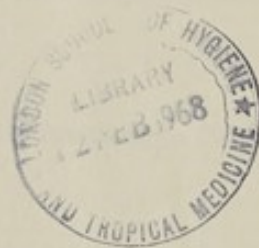

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INTRODUCTION

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1959.

Population

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 3,140, exactly the same as in the previous year.

Live Births and Birth Rate

The number of live-births (31 M, 23 F) was 54 an increase of 11 over that of the previous year. The crude birth rate was accordingly 14.01; when adjusted by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 17.23 which compares favourably with that of 16.6 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Stillbirths Rate

This rate was nil, as there were no stillbirths.

Infant Deaths and Infantile Mortality Rate

Two infant deaths were registered due to

- (1) (a) Pneumonia
(b) Congenital Fibrocystic Disease
- (2) (a) Atelectasis
(b) Meconium

The former was aged 11 months and the latter 45 minutes; both were due to congenital causes and were unavoidable deaths.

The Infantile Mortality Rate was therefore 37.04, in comparison with that of 22.0 for England and Wales.

Maternal Mortality Rate

This rate too was nil, as there were no deaths from Pregnancy, Childbirth and Abortion.

Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 22 (9 male, 13 female). The crude death-rate was accordingly 7.01, which after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, as for births, was 8.48 and compares favourable with that of 11.6 for England and Wales.

The majority of those deaths were due to senile causes, i.e. Diseases of the Heart and Vascular System, which caused ten of them.

Disease of the Coronary Artery of the Heart is however not wholly a senile disease, for it is responsible for many deaths in middle age. There were three of these deaths, at the ages of 32, 66 and 87 years. The causes of Coronary Thrombosis and Atheroma are still obscure but many think that the increasing pace of modern existence is associated with the increasing number of deaths. Excessive smoking and the increasing consumption of sophisticated foods may also be associated factors.

Cancer, as expected, caused the second highest number of deaths i.e. 5. As in 1958, there were no deaths from Cancer of the Lung and it might be

postulated that the absence of atmospheric pollution in the Borough is a more important factor than the inhalation of tobacco smoke.

There were no deaths from the Infectious Diseases, which is a measure of the success of modern prevention and treatment.

Infectious Diseases

Few cases of Infectious Disease occurred in the Borough throughout the year.

Measles

This is primarily an infection of children and when a sufficient number of susceptible children has aggregated, which usually takes place every second year, an outbreak occurs. The virus is rapidly disseminated by coughing and sneezing in classrooms in the catarrhal phase of the infection before the rash appears and before parents suspect it.

Only five cases were notified during the year and none had any serious complications, the most serious of which in order of frequency are (1) Broncho-pneumonia, (2) Otitis Media and (3) Encephalitis or Encephalomyelitis.

Scarlet Fever

Five sporadic cases of this infection were notified and none required admission to the Infectious Diseases Hospital. The causal organism has lost much of the virulence of which it gave serious evidence in the earlier part of this Century and its former serious complications such as Endo-carditis, Otitis Media and Nephritis are relatively rare today.

Acute Primary or Influenzal Pneumonia

Two cases of this illness were notified and there were no deaths either from the Primary or Secondary Pneumonias, which is a reflection of the efficacy of modern treatment.

No other cases of Infectious Disease were notified during the year.

Tuberculosis

Five new cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified. All were in the older age-groups from 33 years upwards, and there was none in the 15 - 24 age-group which prior to around 1950 was the most vulnerable and contained the highest national notification rate. Facilities for ascertainment have been greatly improved within recent years, of which the Mass Radiography Service is the outstanding example. It is probable that the resistance of those of adolescent age has increased in this modern era, due to improved nutrition and social environment, complemented by B.C.G. vaccination which is offered to adolescents before they leave School.

There was one notified case of Non-Respiratory, i.e. Renal Tuberculosis, the source of which is unknown. Only designated milks such as Tuberculin-tested and/or Pasteurised or Sterilised Milks may now be sold within the District and it is unequivocal that the number of cases of Bovine Tuberculosis will stay reduced to an absolute minimum.

In conclusion, it may be stated that the public health of the Borough was very satisfactory throughout the year, and I wish to thank

you for your interest and assistance in the work of this Department and also the staff for their efficient co-operation.

There is a very ancient and historic borough, being situated in Devon
County, two and a half miles, and is a township of the Cinque Ports.
It is geographically situated, being situated in steep and fertile
valleys and fertile fields. There are also extensive beach quays and
wharves within the district. Of the sub-district, however, there is
largely devoted to the fishing industry, and therefore, there is
a large fishing fleet, and light-on-boat, which chiefly for the fishing-vessels.
Light-on-boat is a large for the purpose of boats, and there are extensive anti-
back and water routes to the south of the town, providing employment for
a number of civilians. Light-on-boat, which was used by a private enterprise
company, and situated in the N.E. of the old town, continues to expand.
This establishment provides employment for many local residents, as well
as for residents of the surrounding areas, and the Council has provided housing
accommodation for some of the residents of the town.

