

TUBERCULOSIS

There were two notifications during the year. A man of fifty four and a woman of twenty four were notified as cases of lung tuberculosis.

DISINFECTION

The Public Health Department can give advice and assistance with disinfection and can itself obtain technical help from the Public Health Laboratory Service. Disinfection of household articles can be arranged with the Hospital Authorities.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948-51, SECTION 47

Several visits were made during the year to elderly people living alone in their own homes. Statutory action was not required.

IMMUNISATION AND VACCINATION

This service is administered by the Area Medical Officer. The figures given below refer to immunisations and vaccinations carried out by general practitioners and Assistant County Medical Officers in your district. I am grateful to Dr. Miller Wood for permission to show these figures.

Schemes Prepared Direct by Your Engineer and Surveyor's Department

Bradwell-on-Sea Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme

Work on this scheme commenced in October 1966 and approximately 60% of the work in laying sewers and the construction of Sewage Disposal Works has been completed.

Tolleshunt Knights Sewerage Scheme

Tenders were approved in August, 1967 and arrangements have been completed with the Lexden and Winstree Rural District Council for the sewage to be dealt with at their Tiptree Works. It is hoped work on the scheme will commence early in 1968.

Schemes Prepared by Your Consultants

Althorne-Mayland Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme

Work commenced on the scheme in November, 1966 and approximately 30% of the work has now been completed.

Tolleshunt D'Arcy Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme

Work commenced on the scheme in October, 1966.

Latchingdon, Cold Norton, Stow Maries and Mundon Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme

Work on the scheme commenced in June, 1967 and approximately 35% of the work has been completed.

WATER SUPPLY

Water Consumption for the Year Ending 31st March, 1968

The water consumption during the year is set out in the following sheets and also the cost of pumping from the various Stations, together with a Summary of the work carried out on new services, repairs to existing services and mains and renewal of Meters, etc.

The consumption per head for domestic purposes has increased by three gallons during the year and it is considered that quite an appreciable amount of this increase is due to more water being used on the newer properties and on the properties that have been improved and connected to the sewer during the year. There is, however, quite an appreciable increase in the number of mains bursts which have occurred during the year which obviously causes a considerable loss in water and this would have some effect on this increase in consumption.

Also in the case of the renewal of the 8" main and the water tower at Gt. Whitmans these have obviously had to be tested and naturally a considerable amount of water has been used for testing purposes. It will be noted that there is a slight decrease of one gallon per head for non-domestic purposes.

During the year a further 335 new connections were made to new properties.

Approximately one mile of new water mains was laid during the year and $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles of existing mains were renewed.

The estimated average population figure for the year is taken as 21, 500.

During the year work proceeded on the construction of the three water towers, unfortunately owing to difficulty with labour it has not been possible to complete these three towers during the year, but the larger tower at Gt. Whitmans is completed and is now partly in use.

It has, however, an acid reaction due to its centent of free carbon diexide with fairly low carbonate alkalinity; it will therefore tend to have corrosive action on metals. The water is hard in character but its hardness and its content of mineral and saline constituents in solution are not excessive. It is of a high standard of organic quality.

These results indicate a pure and wholesome water. The rather high content of residual chlorine in the sample could possibly give rise to complaints of taste and odour. The content of nitrate is undesirably high for use in the preparation of infant feeds. Correction of the corrosive characteristics towards metals would be desirable for public supply purposes.

Swimming Baths and Pools

There is a small open air salt water pool at Tollesbury and small open air pools at Bradwell-on-Sea, Latchingdon and Purleigh County Primary Schools. Tests of the school pools in connection with efficiency of chlorination and pH value of the water are carried out at regular intervals.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Household Refuse

A weekly collection is carried out by contractors in the Parishes of Southminster and Tollesbury and in the Broad Street Green area of Great Totham. Throughout the remainder of the district the collection is fortnightly.

Collection from the more outlying properties is fortnightly by Direct Labour.

Arrangements for the collection of more bulky items of household refuse may be made on application to the Public Health Department and this service is provided by Direct Labour.

Collection of Nightsoil

Until the Council's programme of main drainage is completed the number of properties without water closets must unfortunately remain high and is currently estimated at 1,005.

A weekly pail closet collection from all Parishes in the area is carried out by private contractors.

Emptying of Cesspools

The Council commenced a scheme for the emptying of cesspools throughout the district in April, 1961. The scheme allows for a once yearly free emptying.

Derelict Cars

The abandonment of derelict car bodies on wayside verges has unfortunately increased. It has been necessary for the Council to arrange for the removal of 3 car bodies during the year. This work is being carried out for the Council by a firm of Car Breakers.
