To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Luton.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am now able to submit the Sixty-third Annual Report on the health and sanitary conditions of the Borough.

The report is restricted to bare statistical statements in accordance with wartime policy. Pressure of work in some sections of the department has held up the preparation of the report and accounts for the delayed publication. A good deal of the department's energy was absorbed in overcoming staffing difficulties and inadequacies of clinic and in-patient accommodation.

Apart from the relatively high incidence of measles, whooping cough and cerebro-spinal fever, which the Borough shared with the country as a whole, the incidence of notifiable infectious disease remained low.

The following matters, referred to in the body of the report, are noteworthy:

- (1) The birth rate was the lowest recorded in the Borough since 1933 (see page 4).
- (2) The Whitehouse Sick Bay was opened on the 1st April and was occupied to capacity up to the end of the year (see page 9).
- (3) The Hostel for Expectant Mothers at 48, Napier Road received evacuees awaiting confinement throughout the year (see page 13).
- (4) 7,838 children were immunised against diphtheria (see page 21).

REPORT of the Chief Sanitary Inspector

SECTION C.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

1(A). GENERAL.

Luton, which has an area of 8,736 acres, is situated in a valley between the Chiltern Hills at 200 to 400 feet above sea level in the town, rising to 400 to 600 feet above sea level on the surrounding hills. It is mainly built upon the upper chalk, with loam and clay deposits.

Meteorology.—The Luton Meteorological Station, which is under the control of the Borough Engineer, is situated in Wardown Park, New Bedford Road, from which the following observations were taken:—

Sunshine.—Complete records of hours of sunshine throughout the year were not kept. Records were kept from April to December inclusive, when a total of 1,120.4 hours of sunshine was recorded. The sunniest day was the 17th June, 1941, when 14.3 hours were recorded.

Rainfall.—The total rainfall during the year amounted to 32.77 inches, the wettest day being the 9th June, 1941, when .93 inch of rain was recorded.

Temperatures.—The maximum temperature during the year was 88° F., recorded on the 22nd June, 1941, whilst the minimum temperature was 12°F., on the 5th February, 1941, the mean temperature being 48.135° F.

Wind.—The prevailing wind during year was west.

1(B). WATER SUPPLY.

Luton has an abundant supply of excellent water which is distributed throughout the Borough by the Luton Water Company, and is derived from deep wells in the chalk situated in Crescent Road and Runley Wood. Chlorination of the supply is carried out, the average amount of chlorine pumped into the supply being .35 parts per million.

From information received from the Luton Water Company, the total amount of water supplied during the year ended 31st December, 1941, wasgallons. Assuming a population of, the total number of gallons used per head per day was approximately 41, an average of 11.5 gallons per head per day for industrial purposes, and 29.5 gallons per head per day for domestic use.

There were no new extensions of water mains in the Borough during the year.

In the new portion of the Borough, which was incorporated in April, 1933, there are still thirty houses which obtain their supply from driven tube wells.

Samples of water are taken regularly from the town mains at various points within the Borough and from other sources of supply for chemical and bacteriological examination. The following is a summary of the samples of water taken during the year from all sources. Details of samples which were adversely reported upon are given below.

1(C). DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The drainage of the old part of the Borough is semi-separate in character, the whole of the soil water sewage being dealt with by filtration. The major part of the effluent is discharged to the River Lea at a point where the river leaves the Borough, whilst the effluent from the New Mill End Sewage Purification Works is discharged to the River Lea at New Mill End.

2. CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

All pail closets are emptied either once or twice weekly between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Cesspools are emptied by means of mechanical plant as and when required.

3. PUBLIC CLEANSING—REFUSE DISPOSAL.

The system of refuse disposal is wholly controlled tipping.

From figures supplied by the Director of Public Cleansing, the weight of house and trade refuse disposed of during the year was 17,797 tons.

5(C). DISINFECTANT

During the year, 40 gallons of disinfecting fluid were supplied to the public, free of charge, for use in premises where cases of infectious disease, etc., had occurred.

5(D). LIBRARY BOOKS

During the year, 723 library books were withdrawn from circulation and were disinfected before they were returned.

5(E). CLEANSING OF INFECTED AND VERMINOUS PERSONS AND CLOTHING

During the year, 19 members of H.M. Forces and 1 civilian, who were in a verminous condition, were cleansed at the Council's temporary cleansing station, and their clothing and bedding disinfected by steam.

6. PUBLIC SWIMMING BATHS

There are two Public Swimming Baths in the Borough, both owned by the Corporation.

The Public Baths are situate in Waller Street, Luton, and consist of a covered Swimming Bath, 46 Slipper Baths, and 1 Vapour Bath, whilst the Open Air Swimming Pool, situate off New Bedford Road, Luton, caters for Swimming and Bathing only.

Chloroscope examinations of the water are carried out by the Attendants approximately three times per day, and in addition, samples of water are sent to the Public Analyst for examination every two months.

7. ERADICATION OF BED BUGS

During the year ended 31st December, 1941, 41 complaints of verminous premises were received, and in 22 instances disinfestation was carried out. Prior to disinfestation, notices were served upon the owners of the premises to remove all paper hangings, skirtings, architraves, mouldings, etc., and the premises were re-inspected before these articles were reinstated.

8(A). THE FACTORIES ACT, 1937

Since the Factories Act became operative, inspection of factories within the Borough has been maintained, and unsatisfactory conditions have been recorded and appropriate action taken by the Local Authority.

As a result of the inspection of Basement Bakehouses, the Local Authority resolved that they were not satisfied that the Bakehouses were suitable for use as such, and gave the owners a period of eighteen months in which to cease using these premises.

Owing to present conditions, the period of eighteen months has been extended. The position will again be reviewed in January, 1943.
