassions,

The cleanliness of the milk and premises is generally satisfactory, and a number of structural improvements to the premises have been made.

Samples of milk dispatched for bacteriological analysis have proved satisfactory in the large majority of cases, and in no case were Tubercle Bacilli found in any sample

There are about 115 Milk Producers in the area, together with about 1500 registered for the accasional sale of a little milk or butter.

(b) MEAT.

During 1938 the 38 slaughterhouses in the Louth Rural District have been inspected by me on various occasions,

The cleaniness, lighting, ventilation, drainage and water supply are satisfactory, and the quality of meat killed is excellent.

8 Water Supply.

The water supply in the district is, on the whole, satisfactory, the quality of the water being generally very good.

An analysis was made of 20 samples, ten of these samples which were taken from shallow wells were found to be contaminated and the necessary steps were taken to provide a satisfactory supply.

A public water supply for the parishes of Grimoldby and Manby and for the R.A.F. Station at Manby was provided during the year, also a sewerage system,

The supply appears to be very satisfactory both in quality and quantity.

Samples were taken for analysis on several occasions when the supply was started, and have been taken quarterly since, on each occasion the report was very satisfactory,

9 Pollution of Rivers.

The Beck at Grimoldby was again badly polluted by the effluent from the butter factory at the Grange. A public inquiry was held by the Ministry of Health, and the Council were instructed to take legal action if necessary. Steps are being taken to abate the nuisance,

10 Offensive Trades.

The fell-mongers yards at Binbrooke, Marshchapel, Donington-on-Bain and Waithe, were carried on satisfactorily during the year.

11 Collection of Refuse.

In the parishes of Holton le-Clay, North Thoresby, Marshchapel and North Cotes, refuse is regularly collected and carted away to a dumping ground at North Thoresby pits.

12 Schools.

The sanitary arrangements at the schools in the district are on the whole satisfactory,

13 Housing.

During the year, 50 new houses were built by private enterprise, and in addition 45 were reconditioned under the Housing (Rural Workers') Act. The survey of unfit cottages made by order of the Minister of Health, was completed in July, and as result it was found that 80 houses ought to be demolished; 157 were capable of being made fit by reconditioning, and 43 only needed ordinary repairs. Steps are being taken to carry these recommendations into effect,

Several sites were secured by the Council during the year, and it is hoped that a fair percentage of the Council's Housing Scheme will be completed in 1939.

In conclusion, I beg to thank the Chairman and Members of the Housing and Public Health Acts Committees for their continued kindness and consideration to me during the past year.
