Stillbirths and Births

There were no stillbirths registered during the year. The stillbirth rate per 1,000 total live and stillbirths was accordingly nil compared with 12.3 per England and Wales.

Infantile Deaths

There were no infant deaths registered during the year. The infantile mortality rate was accordingly nil compared with 17.0 for England and Wales.

Natural Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was also nil as there were no natural deaths which is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Total Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 21 (38.1 per 1,000) and the crude death rate was accordingly 7.1 which, after adjustment for the Registrar General's dependency factor, at the birth, became 10.1 compared with that of 12.4 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of death was heart and circulatory system amongst the men, mainly heart and circulatory diseases and vascular lesions of the nervous system, of these there were 21.

Ischaemic Heart Disease (I.H.D. Coronary Thrombosis and Coronary Arteriosclerosis) was the cause of 13 of these deaths. These deaths were in the following age-groups:- 1 between 15-44, 7 between 45-74 and 5 over 75 years. The concentration is still on the young, but the disease is a common cause of death in middle and old age.

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1972.

Population

The Registrar General's Estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 4,570 which was an increase of 200 over that of the previous year.

Live Births and Birth Rate

The number of live births was 51 (20M. 31F.) which was a decrease of 25 from that of the previous year, and the crude birth rate was accordingly 11.2 after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardized for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 12.7 and was lower than that of 14.8 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Rate

There were no stillbirths registered during year. The stillbirth rate per 1,000 total live and stillbirths was accordingly nil compared with 12.0 for England and Wales.

Infantile Deaths

There were no infant deaths registered during the year. The infantile mortality rate was accordingly nil compared with 17.0 for England and Wales.

Maternal Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was also nil as there were no maternal deaths which is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Total Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 51 (33M. 18F.) and the crude death rate was accordingly 11.2 which, after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, as for births, becomes 13.1 compared with that of 12.1 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of deaths was those from natural causes amongst the aged, namely Heart and Circulatory Diseases and Vascular lesions of the Nervous System; of those there were 21.

Ischaemic Heart Disease (i.e. Coronary Thrombosis and Coronary Atheroma) was the cause of 13 of those deaths. These deaths were in the following age-groups:- 4 between 55 - 64; 7 between 65 - 74 and 2 over 75 years. The causation is still obscure, but the disease is a common cause of death in middle and old age.

Coronary Atheroma of the Heart is also not an uncommon cause of death, often unsuspected in life, as revealed by post-mortem examinations.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the second highest cause of deaths - 10 in the following age-groups:- 2 between 55 - 64; 4 between 65 - 74 and 4 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Lung was the cause of 1M death in the 75+ age-group.

Cancer causes a relentless toll of human lives all over the world and is invariably the second highest cause of deaths of which heart and arterial diseases are the chief cause; the majority of the latter cases are due to old age and Coronary Thrombosis. However, many deaths from Cancer occur in younger age-groups, usually over the age of 40 years. The majority are in all probability due to delay by patients in seeking medical advice, having regard also to the fact that the onset of the disease is insidious or latent.

It is an old adage that 'prevention is better than cure', and there is sufficient modern knowledge about the causes of some forms of Cancer to enable their prevention.

Modern surgery and X-rays and other radiations used, singly or in combination, have transformed the treatment of this group of diseases.

Almost all skin Cancers and over 80% of Cancers of the Cervix of the Uterus can be cured if they are treated early.

The other causes of death were miscellaneous and there was no unusual mortality. There were no deaths from Infectious Disease.

Measles

There were 24 cases of Measles notified during the year compared with 129 during the previous year. Measles is still endemic and prevalent although vaccination is an inhibiting factor in the prevention of larger outbreaks; the serious complications of former years are now relatively infrequent and when they do occur are usually treated successfully by specific anti-biotics.

Food Poisoning

Only one sporadic case (1M.) 29 yrs. of age was notified during the year. This fact is an excellent tribute to the invaluable routine preventive work carried through by the Public Health Inspectorate.

Infective Jaundice

Only one case was notified compared with two in the previous year. Outbreaks are rare due chiefly to the generally higher standards of hygiene to-day.

Whooping Cough

Three cases of Whooping Cough were notified during the year compared with one during the previous year.

Meningitis

Only one case was notified. This serious infection was common during the War when a large number of soldiers was billeted in the area, but since then cases have been few and isolated. Occasionally isolated cases of Aseptic or Virus infection occur.

Tuberculosis

There were no new cases of Pulmonary or Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis notified during the year. New cases amongst youth are uncommon to-day compared with the relatively larger numbers of previous decades and is a reflection of the valuable work of the Tuberculosis and Mass Radiography Services, including B.C.G. vaccination. The pasteurization of milk has been the principal preventive factor.

Influenza

There was no outbreak of this dangerous infection throughout the winter.

A new era in the history of the prevalence of serious Infectious Diseases has been reached, in prevention and treatment. For example, the remarkable advance in this Century of medical science, with emphasis on the last 40 years, has prevented by vaccination and immunisation lethal and disabling infections such as Poliomyelitis, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and recently Measles and German Measles and by treatment with specific Anti-biotics and Sulpha drugs, diseases caused by bacteria such as Acute Meningitis, the Pneumonias, Puerperal Sepsis, Scarlet Fever, Erysipelas, Typhoid and Paratyphoid Fevers, and Food Poisoning etc.

