ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH AND PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1968

Mr. Mayor, Alderman and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1968.

Population

The Registrar General's Estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 4,800 which was an increase of 630 over that of the previous year.

Live Births and Birth Rate

The number of live births was 105 (57 M. 48 F.) which was an increase of 14 over that of the previous year, and the crude birth rate was accordingly 21.8 after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 34,2 and was appreciably higher than that of 16.9 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Rate

No stillbirths were registered during the year. The rate per 1,000 total live and still-births for England and Wales was 14.8.

Infantile Deaths

There were two infant deaths registered during the year due to:-

- Cerebral Haemorrhage: Tentorial Tear: Precipitate delivery - 4 days.
- Asphyxia due to Inhalation of Vomit when deceased was asleep in a cot. Accidental Death - 2 months.

The infantile mortality rate was 19.0, compared with 18.0 for England and Wales.

Maternal Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was nil as there were no maternal deaths which is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Total Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 43 (25 M. 18 F.) and the crude death rate was accordingly 9.4 which, after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, as for births, becomes 12.2 compared with that of 11.9 for England and Wales.

The Chief group cause of deaths was those from natural causes amongst the agod, namely Heart and Circulatory Diseases and Vascular lesions of the Nervous System; of those there were 19.

Ischaemic Heart Diseases (i.e. Coronary Thrombosis and Coranary Atheroma) was the cause of 13 of those deaths. The deaths were in the following age-groups; 1 between 45 - 54; 2 between 55 - 64; 5 between 65 - 74 and 5 over 75 years. The causation is still obscure, but the disease is a common cause of death in old age.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the second highest cause of deaths - 15 in the following age groups; 1 between 25 - 34 years; 2 between 35 - 44; 2 between 55 - 64; 5 between 65 - 74 and 5 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Lung was the cause of 5 (4 M. 1 F.) deaths, in the following age-groups 1 between 55 - 64; 2 between 65 - 74 and 2 over 75 years.

The other causes of death were miscellaneous and there was no unusual mortality. There was no death from Infectious Disease.

Tuberculosis - no cases of Pulmonary or non-Pulmonary were notified and there were no deaths.

Health Services and Public Health Act, 1968

The Public Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations 1968 came into force on the 1st October, 1968, and, as requested by the Minister of Health, copies of these new Regulations and also copies of Section 47 to 49 of the Act of 1968 were sent to all medical practitioners in the area.

Under this new Act the following Infectious Diseases are now notifiable:-

The following diseases are now no longer notifiable:-

Cases of suspected cases of Food Poisoning are still required to be notified.

In conclusion, I would state that the Public Health of the Borough was satisfactory throughout the year and I would take this opportunity of thanking you for your support of and interest in the Department and also the staff for their co-operation and efficient service.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

The ancient town of Lydd is situated in the extreme south-east corner of Kent, part of its western boundary coinciding with the boundary between Kent and Sussex. The Borough of Lydd, the most extensive borough in the County, comprises the old town of Lydd, togother with the coastal areas of Dungeness, Lydd-on-Sea and Greatstone (part). Its 12,000 acres occupy the majority of the well-known foreland of Dungeness. The area is very flat, and visibility is good. Within the boundaries are to be found the best and the poorest soil formations - rich alluvium providing fatting pastures for at least ten sheep per acre, and vast areas of shingle which, although a very poor 'soil' does nevertheless support some forms of hardy plant life.

The Sorough is predominantly agricultural in character, being chiefly concerned in sheep and cattle raising and arable farming. There are a number of extensive beach quarrying and crushing plants witin the district. The War Department own approximately one-sixth of the Borough, from the west end of High Street down to the sea. Within it are Lee, Metford and Clarke Camps and extensive anti-tank, mortar, rifle and machine gun ranges. Lydd (Forryfield) Airport is situated one and a half miles from the centre of the town and many thousands of passengers and cars, in addition to large quantities of freight, are transported to and from the Continent.

The Borough has 9½ miles of coastline, and of the coastal districts, Dungeness is largely devoted to the fishing industry, and Greatstone, where there is a large Holiday Camp, and Lydd-on-Sea, cater chiefly for the holiday-makers. Development for residential and holiday purposes continues with no sign of abatement in the last-mentioned two areas. A total of 31 private dwellings were completed during the year.

Six old persons one-bedroom bungalows to Parker Morris standards were creeted at Park Street, Lydd, during the year.

The Central Electricity Generating Board, South East Region, having indicated that they required 70 houses for occupation by the key operational staff of Dungeness 'B' Nuclear Fower Station, and the New Romney Borough Council having indicated that they would not be able to provide any of these houses, the Council decided to proceed with the erection of 72 houses and one shop on land adjacent to 'The Derings' already purchased, of which 66 houses would be for occupation by the Generating Board's staff, with 6 for general needs. The preparation of the plans, etc. and the negotiations with the Ministry of Housing and Local Government were well advanced by the end of the year, with a view to the contract being let in March/April 1969

At the 31st December, 1968, the Borough Council had provided 338 permanent dwellings, as shown in the Table below. Thus, more than one-fifth of the dwellings in the Borough have been provided by the Council.

In addition, the Borough Council own a further six dwellings not originally provided by them.

Work on the construction of Dungeness 'B' Nuclear Power Station, which commenced in October 1965, continued throughout the year. The interchange of electric power between this country and France via the 400 Kv supergrid from Canterbury, the Converter Station near Pigwell, Lydd, and the Cross-Channel Cable, continued during the year.

The Wain Drainage Contract Works, which were commenced in October, 1967, proceeded throughout the year. Though not due for completion until October 1969, the bulk of the works was completed by the end of the year, the laying of sewers and laterals having been completed, and the majority of the constructional work at the enlarged Treatment Works and at the two additional Pumping Stations having been carried out. Final reinstatement of the sewer trenches in the streets is due to be carried out early in the New Year to be followed by the commissioning of the new Treatment Works in April 1969. A main sewer, with a Modern Treatment Will then be available to serve the whole of the built-up area of Lydd Town.

Community life in the Borough continued to be very much in evidence, and there are Local Organisations covering a wide range of interests. In the field of sport there are Angling, Badminton, Cricket, Football, Lawn Tennis, Table Tennis, and the Dungeness Sports and Social Clubs. For children and the youth of the Borough there are the Boy Scouts and Cubs, the Girl Guides and Brownies, the Methodist Youth Club and the Lydd Youth Set. Other interests are served by the Ancient Order of Foresters, British Legion (Men's and Women's Branches), Golden Needle League, Methodist Women's Guild, Hothers' Union, Oddfellows, Parents and Teachers Association, R.A.O.B., Royal Naval Association, St. John Ambulance Brigade, Seniors Club, Small Bore Rifle Club, Women's Institute, War Memorial Institute Club, Wildfowlers Society, etc. The Clubs and Societies again combined their efforts in organising the now Well-known "Lydd Club Day" on the third Saturday in June.

There was virtually no unemployment in the Borough and social conditions were generally satisfactory.
