To the Chairman & Henbers of the Council.

Mr. Chairman & Members,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for the year 1956 for the Rural Districts of Helmsley, Kirkbymoorside, Halton and Pickering and the Urban Districts of Malton and Pickering. In the text of this report, unless there is some matter which requires particular comment in respect of one district, reference will only to made to the area as a whole under the designation of the Ayedale area. Reports of this nature, which are in the main statistical, give an innecurate picture of the health of a district when applied to a small population over the period of one year. Figures for the whole area are less liable to fluctuations due to non-significant causes but it must be remembered that, even as a whole, the area has a relatively small population. In the statistical summary figures are included for each district separately, not because these figures have any significance but, because it is the statutory duty of the Hedical Officer of Health to produce a report for each district he serves.

SATISTICS GS DR.L CODITIONS OF THE AREA.

The hypedale area, which is referred to in the text of this report comprises the ural Districts of Helmsley, Kirkbynocrside, Malton and Pickering and the Urban Districts of Malton and Pickering. This area is mainly agricultural in mature, more heavily populated in the areas near the townships of Helmsley, Kirkbynoorside, Malton and Pickering and thinly populated in the dales and moorland districts in the morthern part of the area.

POPUL.TION. The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year provulation 1956 is 29,380 - the figures for 1954 and 1955 were 29,220 and 29,250 respectively.

VITAL STATISTICS.

LIVE BLACHS & BIRTH RATES. The number of live births during 1956 was 391, an increase of 19 over the previous year. The adjusted live birth rate was 15.7 per 1000 population which was the same as the Birth Rate for England and Wales.

ILLEGITIENCY. The number of illegitimate births registered in the hyedale area during the year was 11. The corresponding figures for 1954 and 1955 were 12 and 18.

STILLBIRTHS. The number of stillbirths registered in 1956 was 9 compared with 12 in 1954 and 6 in 1952. The stillbirth rate, i.e. the stillbirths per 1000 total births was 22.5. The Stillbirth Rate for England and Wales was 23.

DEATHS & DAITH RATES. The adjusted death rate, i.e. the deaths per 1000 population for the Ryodale area was. 10.9, while the death rate for England and Wales was 11.7.

<u>INF.NT MONTALITY A D MEDITAL O TALITY.</u> During the year there were 3 deaths of infants under 1 year, all of them were mean tal deaths, (i.e. deaths under 1 month). The infant mertality rate (i.e. the number of deaths under one year per 1000 live births), was 7.7. The rate for England and Wales was 23.8 per 1000 live births.

I.T. D. L. HONT.LITT. There were no maternal deaths during the year.

<u>FAIL CLUSES OF MERCHS.</u> Cancer was responsible for 63 deaths, a rate of 2.14 per 1000 of the population. 199 persons died of diseases of the heart and circulation - a rate of 7.01 per 1000 population. Deaths from Respiratory Disease excluding tuberculosis a cunted to 24 - a rate of 0.85 per 1000 population. There were 2 deaths from tuberculosis during the year.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES Seven cases of Polionyelitis - 3 non - paralytic and four paralytic were notified. There were fifty five cases of whooping cough, twelve of scarlet fever and five **Deasles**.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES.

(i) Laboratory Facilities.

Samples for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory, Northallerton, A van calls once a week to collect specimens.

(ii) Local Services under Part III of the National Health Service Act 1946

The day-to-day administration of the following services is carried out by the Ryedale Local Health Sub-Connittee in the urban districts of Malton & Pickering, and the rural districts of Helmsley, Kirbymoorside, Malton & Fickering.

(a) Care of nothers and young children

Child welfare and ante-natal clinics are held at centres in the Ryedale Area.

In places where no clinic is held ante-natal and child welfare services are carried out by health visitors in the home.

(b) Midwifery, Health Visiting and Home Nursing

Combined duty nurses serving 16 districts are resident in the area.

(c) Ambulance Service

Ambulance stations at Malton and Kirbymoorside provide this service.

(d) Immunisation and Vaccination

Provision is made for primary vaccination against diphtheria at child welfare centres but the greater part of this service is carried out by general practitioners in their surgeries and in the home.

A scheme for the vaccination of children against poliomyelitis was introduced during the year and, in May to June 1956, 222 children were given a complete course and 50 received one dose of vaccine. The number of children who were registered for vaccination was 2009.

(c) Domestic Help Service

This service provides domestic help, at a charge dependent on the income of the household, in homes where there has been a confinement or ill-health of the mother, and to the aged and infirm.

Refuse Disposal.

A minor improvement to the service was put into operation during the year and with the inclusion of a number of more isolated premises the whole area is now served by a monthly collection. In spite of a steadily increasing number of premises to be collected, difficult containers to be handled and at many times poor climatic conditions the service was maintained without breakdown and with a marked absence of complaints. The problem of the unsuitable containers still remains.

Sewage Disposal.

The Erawby Works have now been in operation for a full year and have functioned satisfactorily. The disposal of sludge on this restricted site gives rise to some difficulty. During the year six samples were taken from the effluents of the various works and all these were classified as highly satisfactory. The sustained efficiency of operation at which these works have been maintained reflect great credit to the zeal and ability of the operator on the site.

Food.

All shops and food preparing premises were inspected during the year. No outbreak of food poisoning has occurred,

Septic Tanks and Cesspools.

Thirty-two applications for improvement grants were received during the year, all of which were opproved.
