

During the year of 1941 there have been no serious epidemics of infectious fevers. There have been only 13 cases of Tuberculosis notified, i.e. roughly 1 for every 1000 of population, and there have been only 4 deaths from Tuberculosis, i.e. 1 for every 3000 of the population.

Out of 241 cases of infectious fevers notified there were only 5 deaths and of these five deaths, 2 died of cerebrospinal-fever and 3 of pneumonia. The remarkable drop in the death rate from pneumonia is most certainly due to the discovery of M & B 693.

Of two small epidemics of Measles and Whooping-cough there were no deaths notified. Two cases of Diphtheria and one of Typhoid were notified but the immediate isolation and strict precautions taken abated an epidemic in each case. The fact that there have been only 18 cases of infectious fevers admitted to the Isolation Hospital, speaks for itself.

Among the outstanding improvements in the Health Services during the year are the following:-

- (a) Chlorination of the Lydney Water Supply
- (b) Erection of a new Mortuary at Lydney
- (c) Erection of new wards at the Isolation Hospital
- (d) Large increase in the number of Diphtheria Inoculations
- (e) The cleanliness of the milk samples taken

(f) The improvement of the condition of the meat

In spite of war time conditions, with its rationing, over work, moving population etc., the health of the District has been exceptionally good.

#### GENERAL.

### RATS & MICE DESTRUCTION ACT, 1919.

As the result of my report to the Council at their meeting held on the 20th May 1941, re Rat Infestation of the Lydney and Aylburton Refuse Tips, the Council entered into a three year agreement with the Gloucestershire County Council on the 20th June 1941, for the destruction of rats in the above tips.

Also the culverts under these refuse tips have been extended and the tips levelled. This work was carried out under the supervision of the Council's Engineer & Surveyor H.Russell, Esqr.

### QUEEN STREET CULVERT.

In May 1941 complaints were received that W.C.'s from certain houses in Queen Street, Lydney, were connected to the culvert.

With the kind assistance of Mr.G.J.Elliott (jun) of the County Council's Divisional Surveyor's Office, the drains from 32 houses were examined and tested with the result that two drains from Nos.31 & 33, respectively were found to be discharging sewage into the culvert. These were immediately disconnected from the culvert and connected to the sewer.

### DECONTAMINATION OF FOODSTUFFS SERVICE.

In view of the Ministry's letter dated 24th November 1939 the Memorandum M.F.G.I., and covering letter M.F.G.2., of the 24th June, 1940, and the letter M.F.G.3., of the 31st January, 1941, relating to foodstuffs (including animal feeding-stuffs) contaminated with Poison Gas and a further letter enclosing M.F.G.4., dated 14th March 1941, setting out arrangements which the Minister desires to make for dealing with foodstuffs thus contaminated, I was instructed by the Council to deal with this urgent matter.

After consultation with the Lydney Food Executive Officer, a meeting of the Lydney & District traders was arranged. The reason in calling this meeting was explained to the traders, who after a very useful discussion decided to form a committee of seven traders with the Food Officer and myself.

Eleven employees from the various food trades joined the Food Treatment Squad and as L.A.R.P. Instructor in Air Raid Precautions instruction in Anti-Gas was given at an early date, with the result that all members were successful in passing the examination which was carried out by S.J.Hotchkiss, Esq., B.Sc., L.A.G.C. Further training is being given in the treatment and disposal of foodstuffs contaminated by Poison Gas.
