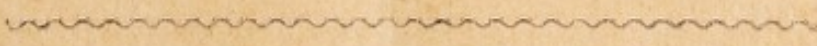

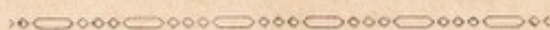

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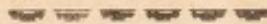

GENTLEMEN,

Area of District, 80,409 acres.
Population (1891), 17,329.
Townships in Districts, 38.

During the year 1898 there have been registered 435 births (229 males, 206 females), the natural increase for the year being 191.

The birthrate is 25·27 per 1,000 per annum, and the rate of mortality is 14·08 per 1,000 per annum. 27·04 per cent. of the total deaths were children under five years of age, against 20·77 per cent. of last year. 37·704 per cent. were persons of 65 years and upwards against 37·66 of 1897.

The rate of infant mortality, measured by the proportion of deaths of children under one year of age per 1,000 born, is 101·14, against 70·21 of 1897. The rate of mortality of males of all ages per 1,000 of population is 6·81, and of females 7·27.

The death rate from zymotic diseases per 1,000 of population is 17, against 63 of last year.

SMALLPOX.—No cases.

SCARLET FEVER.—79 cases were notified, of which two in the district of Prestbury died.

DIPHTHERIA.—5 cases were notified, namely, 1 in Gawsworth, 2 in Prestbury, 1 in Rainow, and 1 in Sutton. No deaths occurred from this disease.

MEMBRANEOUS CROUP.—1 case was notified from Prestbury.

TYPHUS FEVER.—No case notified.

TYPHOID FEVER.—9 cases were notified from 5 townships. 1 case in Gawsworth died.

PUERPERAL FEVER.—No case notified.

ERYSIPELAS.—2 cases were notified from this disease—1 in the township of Alderley and 1 in Sutton. Both recovered.

MEASLES.—4 deaths were due to this disease—1 in Gawsworth and 3 in Prestbury.

WHOOPIING COUGH.—1 death occurred in Alderley.

RHEUMATIC FEVER.—No deaths.

PHTHISIS.—13 deaths were due to this disease against 7 of last year—2 in Alderley, 2 in Bollington, 2 in Gawsworth, 5 in Prestbury division, 1 in Rainow, and 1 in Sutton.

BRONCHITIS, PNEUMONIA, AND PLEURISY.—56 deaths were due to these diseases against 33 of last year.

HEART DISEASE.—19 deaths against 24 of last year.

INFLUENZA.—4 deaths occurred—1 in Gawsworth and 3 in Prestbury.

INJURIES.—2 deaths in Prestbury.

ALL OTHER DISEASES.—139 deaths against 133 of last year.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.---There have been during the past year 65 outbreaks of infectious disease in the six sub-districts, embracing a total of 96 cases, the majority of which were scarlet fever. The result is totalled as follows:--79 cases of scarlet fever, 5 of diphtheria, 2 of erysipelas, 9 of typhoid fever, and 1 membranous croup.

ALDERLEY.---In this district there were 2 outbreaks, and 2 cases, 1 of scarlet fever and 1 of erysipelas. No deaths occurred, and in each case the sanitary conditions were satisfactory. This district has been remarkably free from infectious sickness.

BOLLINGTON.---There were in this district 11 outbreaks, embracing 20 cases of infectious disease. Of these 16 cases were scarlet fever and 4 typhoid fevers. Of the eleven places where outbreaks occurred, 7 were in good sanitary condition. Two were fair, and two had defective drainage.

GAWSWORTH.---From this district were notified 3 outbreaks and 4 cases--2 scarlet fever, 1 diphtheria, and 1 typhoid fever. Of the three places inspected, 2 were in good sanitary condition, and 1 was defective. There was 1 death from typhoid fever.

PRESTBURY.---In this district there were 23 outbreaks and 35 cases. Of these 31 were scarlet fever, 2 were diphtheria, 1 was typhoid, and 1 membranous croup. There were 2 deaths from scarlet fever, in neither of which could the source of infection be traced. In three places investigated the sanitary conditions were defective, but in the other places they were satisfactory.

RAINOW.---From this district 17 outbreaks were notified; embracing 30 cases, 28 of which were scarlet fever, 1 diphtheria, and 1 typhoid fever. There were not any deaths from infectious diseases in this district. One case was distinctly traceable to bad water, and in other places the sanitary conditions were defective.

