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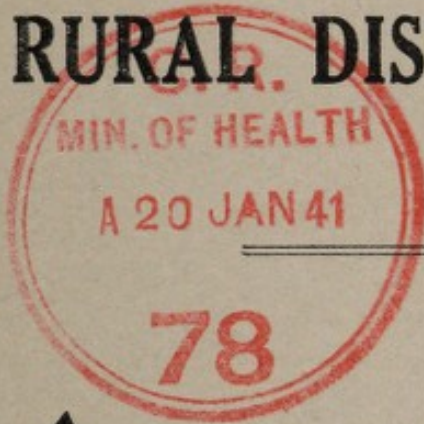

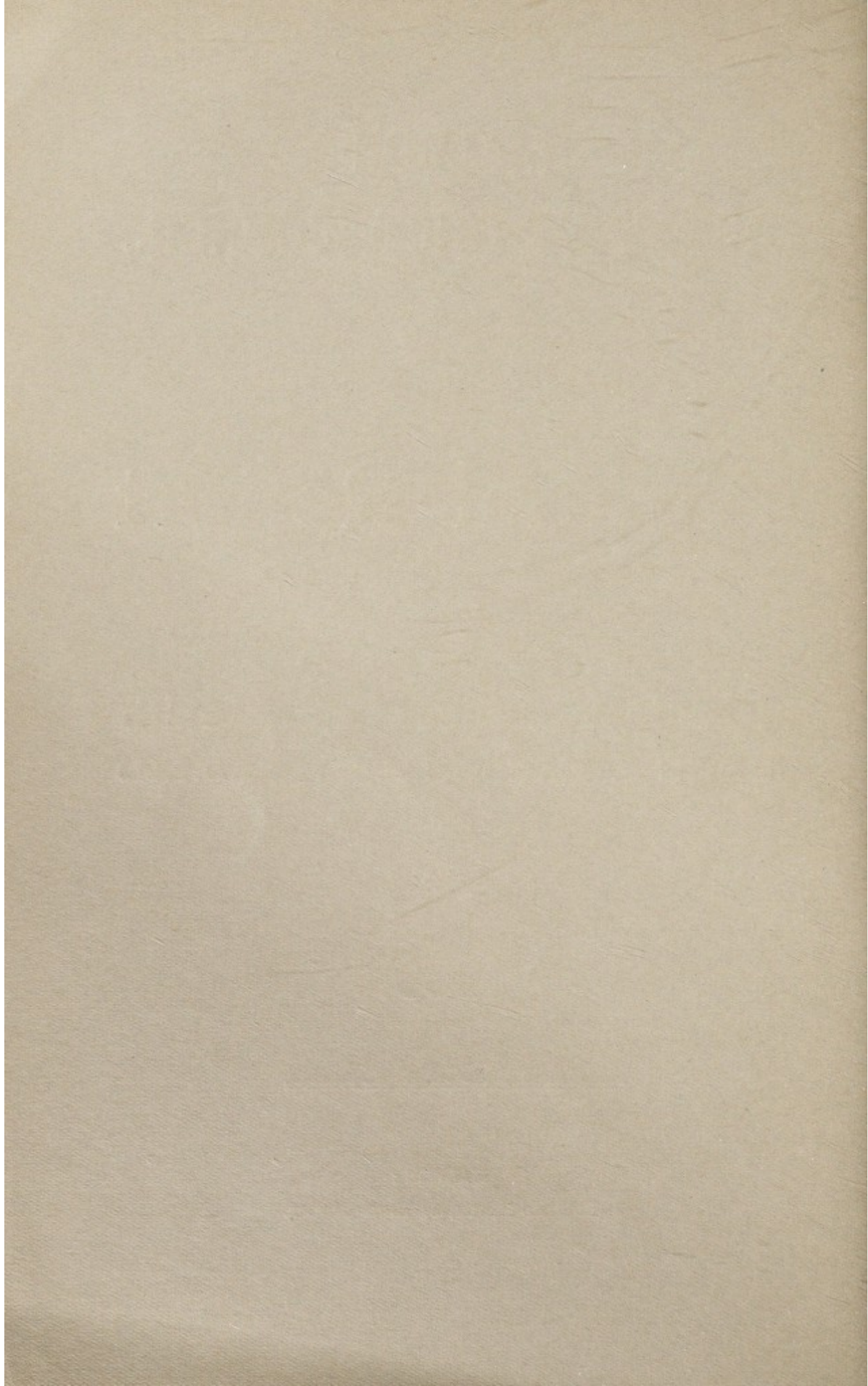

**To the Chairman and Members of Maldon Rural  
District Council.**

I have the honour to present for your consideration the **Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Circumstances** of your district during the year 1939.

