

To the Mayor, Aldermen and the Councillors of the Borough of Maldon.

Madam Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my tenth Annual Report on the sanitary conditions of the Port of Maldon, covering the year ending 31st December, 1963

During the year conditions in the Port have been satisfactory and no nuisances in shipping have been observed.

It was not possible to spare the time to attend the Annual Meeting of the Port Health Authority this year but the new regulations covering smallpox quarantine have been received.

In the early part of the year the exceptionally cold weather lead to a high rate of mortality amongst oysters and during December a further cold spell interferred with the cleansing processes in the oyster tanks. Arrangements have been made with the oystermen concerned modifying the cleansing process to cater for low temperatures and there appears to be no reason to think that there will be any effect on the quality of Blackwater oysters, which are probably the best in the country.

I am again indebted to your Port Health Inspector for his help in preparing this report.

The chief supplies are obtained: At Maldon and Heybridge Basin from the Corporations water mains. At Tollesbury from the Public Supply. These are all above suspicion.

Frequent samples of the public water supply are submitted for bacteriological analysis. These always give results of the highest quality and the Analyst has always expressed himself entirely satisfied with the purity of the public water supply in the Port Health District.

## (3) Hydrants & Hose Pipes.

The stand pipe at Heybridge Basin is efficiently maintained and satisfactory. Vessels are expected to provide their own hose-pipes.

(4) For Shipping in the River: From a water boat from Brightling-sea in the Colchester Port District. There is only water boat. The sanitary condition of this vessel is satisfactory.