SUTTON.---There were in this district 3 individual cases of infectious disease, 1 of diphtheria, 1 of typhoid fever, and 1 of erysipelas. The sanitary conditions of this sub-district were generally good, but in one the drainage was defective. There were not any deaths.

POYNTON.---There was an outbreak of measles in this township. This epidemic outbreak of measles, although it seized almost every child in the neighbourhood, showed no violence in its attack; the cause of death in each case was broncho-pneumonia, one of the sequelæ of measles, which occurred probably by going out too soon when convalescent. One of these deaths occurred at 9 years, two at 6, one at 5, three at 4, two at 3, one at 2, four at 6, and one under twelve months--total 14. All the schools were closed in consequence of the very general outbreak of this disease. After being closed for six weeks, the schools have been cleansed and re-opened, so far without any re-appearance of the disease.

MORTALITY FROM PHTHISIS.--In 1876 there were 26 deaths in the Macclesfield Rural Sanitary District. The highest number of deaths was in 1879 when it reached 28, and was equalled again in 1882. The lowest record was in 1897, being only 7. Since 1890 the average gives a steadily decreasing rate of mortality from this disease.

When making a special examination of the township of Adlington with reference to several cases of scarlet fever having occurred, I called at Wood-lane School, which I found not in a satisfactory condition. I advised the Council to order its closure in order to make such alterations and repairs as were needful. This was effected under the supervision of Mr. Thorp, our surveyor.

In October there was a very general outbreak of whooping cough amongst the children attending Prestbury National School. I advised the Council to close it for a time, and the disease passed away without any extension.

On receipt of notification of infectious disease I have visited the dwellings and localities where the outbreaks occurred, and have given instructions to competent persons to adopt available means to prevent its extension.

The source of the milk supply is noted, and frequently the cattle are inspected. For the present I have not traced anything amiss to the distribution of milk.

