To the Mayor, Alderman, Councillors and Burgesses of
the Borough of Maldon.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Interim Report
on the Health and Sanitary Circumstances of the Borough
during the year 1940.

Despite the strain of war, the necessary restrictions in
diet, and the Black-out conditions in a Winter of except-
ional severity, no noticeable deterioration in the Health
of the community has occurred.

We have been free from any serious epidemic. The work of
the Public Health Department has as far as possible been
maintained, whilst meat inspection performed for the Min-
istry of Food has entailed a good deal of work for my
Sanitary Inspector, and I should like to pay tribute to
the willingness with which he has carried out this task.

In view of the striking results obtained by Diphtheria
Immunisation in this country and abroad, this procedure
was offered free to children of Pre and School age during
the year. The response was gratifying, and it is hoped that
in time that a large percentage of the children will be
immunised from this dread disease. A total of 695 children
of the Borough were immunised, whilst 52 child evacuees also
received the treatment.

The Civil Defence Services are now, on the whole, well manned,
and are efficient, though by great good fortune the organisation
in the Borough itself has not been put to the test. The
Military Service Acts, however, from time to time make calls
upon our personnel, and these vacancies at this stage are hard
to fill, and especially as regards Part-time personnel, where
there are still many deficiencies.

Certain personnel in the Borough have received training in
the protection of Foodstuffs against Poison Gases.

I should like to take this opportunity of thanking the Members
of the Council and the Officials for the assistance given me
at all times.

SECTION C.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

1. Water. The Borough, with the exception of a few outlying portions, is served by a piped supply which is in the hands of the Corporation. Routine chemical and bacteriological examinations of the waters are carried out. The results of these analyses during the year have been very satisfactory.

The Bakehouses and Prepared Food Premises were kept in a cleanly state throughout the year which showed much credit to the occupiers especially under the trying conditions of war with shortage of man power.

The Factories and Workshops were found to be generally well provided for in respect of closet accommodation, lighting, etc; but due to the Black out, it is often found that the ventilation leaves something to be desired.

SECTION. F.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

Milk. The Farms, Dairies, and Milkshops are regularly inspected to see that the provisions of the Milk and Dairies Orders are being observed. Generally speaking a high standard of cleanliness was observed on these premises. Samples are taken for examination by the Methylene Blue Reduction Test.

Inspection of Meat and Other Foods.

The inspection of meat is carried out in accordance with the Memorandum on Meat Inspection issued by the Ministry of Health by a Qualified Inspector of Meat and Other Foods. Since the beginning of the scheme of the Ministry of Food for centralised slaughtering, two slaughterhouses are in use which supply the needs of the Borough and surrounding areas.

SECTION. F.

Infectious Diseases.

The number of cases of Infectious Diseases notified during year was not large.

Anti-toxin is used promptly in all suspected cases of Diphtheria by the Medical Practitioners in the Borough, and supplies are available at the Municipal Offices and the Heybridge Isolation Hospital.
