(1) For the Port. Water from the local public supplies is obtained at various Creeks for barges.

The chief supplies are obtained: At Maldon and Heybridge Basin from the Corporations water mains. At Tollesbury from the public supply. These are all above suspicion.

(2) Analysis of Water Samples.

Frequent samples of the public water supply are submitted for bacteriological analysis. These give results of the highest quality and the Analyst has expressed himself entirely satisfied with the purity of the public water supply in the Port Health District.

(3) Hydrants & Hose Pipes.

The stand pipe at Heybridge Basin is efficiently maintained and satisfactory. Vessels are expected to provide their own hosepipes.

(4) For Shipping in the River: From a water boat from Brightlingsea in the Colchester Port District. There is only one water Boat. The sanitary condition of this vessel is satisfactory.
