CAMPING SITES

There is a camping site for eight static caravans situated at the Quarry, Cleeve Wood Road, Downend.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOODS

Meat and other foods.

The slaughtering of animals is still mainly carried out at the Central Abattoir, instead of private slaughter houses.

Certificates of condemnation were issued in respect of unfit meat and other foods as required.

Milk

Licences in accordance with the Food and Drugs Acts 1938 and 1944 and Milk Regulations 1949, were issued to Dairies, Distributors and Dairymen

HOUSING

Inspections were made during the year and notices to abate nuisances and repair defects were served under the provisions of the Public Health and Housing Acts.

Houses built during the year numbered 143 comprising 82 Council Houses and 61 Private Enterprise. In addition 140 Council Houses were under construction on the Stanbridge Estate at the end of the year.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The whole of the District is covered by a weekly house refuse collection and the collection of waste paper salvage was again continued during the year.

RIVERS & STREAMS

Samples are taken periodically at the same time as samples are taken of works effluent as one of the constituent authorities discharging into the river.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

Water carriage system is general throughout the District with the exception of a few properties in outlying districts and a group of cottages in Downend.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The work on the extension of the sewers and Outfall Works, Moorend, under arrangements with the Sodbury R.D.C. was continued during the year and is nearing completion as is also the reconstruction of the works to accommodate the Rural Area of Chipping Sodbury.

DRIVING STYLES

The most striking single factor in the driving styles observed
was the number of drivers who had been drinking. Drivers who had been
drinking were found to be more likely to drive at higher speeds than
those who had not been drinking.

There was also a tendency for drivers who had been drinking to drive
more slowly than those who had not been drinking.

PARA-TYPHOID FEVER - CARRIER

An outbreak of para-typhoid fever at a Maternity Ward in a Bristol Hospital was attributed to a chronic carrier resident in the Urban Area.

The woman remains a persistent carrier to present date (July 1953), and her family - husband and two boys - are now free from infection. Close supervision is continued. Treatment with Terramycin has no effect on carrier condition.