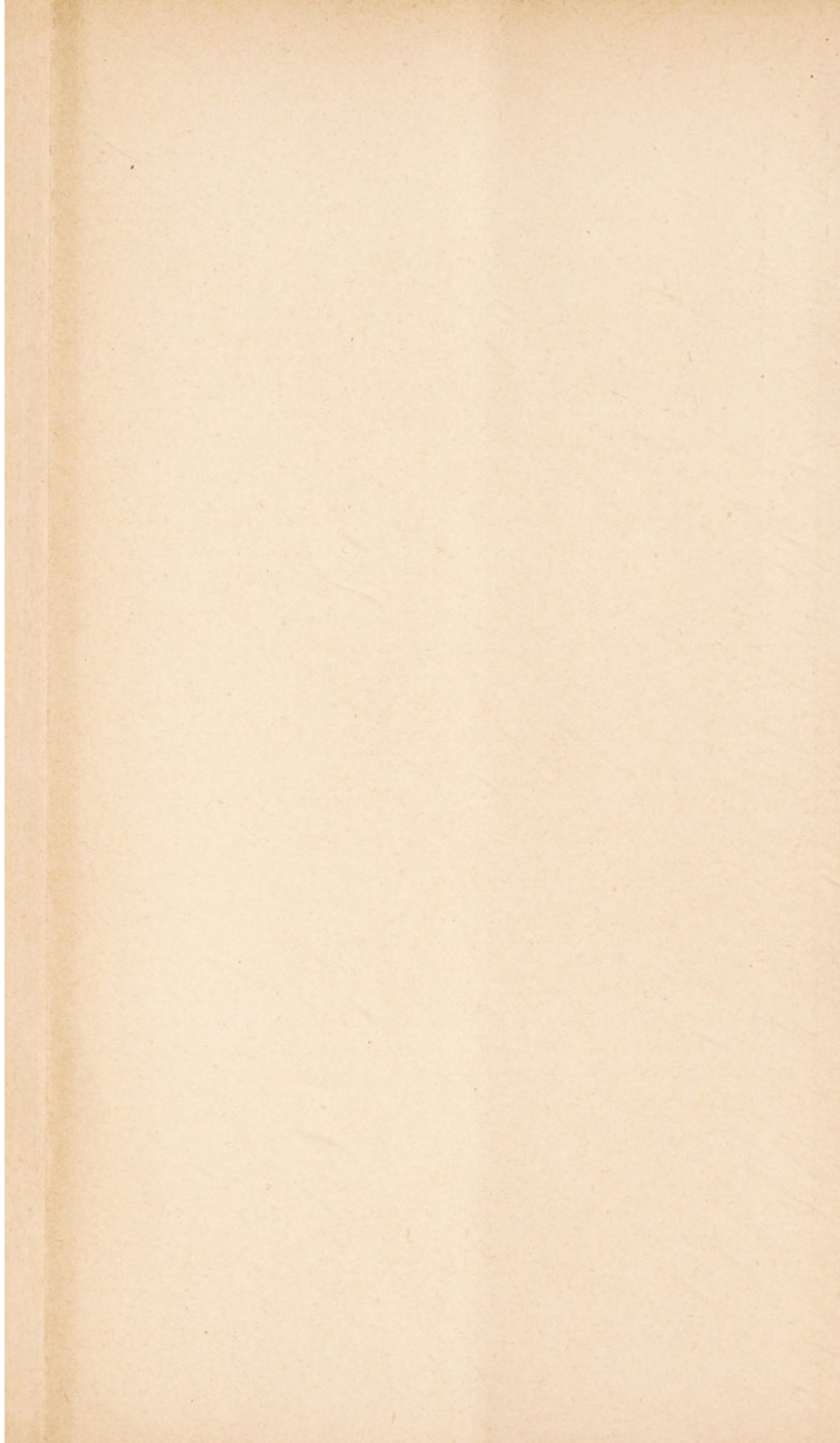

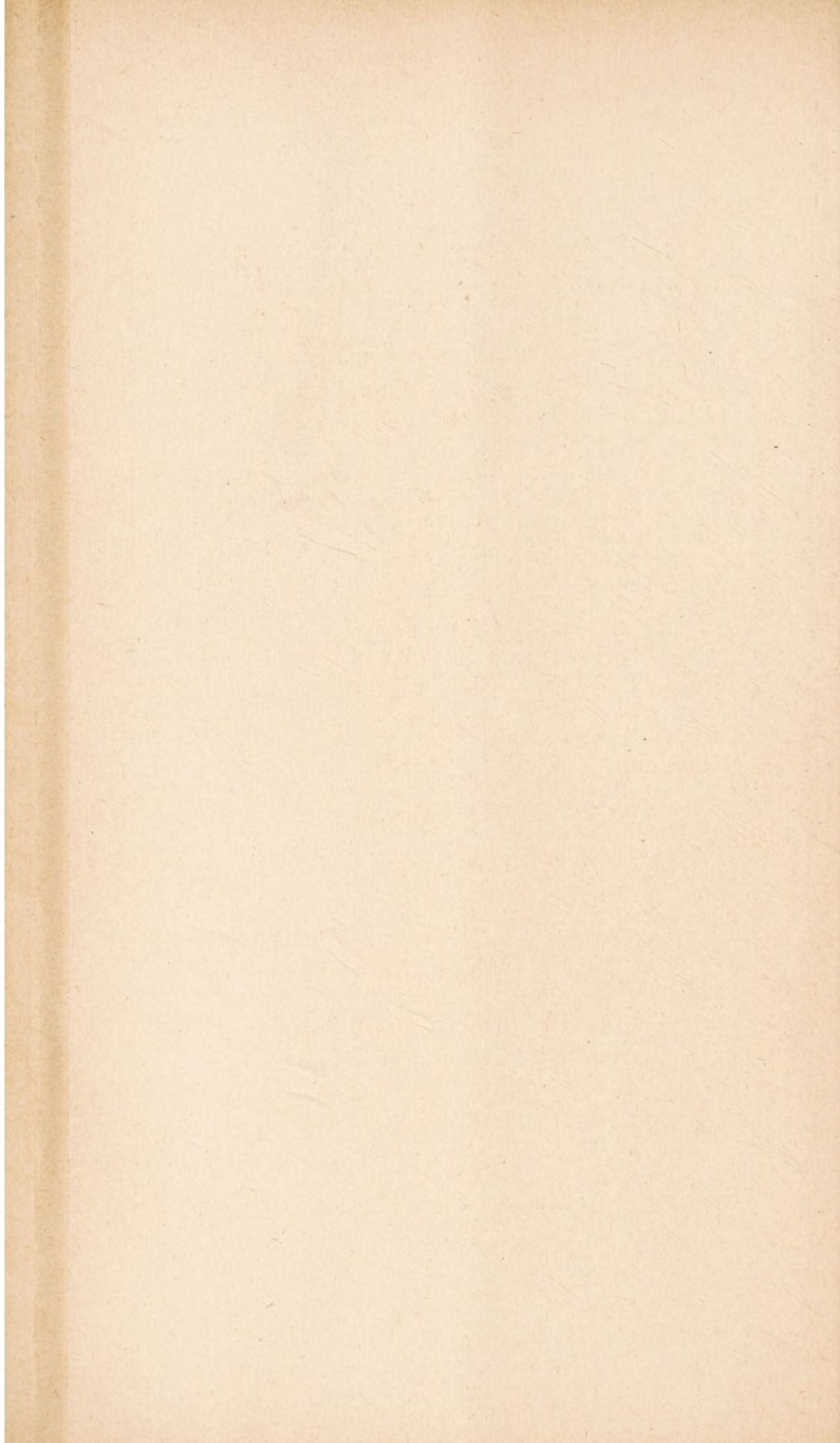

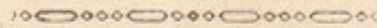

To the Macclesfield Rural District Council.

Gentlemen,—

I have the honour to submit to you my Tenth Annual Report, showing what has been done in your district in my department during the year, 1898.

Area of district (acres)	80,409

1 Waste-pipe was disconnected from a drain.

25 new House-drains of glazed stoneware socketted pipes were laid where none previously existed, or to replace inefficient ones.

65 Inlets to drains were trapped.

2 Defective Water Closets in houses were replaced by efficient ones.

24 New Privies were built. Many others were re-arranged to prevent exposure of their contents to any rainfall or drainage.

8 Houses which were so damp as to be injurious to the health of the occupants, were improved by the provision of means for carrying off the roof water, by structural repairs, or by draining the sites.

7 Sleeping-rooms were provided with means of efficient ventilation.

Many other Nuisances arising from blocked drains, inefficient drainage disposal, the keeping of swine and other animals, accumulations of house and other refuse, &c., were abated.

17 Statutory Notices were served for the abatement of nuisances. In no case were legal proceedings taken.

Sulphur for fumigation, and other disinfectants, were supplied to houses in which cases of infectious diseases had occurred, to the instructions of the Medical Officer of Health.

The Slaughter-houses were visited at intervals, and were usually found clean and in good order.

The Effluent Outfalls from the Sewage Disposal Works at Alderley Edge, and at Fulshaw, were visited at intervals, where they discharge into streams in your district. The effluents on each occasion appeared to be satisfactory.

37 Houses were supplied with New or Improved Water Supplies.

3 Samples of Water were sent for analysis, two of which were reported unfit for domestic use. Steps were at once taken in each of these cases to prevent the water being used for domestic purposes.

4 Certificates for 12 houses were granted under the Public Health (Water) Act, 1878.

