

- i. a) District Water Supply This is provided by the Essex Water Company throughout the whole of the Port Health District.
- 1. b) Supplies for Shipping These are provided from hydrants at suitable positions connected to the mains of the Essex Water Company.
- 2. a) Analysis of Public Water Supples Frequent samples of the public water supply are submitted for bacteriological analysis. These give results of the highest quality and the Analyst has expressed himself entirely satisfied with the purity of the public water supply in the Port Health District.
- 2. b) Analysis of Ship Supplies No sampling or tests have been undertaken of the distribution and storage systems of ships visiting the port.
- 5. Hydrants & Hosepipes The hydrants & stand pipes are all efficiently maintained. Vessels are expected to provide their own hosepipes.
- 4. For Shipping in the River: From a water boat from Brightlingsea in the Colchester Fort District. There is only one water Boad. The sanitary condition of this vessel is satisfactory.

SECTION VI - Public Health (Ships) Regulations, 1970.

(1) List of Infected Areas

The list is maintained at the office of the Port Health Authority. It is amended as and when the circumstances demand and copies are supplied to H.M. Customs Officers and local pilots.

(2) Radio Messages.

No arrangements or facilities exist for the receipt or transmission of messages by radio.

(3) Notifications Otherwise than by Radio

Any such notifications from inward vessels would be given to the pilots or Officers of Customs and then passed to this authority.

Upon such information being received inward ships are boarded by an Officer of the Authority as soon and as often as practicable.

MOORING STATIONS.

- (s) There are no docks in which a suitable mooring station could be designated.
- (b) An outside mooring station has been designated near the mouth of Bradwell Creek.
- (c) In view of the extreme difficulty of rapid communication with vessels moored in the lower part of the estuary, the Customs Officers have been instructed to allow of boarding or leaving the ship, where the declaration of health and all other circumstances are satisfactory.

- (5) Arrangements for:
- (a) Hospital accommodation for cases of Infectious Disease is provided by the North East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, as necessary.
- (b) Local Surveillance is maintained by Officers of the Authority. Information concerning Contacts in other areas is forwarded to the responsible Authority.
- (c) There are no special arrangements for the Cleansing or disinfection of ships. Persons, clothing and other articles would be landed and arrangements made for the cleansing as required.

BLACKWATER OYSTER FISHERIES

An order under the above Regulations requiring the cleansing of oysters and other shellfish produced from the area within the jurisdiction of the Port Health Authority came into force on 1st April, 1959

As a result of this order a number of cleansing stations have been established, using ultra-violet light as a means of purification.

Regular sampling of cleansed shellfish has indicated that these plants have been operated satisfactorily.
