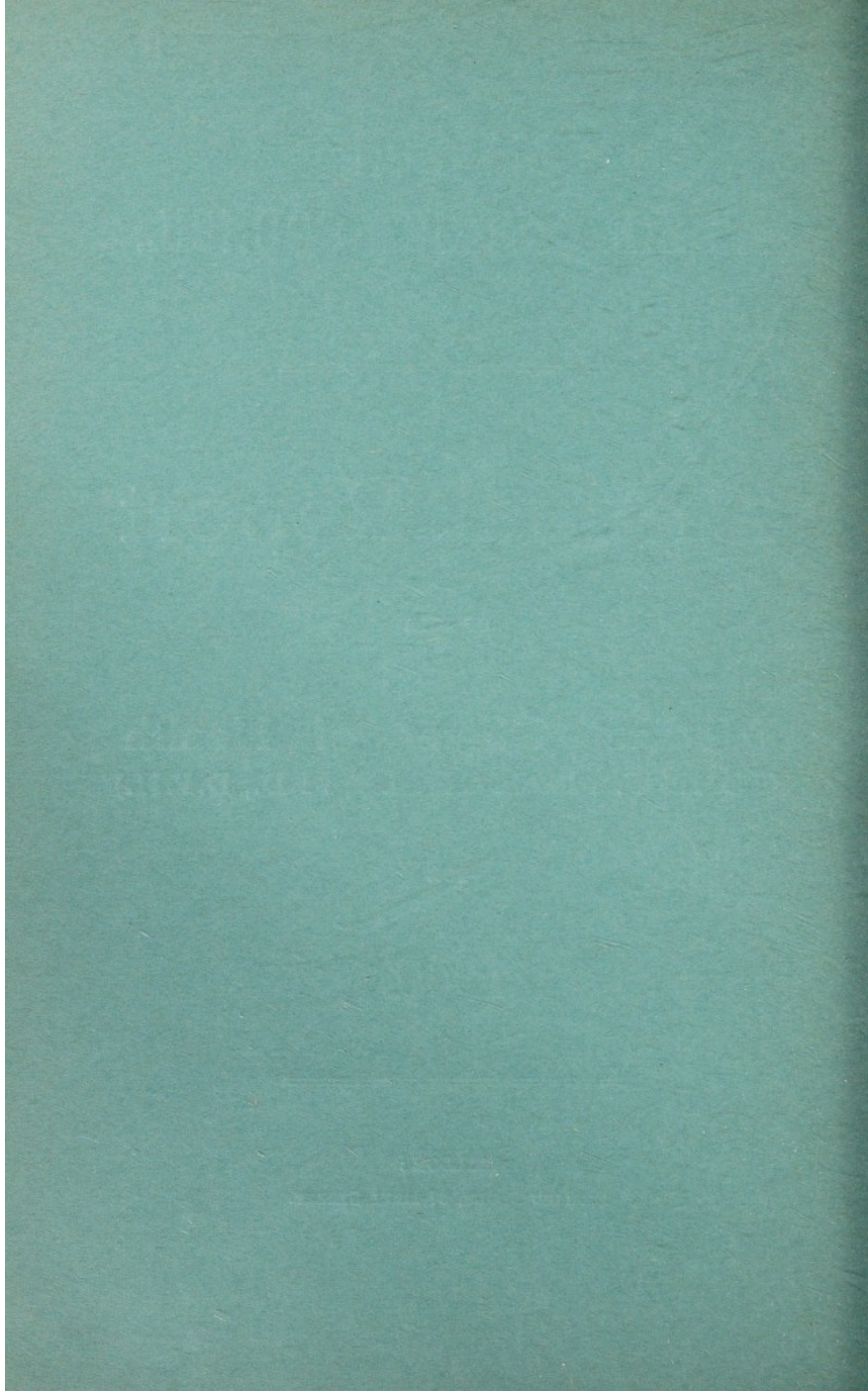

**To the Chairman and Members of Maldon Rural
District Council.**

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present for your consideration the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Circumstances of your district during the year 1940.

In accordance with the Circular from the Ministry of Health the report has been considerably curtailed.

Owing to the abnormal conditions both before and since the outbreak of war, a great amount of time has had to be given to other than normal public health activities.

In spite of the considerable movement of population, no increase in the incidence of infectious disease occurred, and the general health of the community was maintained.

To my colleagues I am much indebted for valuable assistance in the preparation of this report.