8 Persons were registered under the Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order, 1885,

361 Persons are now registered. Most of the premises were visited, and were usually found in satisfactory order with regard to cleanliness.

9 Sets of Plans of New Buildings were approved. The buildings during the course of their erection were visited frequently to see that the Bye-laws were being adhered to.

29 Canal Boats were inspected under the Canal Boats Acts, 1877 and 1884.

The Boats were registered for 88 adults, and they carried 48 men, 9 women, and 11 children, a percentage of 70·6, 13·2, and 16·2 respectively, as compared with 66·2, 14·7, and 19·1 in the previous year.

The few irregularities met with were amended without any legal proceedings having to be taken.

No case of Infectious Disease was met with.

The pollution of Whitfield Brook, in Upton, by sewage from Park-side Asylum has been discontinued. The Asylum sewage is now discharged into the Macclesfield Corporation sewers.

The Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Works at Poynton were commenced early in May, and are now nearly completed.

A Local Enquiry was held by G. W. Willcocks, Esq., M.Inst.C.E., at Bollington Cross, on the 4th November, into the subject matter of the application made to the Local Government Board for their approval of a Loan for £650 for the purposes of Sewerage and Sewage Disposal at Bollington Cross.

Application has been made to the Local Government Board for sanction of a loan of £2,400 for the purposes of extending the Macclesfield Corporation Water Mains to portions of the Townships of Upton, Fallibroome, Prestbury, Tytherington, Butley, and Kerridge.

A Provisional Agreement has been made with the Corporation of Macclesfield for a supply of water by meter for distribution in these Townships.

The proposal to form a Joint District, comprising portions of the Rural Districts of Chapel-en-le-Frith, Disley, and Macclesfield, and of the Urban Districts of New Mills and Yeardsley-cum-Whaley for the purposes of Water Supply has been abandoned.
