SECTION 'C'

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

(i) Laboratory Facilities

Samples for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory, Northallerton. A van calls once a week to collect specimens.

(ii) Local Services under Part III of the National Health Service Act, 1946

The day-to-day administration of the following services is carried out by the Ryedale Local Health Sub-committee in the urban districts of Malton and Pickering, and the rural districts of Helmsley, Kirbymoorside, Malton and Pickering.

(a) Care of mothers and young children

Child welfare and ante-natal clinics are held at centres in the Ryedale area.

In places where no clinic is held ante-natal and child welfare services are carried out by health visitors in the home.

(b) Midwifery, Health Visiting and Hone Nursing

Combined duty nurses serving 16 districts are resident in the area.

(c) Ambulance Service

Ambulance stations at Malton and Kirbymoorside provide this service.

(d) Immunisation and Vaccination

Provision is made for primary immunisation against diphtheria at child welfare centres but the greater part of this service is carried out by general practitioners in their surgeries and in the home.

(e) Domestic Help Service

This service provides domestic help, at a charge dependent on the income of the household, in homes where there has been a confinemont or ill-health of the mother, and to the aged and infirm.

Public water supplies have been maintained in a satisfactory condition and are of good quality.

At Concepthorpe the private supply serving the village has shown consistently unsatisfactory samples due to the proximity of the collection chamber to a stream which had become choked with weeds. The stream has been cleansed and the position will be watched in the coming year.

Details of the number of houses supplied with water laid on to the house or supplied by pillar fountain or other means are not yet available for the whol area. The figures for those parishes surveyed under the Housing Rural Survey are as follows:--

Refuse Disposal.

Water Supply

A more comprehensive refuse collection service was put into operation at the beginning of the year and a monthly collection to all properties is now established. In addition the collection of ashes from householders is being undertaken.

A substantial number of properties in the district lack the provision of suitable dustbins and it is felt that some consideration to this problem will need to be given.

Sewage Disposal,

Two sewage works at Welburn and Swinton are in full operation, and samples of the effluent taken from time to time by the Yorkshire Cuse River Board have all proved satisfactory.

It is hoped to be able to report in the next year that all properties have been connected to these schemes.

A sewage disposal works is in course of construction in the village of Brawby and should be completed early in 1955.

Food

All shops and food preparing premises were inspected during the year. No outbreak of food poisoning has occurred.

The number of inspections made during the year again exceeded two thousand visits and again the accent is on improvement grant inspections under the Byelaws, although following the completion of the sewage schemes the number of inspections in this field has somewhat increased. The largest increase of inspections lies in the field of meat inspection where visits are made sometimes on three occasions during each week to the three slaughterhouses and where much of the work is being carried out outside normal office hours,

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

One major block disinfestation was carried out in the parish of Huttons Ambo with the co-operation of the North Riding Agricultural Executive Committee.

Shops Act, 1934.

Six inspections were made. No contraventions were found.

Camping Sites.

There are no licensed camping sites in the district.

Offensive Trades.

There are no trades under this heading.

Slaughterhouses.

There are three licensed slaughterhouses in the district all of which are used for public slaughtering. All slaughterhouses are maintained in a clean condition and the quality of meat slaughtered has been high. There are 23 licensed slaughtermen under the above Act.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

No action has been necessary under the above heading during the year.

Schools,

Gradual improvement is being made to the sanitation of schools in the district. It is hoped that with the completion of sewage schemes this work will be speeded up.

The school canteens which have been regularly inspected have proved to be well run and kept in a clean condition.

Slaughter of Animals Act, 1933/54.

100% inspection of all carcases slaughtered has been made, as a result of which 246 lbs of meat was condemned as unfit in the six months period of operation.

Septic Tanks and Cesspools.

A considerable amount of time has been taken up by the cleansing of septic tanks and cesspools and by the general maintenance of housing estate drainage systems, many of which are now becoming worn out. The service of emptying cesspools by mechanical means has been in use during the year.

Open Ditches

Some difficulty has been experienced due to extreme pressure of work in maintaining the open ditches in a satisfactory condition. A little less than three miles of open ditches being cleaned during the year.

With the completion of the Street Village Sewerage Scheme it is anticipated that more time can now be devoted to this work and the condition of the ditches substantially improved.
