The unsatisfactory samples were obtained as a result of investigation into the quality of water for possible use in a private swimming pool. As a result of the sampling a mains supply was afforded.

Refuse Collection.

The fortnightly collection service has been maintained without break throughout the year and dustbins are almost universally provided.

The method of tipping still remains below the ideal standards laid down by the Ministry although during the year improvements have been made to the sites and method of operation. In such a small area and with the limited staff available fully controlled tipping would be completely uneconomic and would cause a considerable burden on the ratepayers.

Whilst there is no reason for complacency in this field the refuse tips do not cause any nuisance.

Sewage Disposal.

Steady progress continues to be made towards the goal of providing adequate services under this heading to all the community.

The rate of progress is slightly below the average hoped for, but as only one scheme, Barton-le-Willows, came into operation this figure is understandable.

The decision of the Council to use rated aeration at Barton-le-Willows has proved to be successful and the plant has operated most satisfactorily and provides effluent of a quality equal to and better than some of the traditional plants in the area, whilst the time required for maintenance is very much less.

I would like to pay tribute to the excellent work carried out by your outside staff. The standard of maintenance and the efficiency in ensuring that all the machinery operates continuously and satisfactorily has resulted in satisfactory samples of effluent being obtained throughout the year.
