The Report follows closely the lines laid down in the Circular of the Board of Education relating to School Medical Officers' Reports, and as far as possible, all matter which has been described in previous Reports, has been emitted so as to reduce the cost of printing. The new and simplified form of Tables recommended for use by the Board have been adopted. There are no exceptional features in connection with the year's work calling for special comment, and I have, as in former years, to acknowledge the ready assistance given by other members of the School Medical Service in the carrying out of the prescribed work.

Maidenhead School Medical Officer's Report

for the year, 1923.

1. <u>Staff</u>. There has been no change in the personnel of the School Medical Staff which remains the same as described in paragraph 1 of the Report for 1920.

2. <u>Co-Ordination</u>. This remains as described in paragraph 2 of the Report for 1921.

3. The School Medical Service in relation to Public Elementary Schools.

(a) School Hygiene. The following works have been carried out during the Year 1923.

4. <u>Medical Inspection</u>. This is conducted on the lines laid down in various circulars issued by the Board. The details have been amply described in previous Reports.



5. Findings of Medical Inspection. The actual number of children examined at School in the Routine Groups were : Entrants, 156, Intermediates, 180, Leavers, 230 ; Total 566. In addition there were 392 inspections of special cases. The number of infants and intermediates examined is considerably less than in the previous year, and this is accounted for largely by the fact that admissions to schools are much fewer than in previous years.

Uncleanliness. Great improvement in personal cleanliness (a) has been effected during recent years, thanks largely to surprise visits paid to the various schools by the School Nurse. Amongst the routine groups of children, only 2 were found infected with vermin in the head, this being the lowest figure yet recorded, but in 107 cases, although no actual vermin were discovered at the time of inspection, nits were present. This number is still far too high, but nevertheless, it is a considerable improvement upon any previous figures. Ragged and dirty clothing and bad footwear were as much in evidence as in the previous year. The number being, 54 untidy, 6 dirty, and 50 cases where the footwear was marked as bad. It may be remarked however, that the bulk of these cases are found in certain well known families, which seem incapable of rising to a reasonable standard of cleanliness and tidiness.

(b) Minor Ailments. Nothing further need be added to the remarks which have appeared under this head in previous Reports. A very large number of cases are dealt with daily at the School Clinic, a fair proportion of them being ailments of a trivial nature, but nevertheless, such as might have serious results if neglected. Details of the numbers dealt with under this head will be found in Table II. of the Appendix.

(c) Tonsils and Adenoids. The number of cases of enlarged tonsils and adenoids requiring operative treatment, becomes smaller and smaller each year as the effect of the work done in previous years becomes apparent. Many children present some degree of enlargement in one or both tonsils, but only such cases as present distinct symptoms are recommended for treatment. Altogether 18 notices were issued advising removal of tonsils and adenoids, 14 of which were treated under the Local Authority's Scheme and 4 by private practitioners. On the other hand, in 35 cases, this treatment had already been secured before the child had matured for medical inspection.

(d) Tuberculosis. Only one case of suspected tuberculosis was met with in the course of routine inspection. This small number is explained by the fact that as soon as the presence of this disease is suspected the patient is sent up to the Minor Ailments Clinic and dealt with as a special case, without waiting for routine inspection at school. In this way, 6 definite cases of tuberculosis and 8 suspected cases were taken in hand during the course of the year. One case of tuberculous glands of the neck was discovered at the routine inspection and five cases of other forms of nonpulmonary tuberculosis were dealt with at the Clinic.

(e) Skin Disease. Ringworm of the scalp, which used to figure largely under this head, is now reduced to very small proportions. Only one case was discovered amongst the routine groups and 6 other fresh cases were dealt with at the Clinic. By an arrangement entered into with Dr. David Arthur, 5, North Common Road, Ealing, W. 5., on the 29th May, 1923, children suffering from this troublesome disease can be sent to him on certain days for X-Ray treatment, and so far, the results have been uniformly satisfactory. In necessitous cases, the travelling expenses are paid by the Local Authority.