Parts of the extensive coastal area of the town, via Light-on-boat
and Grampian, continue to be developed for residential and holiday purposes.
Further progress was made during the year in the re-land of the town of
the Alameda Temporary Housing, as the acquisition of such housing, and
in the extension on the basis of two-story two-bedroom flats.
A further eight flats were completed during the year, bringing the total
number of flats erected to sixteen, and the total number of post-war housing
provision accommodation provided by the Council to 125 dwellings, which with 11
32 permanent houses and cottages erected prior to the 1914/15 war, makes a
grand total of 157 permanent dwellings. A further twelve flats are under
construction. In addition, the Council control a further six houses, and
will have eleven Alameda Temporary Housing, the latter being scheduled
for completion in 1950, after which the sites will be reserved for the
extension of flats.

During 1949, interest continued to be centred on the Central Electricity
Generating Board's proposals to construct a Nuclear Power Station of some
500,000 megawatts output at Bournemouth, West of the district, and to a large
degree on the Board's proposals to erect a concentrated solar station at Bournemouth.
In 1949, and 1950, various electricity lines from Light-on-boat, in connection
with the installation of electric power between towns and the country. On
17th July 1949, following the public inspection held on the 17th, 18th and 19th
October, 1949, and on the 10th, 11th and 12th December, 1949, the Minister
of Power gave his consent to the construction of the Nuclear Power Station
at Bournemouth, in the vicinity of the 15th of December 1949, at 11.15 a.m.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

Lydd is a very ancient and historic Borough, being mentioned in Saxon Charters from 740 AD onwards, and is a Corporate Member of the Cinque Ports. It is predominately agricultural, being chiefly concerned in sheep and cattle raising and arable farming. There are also extensive beach quarrying and crushing plants within the district. Of the sub-districts, Dungeness is largely devoted to the fishing industry, and Greatstone, where there is a large Holiday Camp, and Lydd-on-Sea, cater chiefly for the holiday-makers. Lydd Camp is a Depot for the Brigade of Guards, and there are extensive anti-tank and mortar ranges to the South of the Camp, providing employment for a number of civilians. Lydd Airport, owned and used by a private enterprise company, and situated to the N.E. of the old Town, continues to expand. This establishment provides employment for many local residents, as well as for residents of the surrounding areas, and the Council has provided housing accommodation for some of the permanent staff.

Parts of the extensive coastal area of the Borough, viz. Lydd-on-Sea and Greatstone, continue to be developed for residential and holiday purposes. Further progress was made during the year in the re-housing of the tenants of the Aluminium Temporary Bungalows, in the demolition of such bungalows, and in the erection on the sites of blocks of two-storey two-bedroomed flats. A further eight flats were completed during the year, bringing the total number of flats erected to sixteen, and the total number of post-war permanent housing accommodation provided by the Council to 134 dwellings, which with the 32 permanent houses and bungalows erected prior to the 1939/45 War, makes a grand total of 166 permanent dwellings. A further twelve flats are under construction. In addition, the Council control a further six houses, and still have eleven Aluminium Temporary Bungalows, the latter being scheduled for demolition in 1960, after which the sites will be re-used for the erection of flats.

During 1959, interest continued to be centred on the Central Electricity Generating Board's proposals to construct a Nuclear Power Station of some 500/550 megawatts output at Dungeness, West of the Lighthouse, and to a lesser degree on the Board's proposals to erect a converter Sub-Station at Pigwell, Lydd, and 275kV overhead electricity lines from Lydd to Canterbury in connection with the interchange of electric power between France and this Country. On the 11th July 1959, following the Public Inquiries held on the 22nd, 23rd and 24th October, 1958, and on the 16th, 17th and 18th December, 1958, the Minister of Power gave his consent to the construction of the Nuclear Power Station at Dungeness, to the erection of the 275 kV converter Sub-Station at Pigwell, to the erection of 275kV overhead electricity transmission lines from the Power Station to the Sub-Station, and to the erection of a 275kV overhead electricity transmission line from Lydd Sub-Station to Canterbury Sub-Station. In connection with the last-mentioned consent, the Board had made simultaneous applications for two routes which they considered to be equal from the amenity point of view. The Council supported the 'green' route which crosses the escarpment bounding Romney Marsh between Bonnington and Aldington, and then runs North-eastwards, and this route was approved by the Minister. The other route, the 'red' route, was to run close to the coast in the Dymchurch/Hythe area.

and then turn Northwards. The consent for the construction of the Dungeness Nuclear Power Station provides certain safeguards for the fishermen's and Nature Conservancy interests during the constructional period. Work on the Lydd Converter Sub-Station commenced towards the end of the year, and construction of the Nuclear Power Station is scheduled to commence in mid-1960, and to be completed in 1965.

Community life in the Town remains very much in evidence, and is a source of much local pride. There is almost no unemployment, and social conditions are generally satisfactory.
