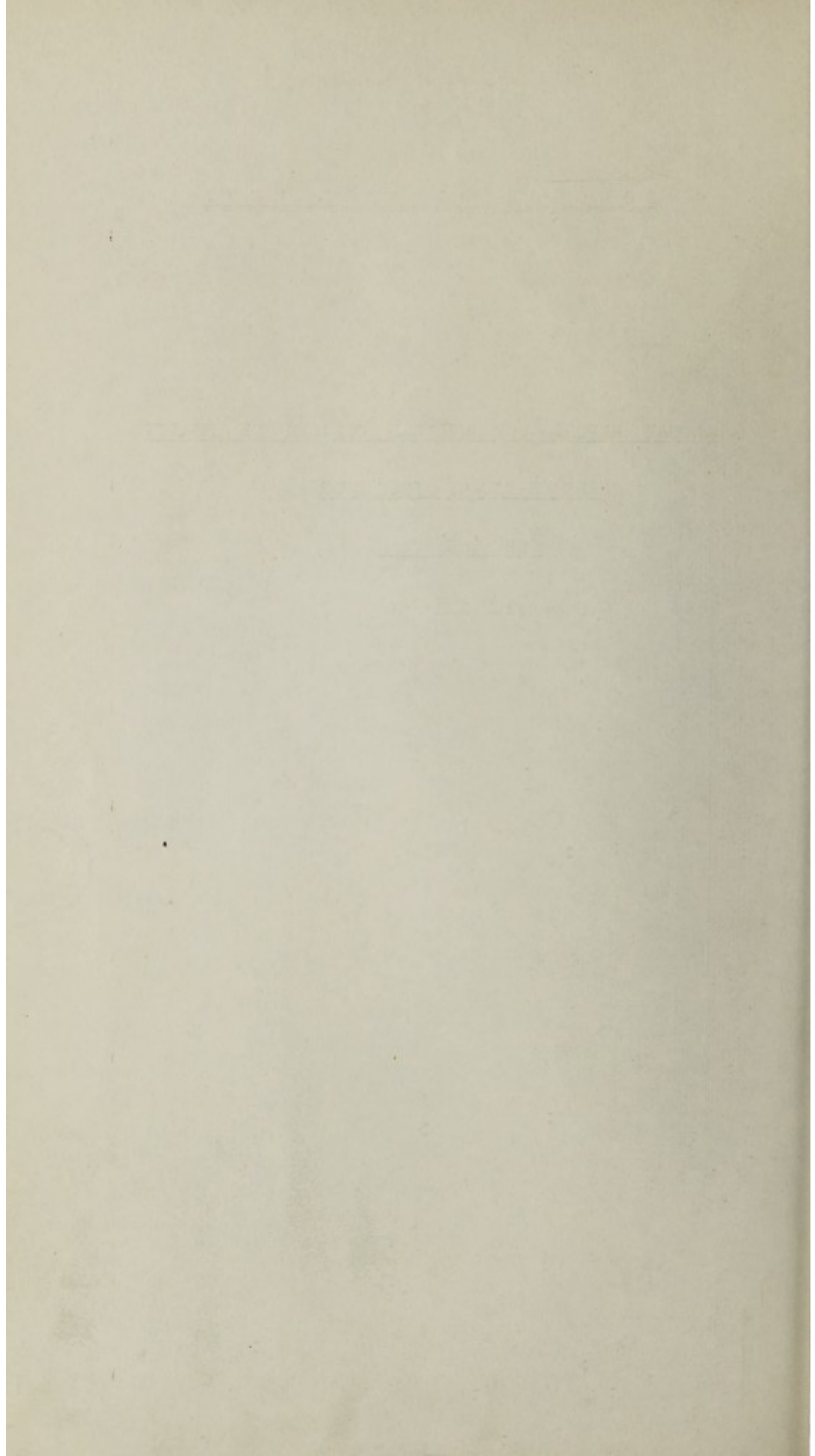

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1955.

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 2,690, which was an increase by 90 over that of 1954.

