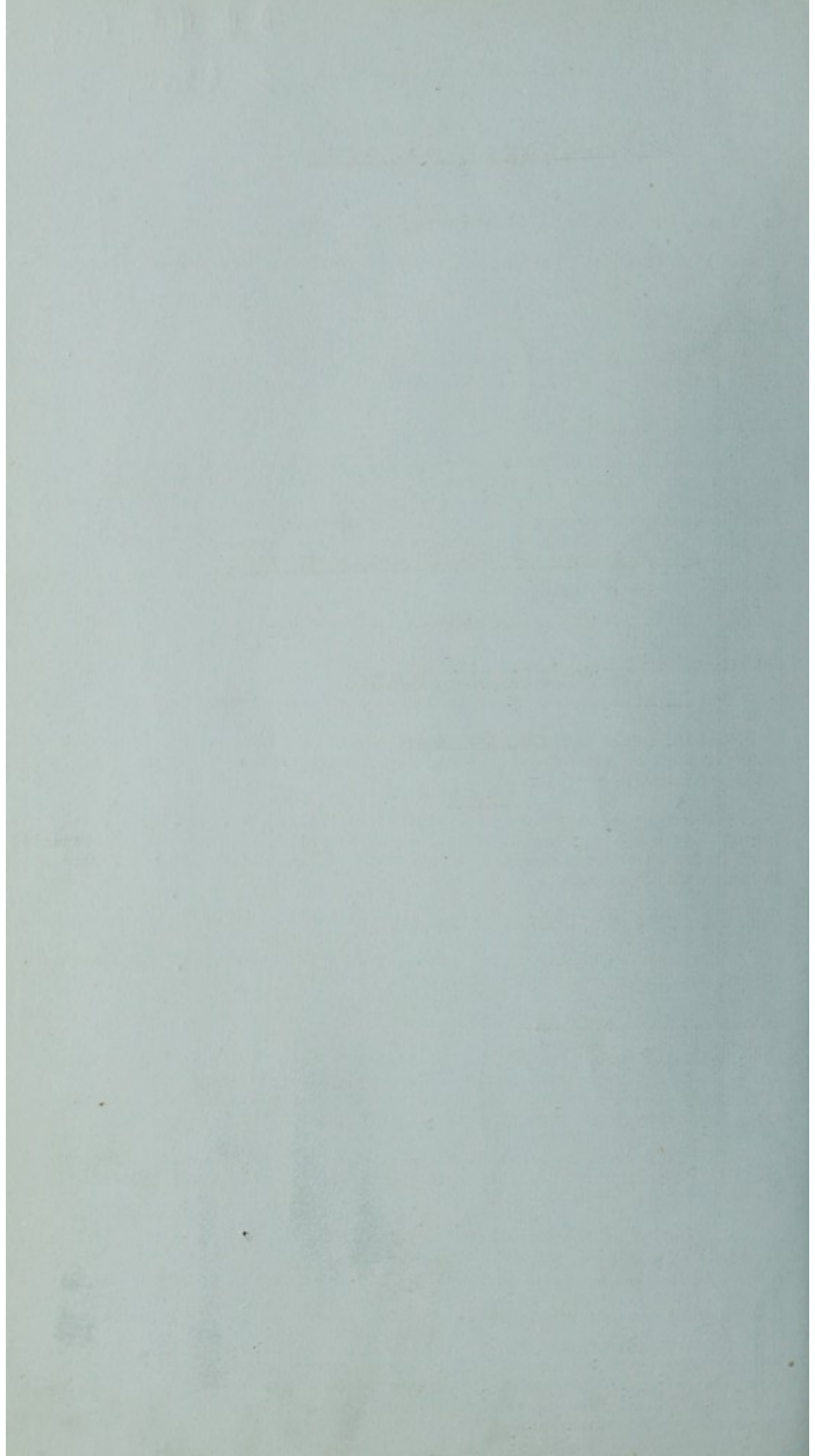

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1961.

Population

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 2,690 which was a decrease of 570 from that of the previous year.

Live Births and Birth Rate

The number of live births was 43, (19 M, 24 F.) i.e. 9 less than the previous year, and the crude birth rate was accordingly 15.95; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 15.63 and was lower than that of 17.4 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Stillbirth Rate

This rate was nil as there were no stillbirths.

Infantile Deaths and Infantile Mortality Rate

One infant death was registered due to:- Prematurity (2 days)

The Infantile Mortality Rate was accordingly 23.6 compared with that of 21.4 for England and Wales. (These figures are, however, too small for valid comparative rates).

The hard core of causes of Perinatal Mortality (i.e. stillbirths and infant deaths under one week of age) is prematurity, asphyxia and atelectasis, birth injuries and congenital malformations and the chief maternal factor is toxæmia of pregnancy.

Maternal Deaths and Maternal Mortality Rate

This rate was nil as there were no maternal deaths and is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Total Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 24 (19 M. 5 F) and the crude death rate was accordingly 8.92, which, after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, as for births, becomes 8.74 and was appreciably lower than that of 12.0 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of deaths was those from natural causes amongst the aged, namely Heart and Circulatory Diseases and Vascular lesions of the Nervous System; of those there were 16.

Disease of the Coronary Artery of the Heart was the cause of 6 (all male) i.e. approximately 37% of those deaths; there was one death between 51 and 60 years, 2 between 61 and 70 years and 3 between 71 and 80 years; i.e. 50% were over 71 years of age, and it would seem that degenerative processes are a more important causative factor than any other, including smoking.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the second highest cause of deaths; of those there were 5. Having regard to the insidious nature of the disease, delay by elderly persons is the most common factor associated with late diagnosis when the disease has become too advanced for other than palliative treatment.