In accordance with the Circular from the Ministry of Health the report has been considerably curtailed.

Owing to the abnormal conditions both before and since the outbreak of war, a great amount of time has had to be given to other than normal public health activities.

In spite of the considerable movement of population, no increase in the incidence of infectious disease occurred, and the general health of the community was maintained.

To my colleagues I am much indebted for valuable assistance in the preparation of this report.

For the sympathetic consideration and assistance received during the year, I beg to thank the Council.

\*In order to render this figure comparable with the death rate for the Country as a whole, it must be multiplied by the "Comparability Factor," or as it is now styled the "Areal Comparability Factor (A.C.F.)," 0.75, which has been supplied by the Registrar General as requisite to redress the abnormal constitution of the local population from the point of view of sex and age components. Applying this factor, the corrected death rate is 10.1 as compared with 12.1 for the Country as a whole.

## General Provision of Health Services for the Area.

**LABORATORY FACILITIES.** Additional facilities to supplement those already available have been provided by the Establishment of Emergency Public Health Laboratories, under the direction of the Medical Research Council, at Brentwood and Ipswich.

**AMBULANCE FACILITIES.** These meet the needs of the district, and if they should be overworked they can now be augmented by arrangement with vehicles of the Emergency Medical Services.

**NURSING IN THE HOME.** Local Nursing Associations' arrangements remain the same ; one independent nurse has gone.

**REGISTERED NURSING HOMES.** There are now two in the district.

**TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS ; HOSPITALS, PUBLIC AND VOLUNTARY.** Remain the same as last year.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

### Water Supply.

During 1939 the following extensions to mains were carried out:—

1,853 yards of 3-inch main was laid from the Chelmsford-Purleigh Road to The Hall, Woodham Mortimer, and this replaced 720 yards of old 2-inch main.

250 yards of 3-inch main was laid on the Down Hall Beach Estate, Bradwell, the cost of which was borne by the Estate Proprietors.

463 yards of 3-inch main from Beacon Hill along the School Road, Cold Norton,

185 yards of 3-inch main in Catchpole Lane, Great Totham.

1,564 yards of 3-inch main from East Newlands Farm to the 6-inch main near the Church, St. Lawrence, completing a circuit.

995 yards of 3-inch main from Chapel Corner, Great Totham, along Braxted Lane, to Porters Farm, Great Braxted. This main now serves the village of Great Braxted from the Great Totham Scheme in place of a small temporary connection.

100 yards of 3-inch main was laid in the Broad Street Green, Great Totham, connecting up the Great Totham Scheme to the Borough of Maldon's mains.

A further connection between the Dengie District Scheme and the Southminster mains was made at Wellingtons Corner, Southminster.

The total length of new mains in the southern area of the district, excluding the original Purleigh Scheme, but including all recent extensions, is :—

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE ; RIVERS AND STREAMS ; CLOSET ACCOMMODATION. No material change has taken place.

**PUBLIC CLEANSING.** In July the Council accepted the tender of Messrs. J. J. McLean & Son, of Warley, for the collection and disposal of unburnable refuse in the more populated parts of all parishes, except Southminster and Tollesbury. The price was £230 for monthly collections from 2,649 houses. This is at the rate of 1/9 per house per annum and the refuse is removed to Warley. This contract can be extended. The normal monthly load is 15 tons.

The County Council's road foremen have noticed that there has been much less trouble in their ditches and culverts, due to this scheme.

Other scavenging arrangements remain the same.

### Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

The following table gives details of the work carried out. The work was considerably curtailed as a result of Civil Defence duties by one of the staff.

Observation is kept of the records of border line cases so that when they become overcrowded due to the increasing ages of the inmates they are reported to the Public Health Committee.

In December, 1938, the Ministry of Health held their inquiry into the six clearance areas which involve 25 houses in the following parishes:—Purleigh 7, Southminster 6, Steeple 2, Little Totham 5, Great Totham 3, Tollesbury 2. All these orders were later confirmed, and 7 of the 25 houses were demolished during 1939.

## Inspection and Supervision of Food.

### *Milk Supply.*

There are 182 cowkeepers in the district, 102 are licensed to produce accredited milk. Two supplementary licences to produce Pasteurised Milk and one to produce Tuberculin Tested Milk were granted during the year.

### *Meat and Other Foods.*

During the year there was a decrease of one licensed slaughterhouse. At present there are 8 licensed slaughterhouses and 8 registered slaughterhouses.

In carrying out the work of meat inspection 572 visits were made and approximately 6 tons 16 cwts. of meat condemned.

## Prevalence of and control over Infectious Diseases.

Twenty-four cases of notifiable infectious diseases were notified during the year, a decrease of four on the preceding year. Measles and Whooping Cough became notifiable as from 23rd October, 1939.