For the sympathetic consideration and assistance received during the year, I beg to thank the Council.

*In order to render this figure comparable with the death rate for the Country as a whole, it must be multiplied by the "Comparability Factor," or as it is now styled the "Areal Comparability Factor (A.C.F.)," 0.77, which has been supplied by the Registrar General as requisite to redress the abnormal constitution of the local population from the point of view of sex and age components. Applying this factor, the corrected death rate is 11.7 as compared with 14.3 for the Country as a whole.

The number of deaths exceeds the number of births by 19. This is the sixth year in succession in which deaths exceeded the number of births.

General Provision of Health Services for the Area.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. Additional facilities to supplement those already available have been provided by the Establishment of Emergency Public Health Laboratories, under the direction of the Medical Research Council.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES. These meet the needs of the district, and if they should be overworked they can now be augmented by arrangement with vehicles of the Emergency Medical Services.

NURSING IN THE HOME. Local Nursing Associations' arrangements remain the same ; one independent nurse has gone.

REGISTERED NURSING HOMES. There are now two in the district.

TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS ; HOSPITALS, PUBLIC AND VOLUNTARY. Remain the same as last year.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

During 1940 the following works were carried out :—

A metered connection was made from the Southend Waterworks Company's 28-inch Pumping Main to the Council's 7-inch main near Hatch House, Hazeleigh, which is capable of giving a supply of about 10,000 gallons per hour in case of emergency.

A 7-inch by-pass, 273 yards in length, was made under the railway near Baron's Hall Halt in case there was any damage to the overhead road bridge in which is laid both a 7-inch and 4-inch main.

45 new Fire Hydrants were fixed in various parts of the district.

The total length of new mains in the southern area of the district, excluding the original Purleigh Scheme, but including all recent extensions, is :—

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE ; RIVERS AND STREAMS ; CLOSET ACCOMMODATION. No material change has taken place.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. McLean's contract for the removal of unburnable refuse from 28 parishes in the district was continued throughout the year. Towards the end of the year, however, owing to labour shortage and the great demand for lorries, the regularity of the monthly collections was not maintained and many complaints were received.

Other scavenging arrangements remain the same.

Salvage.

PAPER. The Council's waste paper collection scheme commenced in April, and after consulting the Parish Councils the work of house-to-house collecting in each parish was delegated to various organisations such as the British Legion, the Women's Institutes, the Boy Scouts, etc. These bodies were given a receipt for weight collected and were paid out in that proportion after payment was received from the mills. There are 27 paper depots in the villages, and one central receiving depot in Maldon where baling and re-grading is carried out. At the end of the year about 70 tons of paper had been collected, and payment has been received for 54 tons. The sum of £163 : 3 : 5 had been distributed to the local organisations in the various parishes.

VILLAGE DUMPS. About the middle of the year the Iron and Steel Control of the Ministry of Supply asked us to organise a scrap metal dump in each parish, and for that purpose 28 voluntary parish organisers were appointed and 35 village dumps were arranged. There was a good response and some of the dumps reached a remarkable size. The metal was from time to time removed by the Iron and Steel Control, and the proceeds were given to the Red Cross Agricultural Fund on behalf of the parishes concerned.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

The following table gives details of the work carried out. The work was considerably curtailed as a result of shortage of staff and the time taken up by salvage work.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

Milk Supply.

There are 187 cowkeepers in the district, 106 are licensed to produce accredited milk. Two supplementary licences to sell Pasteurised Milk and one to produce Tuberculin Tested Milk were granted during the year.

Below is a summary of notices served and work done in relation to improvements to Cowsheds and Dairies.

In addition during the year three new cowsheds and three new dairies were built.

Meat and Other Foods.

Owing to the Ministry of Food Control and Centralizing of Slaughtering there are now no slaughterhouses in the district. There is one licensed Knacker's Yard at Purleigh. 152 visits have been made to the butchers' shops, vans and food shops. Early in the year there was cause for complaint concerning the distribution of meat from the central slaughterhouses in Maldon, but these unclean conditions were remedied after representations had been made to the Area Meat Agent.

Prevalence of and control over Infectious Diseases.

Nineteen cases of notifiable infectious diseases were notified during the year, a decrease of five on the preceding year. Measles and Whooping Cough became notifiable as from 23rd October, 1939.

The supply of diphtheria anti-toxin to medical practitioners is still available.

The following tables show the incidence of infectious diseases during the year, which shows that the district was comparatively free of infectious diseases throughout the year.
