

To the Chairman and Members of the Maldon Rural District Council

Mr. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I present for your consideration my Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of your District for the year 1956.

The corrected birth rate for 1956 was 17.4 per thousand. This is higher than the national figure which was 15.6 per thousand.

The corrected death rate was 11.9 per thousand compared with the figure for England and Wales which was 11.7.

Seventy-eight per cent. of the deaths occurring in the area were over 65 years of age and 53 per cent. were over 75 years of age. There were six deaths under 1 year of age.

The number of notifiable infectious diseases, excluding tuberculosis, was 124 compared with 474 in the previous year. This decrease is due to the reduction in notifications for measles during 1956. There were no cases of poliomyelitis in the area during the year and immunisation against this disease is proceeding as rapidly as supplies of vaccine become available.

There were six new cases of tuberculosis notified during the year and no deaths from this disease.

The health of the area as a whole remained good and generally the County Council and local health services operated together with reasonable efficiency.

The services for the care of the aged need to be reviewed. At present the County Council provides an excellent Home Help Service but far too often it is not possible to use this because old

people living alone in remote cottages frequently allow conditions to deteriorate to such a degree that no-one is willing to take on their care in the home. Not unnaturally old people wish to remain in their homes as long as possible and it is often very difficult to decide the appropriate moment for their removal. Much of this difficulty could be overcome if the County Council were to provide a trained squad, with a car equipped with modern cleansing apparatus, which could be sent to such homes to clean them so that Home Helps would be willing to go in and look after the old persons. This service would not be economic for one small local authority but would undoubtedly pay handsome dividends if inaugurated by the County Council.

Another service for old people which is at the moment not being exploited effectively is that of chiropody. Many old persons in this district would enjoy a more active life if their feet could receive regular care and attention.

Many local authorities have accepted the idea of providing accommodation for District Nurses and Health Visitors. I think the question of providing accommodation for Home Helps, or persons willing to care for a number of elderly persons in the district, is a matter which could profitably receive further attention. The ageing population and the continued decline in the size of the average family means that this problem will grow with the years and to tackle it now would give reassurance to many faced with the prospects of a lonely old age.

I have to thank your Senior Public Health Inspector for the work that he has done towards preparing this report.

Swimming Baths and Pools. There is a small openair salt-water pool at Tollesbury.

Knackers' Yards. There is one in the district, situated in the parish of Purleigh.

Moveable Dwellings. During the year 13 licences to site moveable dwellings were granted under Section 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

WATER SUPPLY.

By the end of 1956 a piped water supply from the mains owned by the District Council was available to 94 per cent of the population. The figures for each parish are set out in the table on page 21.

Springs at Warren Bottom and Jacobs Well, Woodham Walter.

Springs at Asheldam.

The supplies from these two works are chlorinated.