The number of births was 61, compared with 42 in the preceding year, which was an increase by 19 births; the relative birth-rate was 22.68, compared with 15 for England and Wales.

The number of still-births was 2, giving a rate of 16.39 per 1,000 total live and still births, compared with 23.1 for England and Wales. The figures involved are however too small for significant statistical comparisons.

It is again very gratifying that there was no death amongst infants under one year of age, and that there was no death amongst mothers due to pregnancy or childbirth or abortion. These nil figures reflect the value of the Health Services in the Borough which are executed by the Practitioners, the Midwife and Health Visitor. The Child Welfare Clinic, which is well attended, provides valuable services on behalf of infants and toddlers, not only in the prevention of infant deaths but also in the ascertainment of health defects which would retard normal growth. The majority of children who attend are also immunised against Diphtheria and vaccinated against Smallpox and few parents refuse these proved preventive measures.

Amongst the total population of 2,690 Residents there were only 17 deaths, and the corresponding crude death-rate was 6.32, which, when adjusted by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, i.e. 1.01, for comparison with the death rates of other Districts, becomes 6.38. This low death rate compares very favourably with that for England and Wales which was 11.7 per 1,000 population.

Of those 17 deaths, 11 were due to Heart, Vascular or Circulatory Diseases, mostly amongst the aged. Cancer caused only one death and that was of the lung. There were two deaths from Peptic Ulcer in Males, one from Nephritis in a female.

There were no deaths due to the Infectious Diseases and none from any exceptional cause.

Regarding Infectious Disease, there was no epidemic during the year. Only 4 cases of Whooping Cough and 8 of Measles were notified. There were 2 cases of Meningococcal Infection, formerly known as Cerebro-spinal Fever, who were successfully treated. Also there were 6 cases of Acute Primary Pneumonia notified all of whom responded successfully to treatment.

There was one isolated case of Food Poisoning, caused by the *Salmonella typhi-murium*, which is the commonest organism in this area to be incriminated.

Regarding Tuberculosis, only one case of Respiratory, and one of Non-Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified and there were no deaths. The Mass Radiography Unit visited the Borough in June and 500 male and female volunteers were examined. It is very gratifying that no case of Active Tuberculosis was discovered, which indicates that there is no reservoir of infection in the Borough. (See table). Within recent years, great progress has been made in the treatment of this disease, and it is not now the dreadful scourge that it was in olden times.

These statistics of the health of the population of the Borough may be regarded as being very satisfactory and in conclusion, I wish to take this opportunity of thanking you for your interest and assistance in the work of my Department and the staff for their efficient and loyal co-operation.

Social Conditions.

Lydd is a very ancient and historical Borough being mentioned in Saxon Charters from 740 onwards and is a limb of the Cinque Ports. It is predominantly agricultural being chiefly concerned with sheep and cattle raising and arable farming. There are also extensive beach quarrying and crushing plants within the District. Of the Sub-Districts, Dungeness is devoted to the fishing industry and Greatstone, where there is a large holiday camp, and Lydd-on-Sea cater chiefly for holiday-makers. Lydd also contains a large permanent Army Artillery Practice Camp and a proportion of the civilians are employed there. There is almost no unemployment and by and large social conditions are satisfactory.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply

This is supplied by the Folkestone and District Water Co., from wells sunk in the shingle and sand of the Denge Marsh and the supply is adequate. 12 samples of this water taken throughout the year were all of satisfactory quality and of bacteriological purity.

A water main was extended from the High Street to Pigwell Farm and from thence by service pipes to serve the Scotney Group of Farms.

97% of the dwelling-houses in the Borough have main water supplies.

Drainage and Sewerage

The sewerage scheme for the drainage of the post-war housing estate continues to operate satisfactorily. Sewage is carried partly by gravitation and partly by pumping to the Sewage Works situated on the outskirts of the Borough.

No important developments were effected during the year.

Public Cleansing

(a) House Refuse

A weekly collection of house refuse is made by the Council's workmen and the refuse is deposited at an authorised tip on the outskirts of the Borough by the Denge Marsh road.

(b) Trade Refuse

Collections are made in the summer from the Airport and from a Holiday Camp, and in the winter from the Military Camp.