Scabies, which a few years ago, reached considerable proportions, as many as 80 cases being reported in one year, has now been got in hand, and though 18 cases were discovered and treated, the disease is not likely to be so widespread as it was, thanks to the facilities now provided at the Clinic for bathing and disinfecting the clothing of infected children. Impetigo and similar sores make up the bulk of the skin cases that were dealt with, the number coming to just over 100.

(f) External Eye Disease. The majority of the cases under this head are dealt with at the Clinic, where they are sent by the teachers as soon as the condition is noted. Five cases of Blepharitis and 1 case of Conjunctivitis were noted at routine inspection, while 15 of the former and 10 of the latter were special cases at the Clinic.

(g) Vision. As described in previous reports, the School Oculist attends at the Clinic on the fourth Wednesday of each month throughout the year, except during August, for the purpose of measuring the refraction and prescribing glasses, and dealing with any other forms of defective vision or eye disease. Details of the work under this head will be found in Group 2 of Table IV. The spectacles prescribed at the Clinic are provided at a special rate by Messrs. Kirby & Sons, 15, Oxford Street, Reading, such prices varying from 3/6 to 7/3. Amongst the routine groups, 16 children were already wearing glasses prescribed for them at the Clinic.

(h) Ear Disease and Hearing. Most of the cases of discharging ears are sent for immediate treatment at the Clinic, so that comparatively few remain to be discovered at the routine inspections. The actual cases appearing in the routine groups for 1923 were, 2 with discharge from the left ear, 1 from the right ear, and 2 others with other affections of the ear. Four children showed a marked degree of deafness in both ears, and 1 in the left ear only.

(i) Dental Defects. A summary of the work done by the School Dentist is given in Group 4. of Table IV, where it will be noted the greater proportion of the time allotted to this work, is devoted to treatment rather than to inspection.

(j) Crippling Defects. The cases under this head do not call for special comment. The 5 cases appearing in the routine groups had already been placed under treatment as special cases at the Clinic.

7. Following up. The methods adopted for following up children who have been recommended for treatment, have been described at length in paragraph 7 of the report for 1920. No change in these arrangements has taken place.

8. Medical Treatment

(a) Minor Ailments. The working arrangements at the Clinic at the Town Hall where minor ailments are treated remains the same as described in paragraph 8 of last year's report. The number of Children who attended the Clinic during the year 1923 was 345 and the number of attendances 1131.

(b) Tonsils and Adenoids. The scheme for treatment of tonsils and adenoids remains the same as described in paragraph 8 of the report for 1921.

(c) Tuberculosis. The remarks made in the corresponding paragraph in last year's Report still hold good. (d) Skin Disease. The majority of these are of a trivial nature and are dealt with at the minor ailments Clinic. One or two of the more severe forms of skin disease, e.g. Eczema and Psoriasis, have been sent to special Hospitals for expert advice and directions as to treatment.

(e) External Eye Disease. Cases of minor severity are dealt with at the Clinic. The more severe cases are referred to the School Oculist for advice and directions as to treatment.

(f) Defective Vision. An Eye Clinic is held on the fourth Wednesday of each month throughout the year, (except during August). The arrangements for examining cases and obtaining spectacles, remain the same as described in previous Reports. There were no operations for squint.

(g) Ear Disease and Hearing. There is nothing further to add to the paragraph which appeared under this head in last year's Report.

(h) Dental Defects. The number of examinations of children by the School Dentist at the Schools has been considerably curtailed this year because of the number of half Sessions devoted to filling and conservative treatment. Also a considerable number of casual cases have been dealt with. Numerical details of the work done appears in Table IV., Group 4.

(j) Crippling Defects and Orthopaedics. There is no special scheme for the treatment of defects under this head, but such cases as are brought to the notice of the School Medical Officer are dealt with by referring them to a special hospital or local charities.