Cancer of the Lung was the cause of one death - male, 52 years. The diagnosis and treatment of Lung Cancer are more difficult than the majority of Cancers of other sites of the body, as for example Cancer of the Breast, and the mortality is consequently higher.

Cancer of the stomach caused 2 deaths.

The Infectious Diseases caused no death and the other causes were miscellaneous.

The Infectious Diseases

A new era has been reached in the control, prevention and treatment of the Infectious Diseases. For example, immunisation against Diphtheria, and vaccination against Poliomyelitis have unequivocally proved their value, and it would seem that vaccination against Whooping Cough which was initiated at a later date, is creating a barrier against outbreaks of this distressful and dangerous children's illness. All the bacterial infectious diseases endemic in this Country can be successfully treated by the Sulpha drugs and/or Antibiotics.

Apart from a small outbreak of Measles, the Borough was very free from notifiable infectious diseases throughout the year.

Measles

Twenty-four cases were notified. Outbreaks usually occur when a sufficient number of susceptible children has aggregated, as the virus is endemic amongst children, but the disease is not serious, unless its complications, namely Broncho-pneumonia, Acute Suppurative Otitis Media and Acute Encephalitis, in that order of frequency, occur; these are, however, comparatively rare today.

Whooping Cough

Only two cases were notified. An increasing number of children are being vaccinated against the disease at Child Welfare Centres and by their family Practitioners, and the number of cases would seem to be decreasing in inverse proportion to the numbers who have been vaccinated. If so, another notable milestone will have been passed by medical science against a disease which has caused innumerable deaths and lung sequelae amongst children.

Acute Primary Pneumonia

Only one case of this illness was notified. There was no death from either the Primary or Secondary Pneumonias.

Tuberculosis

Two new cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified, both in the 15 - 24 year age group. The Chest Physician, after a thorough investigation including the assistance of the Mass Radiography Service, was unable to discover the source of infection.

There was no new case of non-Respiratory or Bovine Tuberculosis which is a general index of the safety of the Milk Supplies to the Borough.

Also no deaths were registered which may be regarded as a reflection of the efficacy of modern treatment.

In conclusion, it may be stated that the Public Health of the Borough was satisfactory throughout the year, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking you for your interest and support in the work of the department and the staff for their co-operation and efficiency.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

The ancient town of Lydd is situated in the extreme S.W. corner of Kent, part of its western boundary coinciding with the boundary between Kent and Sussex. The Borough of Lydd, the most extensive borough in the County, comprises the old town of Lydd, Dungeness, Lydd-on-Sea and part of Greatstone, the three latter areas being on the sea coast. Its 12,000 acres occupy the majority of the well-known foreland of Dungeness, and the resident population is a little under 2,700, although this figure is multiplied several times over in the holiday season. The area is very flat and visibility is good. Within the Borough boundaries are to be found the best and the poorest in soil formations - rich alluvium providing fattening pastures for at least ten sheep per acre and vast areas of shingle which although a very poor 'soil' does, nevertheless support some forms of hardy plant life.

The borough is predominantly agricultural in character, being chiefly concerned in sheep and cattle raising and arable farming, and there are a number of extensive beach quarrying and crushing plants within the district. There are $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles of coastline, and of the coastal sub-districts, Dungeness is largely devoted to the fishing industry, and Greatstone, where there is a large Holiday Camp, and Lydd-on-Sea, cater chiefly for the holiday makers. Development for residential and holiday purposes continues with no sign of abatement in the last-mentioned two areas.

The Council have provided 146 permanent houses during the post-war period, and with the 32 permanent houses and bungalows erected in the pre-war period, bring the total of permanent dwellings provided by the Council to 178. During the year, work commenced on a further 10 old-persons' one-bedroomed bungalows. In addition, the Council control a further six dwellings not originally provided by them. Discussions were held between the Central Electricity Generating Board and the Lydd and New Romney Borough Councils, arising out of which the two local authorities were each asked to provide not less than 50 dwellings for housing the key operational staff of Dungeness Nuclear Power Station. These proposals were agreed, and during the year the Lydd Borough Council made initial preparations for the erection of 34 houses during 1962/63.

During 1961, work on the construction of Dungeness Nuclear Power Station proceeded in accordance with the scheduled programme. When completed, this station will have an output of some 500/550 megawatts of electricity. The interchange of electric power between this Country and France via the 275kV supergrid from Canterbury, the new Converter Station near Figwell, Lydd, and the Cross-Chanel Cable, was officially inaugurated on a commercial basis during December 1961. Relations between the Council and the Central Electricity Generating Board and the various Contractors working on the Power Station Site and the converter Station continued to be most cordial.

The 'caravan' problem brought about by the influx of personnel employed at the Power Station, loomed large during the year, but by the end of the year there were signs that a licensed caravan site would be in operation in 1962.

Projects carried out in 1961 or in hand by the end of the year included:

substantial additions and improvements to street lighting at Lydd-on-Sea;
laying-down of a new cricket wicket on the Rype;
making of additional Good Rule & Government Byelaws,

and the year was marked by the gift to the Town of a well-appointed Sports Pavilion at Manor Road, and of approximately 11,000 feet of land fronting the coastal road at Greatstone and Lydd-on-Sea between the road and H.W.M.

Local organisations and societies cover a wide range of interests, and community life in the area remains very much in evidence. There is virtually no unemployment, and social conditions are generally satisfactory.