Influenza, which is still epidemic in the winter months is by and large the most dangerous infection and it is still equivocal whether vaccination is preventive, unless a vaccine specific to the strain which is likely to become epidemic is prepared in time before the epidemic occurs. Fortunately there was no epidemic last winter.

All virus infections per se do not respond to treatment by the Anti-biotics or Sulpha drugs, but fortunately serious complications caused by bacteria usually respond successfully to treatment.

Vaccination against the virus of Measles has recently been introduced, and it is expected that the biennial outbreaks which occur will be eventually controlled. Vaccination is available at the Child Welfare Clinics and from the Family Doctor.

Vaccination against German Measles has been more recently introduced for girls aged 11 - 14 years who might in later years suffer from the infection during pregnancy and give birth to a baby with congenital defects.

Vaccination against Smallpox was discontinued at Child Welfare Centres on 30th July, 1971 as the Department of Health and Social Security consider mass vaccination of the child population to be unnecessary.

In conclusion, I would state that the Public Health of the Borough was satisfactory throughout the year and I wish to take this opportunity of thanking you for your support of and interest in the Department and also the staff for their co-operation and efficient service.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

The ancient town of Lydd is situated in the extreme south-east corner of Kent, part of its western boundary coinciding with the boundary between Kent and Sussex. The Borough of Lydd, comprises the old town of Lydd, together with the coastal areas of Dungeness, Lydd-on-Sea, and Greatstone (part). Its 12,000 acres include the well-known foreland of Dungeness. The area is very flat, and visibility potentially good. Within the Borough boundaries are to be found the best and the poorest soil formations - rich alluvium providing fattening pastures for at least ten sheep per acre, and vast areas of shingle which, although a very poor 'soil' does nevertheless support some forms of hardy plant life.

The Borough is predominantly agricultural in character, being chiefly concerned in sheep and cattle raising and arable farming. There are a number of extensive beach quarrying and crushing plants within the district. The War Department own approximately one-sixth of the Borough, from the west end of the High Street down to the sea. Within it are Lee, Metford and Clarke Camps and extensive anti-tank, mortar, rifle and machine gun ranges. Lydd (Ferryfield) Airport is situated one and half miles from the centre of the town and the Airport is now mainly concerned with providing private flying facilities and its eventual use is still in doubt.

The Borough has $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles of coastline, and of the coastal districts Dungeness is largely devoted to the fishing industry, and Greatstone, where there is a large Holiday Camp, and Lydd-on-Sea, cater chiefly for the holiday-makers. Development for residential and holiday purposes continues with no sign of abatement in the last-mentioned two areas. A total of 45 private dwellings were completed during the year.

The Vine Lands Housing Estate and Mittell Court old persons flats were completed during the year and H.R. Pratt-Boorman, Esq., officially opened Mittell Court on 8th November 1972.

By the end of the year the Borough Council had provided 397 permanent dwellings, as shown in the table below. Thus considerably more than one-fifth of the dwellings in the Borough have been provided by the Council.

In addition, the Borough Council own a further six dwellings not originally provided by them.

Work on construction of Dungeness 'B' Nuclear Power Station, which commenced in October 1965, continued throughout the year. The inter-change of electric power between this country and France via the 400 Kv supergrid from Canterbury, the Converter Station near Pigwell, Lydd and the Cross-Channel Cable also continued.

A total of 119 houses were connected to the main sewerage system during the year, which figure includes the estate of 58 Council dwellings. Main sewers and a modern treatment works are available to serve the whole of the built-up area of the town of Lydd with allowance made for the sewerage system to accept discharge from other areas planned for residential development and also provision made in the construction and layout of the treatment works for the eventual doubling of the capacity of the works should this ever be necessary.

Community life in the Borough continued to be very much in evidence, and there are Local Organizations covering a wide range of interests. In the field of sport there are Angling, Badminton, Cricket, Lawn Tennis, Table Tennis, and the Dungeness Sports and Social Clubs. For children and the youth of the Borough there are the Scouts and Cub-Scouts, Guides and Brownie-Guides, the Methodist Youth Club and the Lydd Youth Set. Other interests are served by the Ancient Order of Foresters, British Legion (Men's and Women's Branches), Golden Needle League, Methodist Women's Guild, Mother's Union, Odd-Fellows, Parent and Teachers Association, R.A.O.B., Royal Naval Association, St. John's Ambulance Brigade, Senior Club, Small Bore Rifle Club, Women's Institute, War Memorial Institute Club, Wildfowlers Society, etc. The Clubs and Societies again combined their efforts in organising "Lydd Club Day" on the third Saturday in June.

Official ceremonies for the twinning of Lydd with Etrecty, a town of similar size, situated approximately 30 miles south of Paris, were completed in May and exchanges between the inhabitants of the two towns have and are being arranged and it is hoped that these will continue to be extended.