(c) Salvage

This is collected at the same time as house refuse, but a separate collection is made from shops.

SECTION D.

Housing

Fourteen new houses were erected during the year.

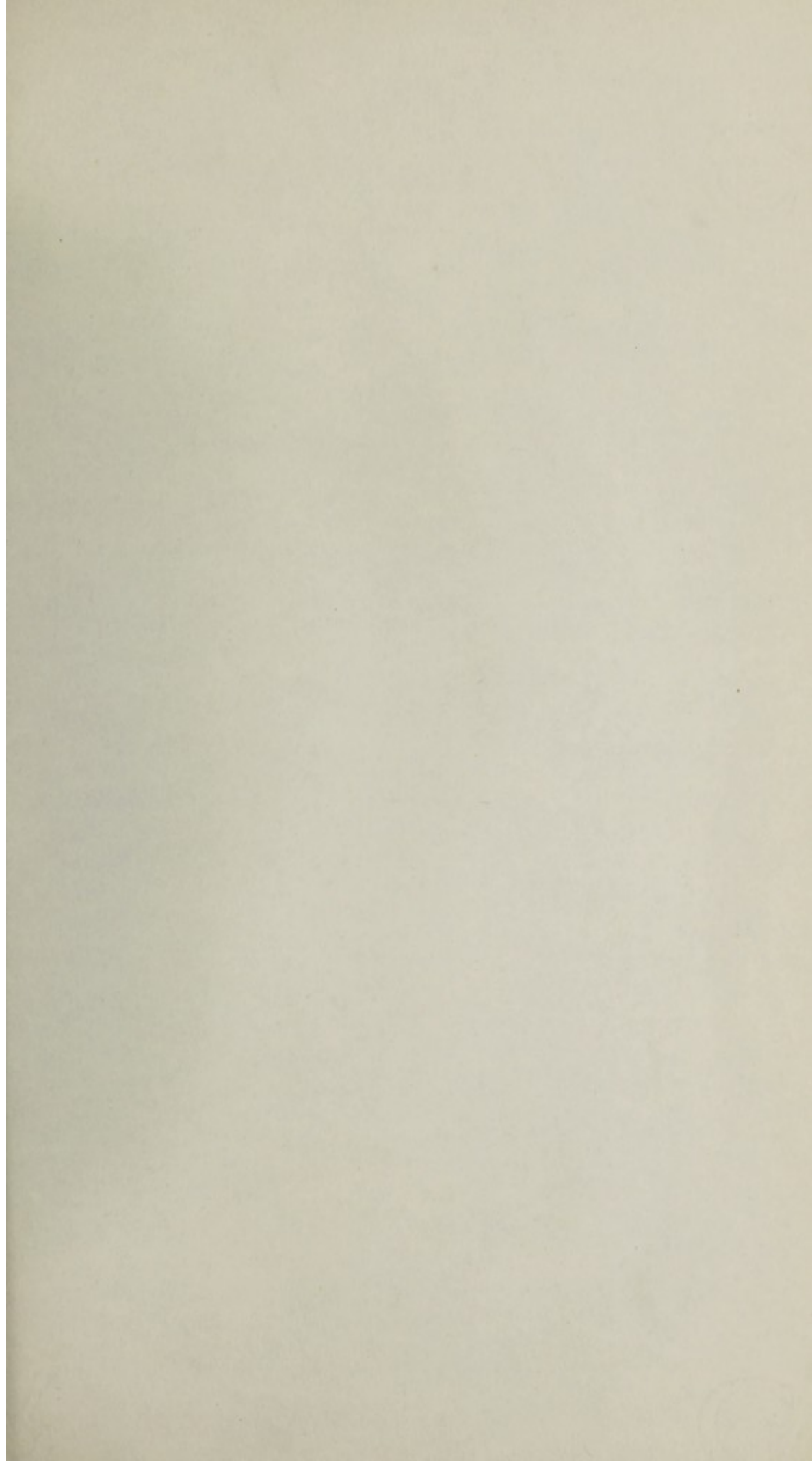
