The unsatisfactory public supply was traced to a short link from the Welburn reservoir. It was found that water had gained access through a faulty cover. The mains were washed out, chlorinated heavily and a new cover supplied following which satisfactory samples were obtained. The private supply at Ganthorpe showed continuous contamination and an extension to replace the private supply was afforded during the year from the Council'd mains. This remedied the unsatisfactory state of affairs in this village. The owners concerned with the small supply at Hovingham are to replace the private sup by from the Council's mains and negotiations are at present pending to this end. The general position throughout the area in relation to water supply must now be considered reasonably satisfactory.

#### Refuse Disposal.

The refuse disposal service is still maintained at its present frequency, viz: every calendar month, throughout the area. This must still be considered well below an acceptable standard in this day and age, and it is regretted that the substantial economic strain which the provision of an adequate service would have imposed over-rided the public health needs in this important service. Refuse collection provides the majority of complaints received in the department albeit many come from ratepayers who have recently taken up residence in the area.

I feel that this provides the one black spot in the public health administration and I must express the hope that improvements in this field will not be too long delayed.

#### Sewage Disposal.

The year has been one in which consolidation has taken place and a very satisfactory position exists in the field of sanitary improvement where sewage works and severs have been installed.

New schemes are proposed and the first of these it is hoped will be commenced during the next year. On completion of the programme as planned the position for a small rural area will be highly satisfactory. The various works have been exceedingly well maintained and I would again like to pay tribute to the ability and conscientiousness of your workman carrying out these duties. Samples taken by the River Board have consistently reflected the work which goes into the maintenance.

### Food.

All shops and food preparing premises were inspected during the year. No outbreaks of food poisoning have occurred.

#### Slaughterhouses.

There are three licensed alaughterhouses in the district all of which are used for public slaughtering. All slaughterhouses are maintained in a clean condition and the quality of meat slaughtered has been high.

There are five licensed slaughtermen under the above Act.

#### Eradication of Bed Bugs.

No action has been necessary under the above heading during the year.

#### Schools.

The school canteens which have been regularly inspected have proved to be well run and kept in a clean condition.

#### Slaughter of Animals Act, 1954.

The number of animals slaughtered in the area fell from 708 in 1958 to 510 in 1959. 100% inspection of all carcases slaughtered has been made, as a result of which 1,034 lbs. of meat and offal was condemned as unfit.

This work entailed 191 visits, some of which involved week-end working and overtime.

#### 6. House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959.

31 applications for improvement grant were received during the year of which 2 were for Standard Grants and the remainder for Discretionary Grants. One of these was refused.

The new legislation introducing Standard Grants and substantially easing the conditions for Discretionary Grants has not made any material alteration to the number of applications under this heading. It may be that as much has been done since the inception of the improvement grants that the back has been broken of this problem. It has however appeared that the new standard grant has failed to achieve any popularity. A vigorous campaign is continuously carried out to persuade owners of suitable property to take advantage of the facilities offered under this Act.
