

Report of the Public Health Inspector.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure that I present, for the seventeenth year, this portion of the Annual Report.

More Acts, Regulations, Statutory Instruments and Codes of Practice, thus the avalanche of paper continues. If we could but have one whole year without any new legislation, we could all take a deep breath and perhaps have some time to put into practice the requirements of all the legislation already enacted.

The amount of new private housing development continues at a high level in the Borough and this is likely to be progressive as it is planned that the population will increase to 18,000 by 1981. It is with pleasure that I present, for the seventeenth year, this portion of the Annual Report.

More Acts, Regulations, Statutory Instruments and Codes of Practice, than the average of any other authority. It is not only that we have one year without any new legislation, we could all take a deep breath and perhaps have some time to put into practice the requirements of all the legislation already enacted.

The amount of new private housing development continues at a high level in the Borough and this is likely to be progressive as it is planned that the population will increase to 8,000 by 1981.
