MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I HAVE THE HONOUR TO PRESENT THE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1966.

I AM GRATEFUL TO MR. G.H. FYFE, THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR, WHO HAS PREPARED HIS REPORT ON THE SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

CERTAIN ITEMS STAND OUT FOR PARTICULAR COMMENT:

STATISTICS.

THERE WERE 33 LESS BIRTHS AND 12 MORE DEATHS THAN IN THE PREVIOUS YEAR. 184 OF THE 389 DEATHS WERE OF PERSONS AGED 75 YEARS AND OVER.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

ONCE AGAIN THERE WAS A HIGH INCIDENCE OF MEASLES WHICH WAS CONTINUED INTO 1967. IT IS TOO EARLY TO DISCUSS THE RESULTS OF MEASLES VACCINATION WHICH IS GRADUALLY BEING INTRODUCED. THERE WERE NO BIG OUTBREAKS OF DYSENTERY OR FOOD POISONING.

TUBERCULOSIS.

THE INCIDENCE OF NEW CASES REMAINS LOW.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

THE NEW MARKET BOSWORTH WORKS HAS COME INTO OPERATION AND EXTENSIONS HAVE BEEN PLANNED AT SOME OF THE OTHER WORKS. AN INSPECTOR FROM THE MINISTRY OF HOUSING & LOCAL GOVERNMENT CONDUCTED AN INFORMAL INQUIRY INTO THE RATBY SCHEME IN JULY BUT THE SCHEME HAS NOT YET BEEN STARTED. TWO SMALL AREAS, VIZ: PARK LANE, BAGWORTH AND BELCHERS BAR ARE IN URGENT NEED OF SEWER PROVISION BUT THE OPERATIONS OF THE NATIONAL COAL BOARD HAVE CAUSED SUBSIDENCE AND THEREBY HELD UP PROGRESS WITH THESE SCHEMES. THESE ARE ONLY A FEW OF THE DIFFICULTIES OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE IN CONNECTION WITH SEWERAGE SCHEMES. PRESSURE FOR DEVELOPMENT AND OUTSTANDING PERMISSIONS FOR DEVELOPMENT ALSO CONTRIBUTE TO THESE DIFFICULTIES.

HOUSING.

THERE HAVE BEEN MANY REQUESTS FOR SUPPORT FOR APPLICATIONS FOR REHOUSING IN COUNCIL HOUSES, PARTICULARLY IN IBSTOCK. GROUNDS FOR SUPPORT VARY FROM THE CLEAR-CUT MEDICAL DISABILITY, OR THE

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HOUSING. (CONT)

NEED OF ELDERLY PERSONS TO MOVE TO SINGLE STOREY ACCOMMODATION, OR HARDSHIP CONSTITUTING "GENERAL NEEDS". SUCH HARDSHIP IN HOUSING OCCURRED IN 26 NATIONAL COAL BOARD HOUSES AT BAGWORTH WHICH WERE SO BADLY AFFECTED BY SUBSIDENCE AS TO LEAVE OPEN CRACKS IN THE WALLS AND STEEPLY SLOPING FLOORS. THE RESIDENTS OF THESE HOUSES SENT IN A PETITION DURING THE COLD WEATHER.

NUISANCES.

PRE-EMINENT AMONG THE MAJOR PUBLIC HEALTH PROBLEMS WERE THOSE OF DUST EMISSION FROM BRADGATE QUARRY AND FUMES FROM "SALTING" AT A BRICK & PIPE WORKS.

THE COUNCIL EMPLOYED A CONSULTANT TO ADVISE ON THE SUPPRESSIVE MEASURES USED AT THE QUARRY. THE DIFFICULTY STILL REMAINS.

AT THE BRICK AND PIPE WORKS ONE HOPES FOR THE USE OF ALTERNATIVE METHODS TO SALT GLAZING AND SOME MODIFICATION OF BRITISH STANDARDS TO ALLOW FOR THE USE OF PIPES NOT SUBJECTED TO TRADITIONAL GLAZING. IN THE 1970'S IT IS ANTICIPATED THAT GREATER CHIMNEY HEIGHTS WILL BE ENFORCEABLE.

GENERAL PUBLIC HEALTH.

SOME PROGRESS WAS MADE DURING THE YEAR TOWARDS A SCHEME FOR ALLEVIATING THE FLOODING IN WITHERLEY. THIS ENTAILED THE CO-ORDINATION OF INTERESTS OF A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT BODIES.

ALTERNATIVE SITES FOR PUBLIC CONVENIENCES IN MARKET BOSWORTH HAVE BEEN DISCUSSED AND EXPLORED. PROGRESS IS DIFFICULT OWING TO THE DIFFERENT INTERESTS AND POINTS OF VIEW.

DURING PERIODS OF HEAVY RAINFALL ALARM WAS FELT AT POINTS WHERE SEWERS BACKED UP. THIS PROBLEM IS NOT CONFINED TO THIS DISTRICT. THE MOST IMPORTANT FACTOR IN THESE SITUATIONS IS TO ENSURE THAT WATER SUPPLIES ARE NOT CONTAMINATED; THE MAIN LONG-TERM DANGER IS ONE OF SOIL CONTAMINATION WITH HELMINTHS FROM HUMAN FAECES.

ELDERLY PERSONS.

CONTINUING FROM MY LAST YEAR'S REPORT, ONE MUST HOPE THAT, WITH RISING STANDARDS IN HOUSING GENERALLY, IT WILL BE POSSIBLE TO KEEP UNDER CONSIDERATION THE QUESTION OF HEAT CONSERVATION IN THE BEDROOMS OF ELDERLY PERSONS. THERE MAY BE NO IMMEDIATE SOLUTION BUT THERE WILL UNDOUBTEDLY BE AN INCREASE IN THE NUMBERS OF ELDERLY PERSONS LIVING ALONE.

CONCLUSION

AS IN PREVIOUS YEARS, I HAVE ATTEMPTED TO SINGLE OUT SOME OF THE ITEMS WHICH HAVE ARISEN DURING THE YEAR AND ARE WORTHY OF COMMENT. I HAVE NOT ATTEMPTED TO BE COMPREHENSIVE BUT RATHER TO BRING TO THE FORE MATTERS WHICH NEED TO BE KEPT IN MIND.

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

SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

THE POPULATION IS PARTLY INDUSTRIAL AND PARTLY AGRICULTURAL, WHILST SOME ARE EMPLOYED IN THE NEARBY AREAS OF LEICESTER, NUNEATON, HINCKLEY, COALVILLE AND COVENTRY. IN THIS LATTER CONNECTION THERE HAS BEEN A BIG INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF NEW HOUSES IN CERTAIN AREAS, E.G., NEWBOLD VERDON, BARLESTONE, MARKFIELD, WHICH HAS CONTRIBUTED TO INCREASED PRESSURE ON FAMILY DOCTORS' SERVICES.

THE MAIN INDUSTRIAL OCCUPATIONS ARE IN COAL MINING, GRANITE QUARRYING, ENGINEERING, BOOT AND SHOE AND HOSIERY MANUFACTURE.

THE NATIONAL COAL BOARD OWN A CONSIDERABLE NUMBER OF HOUSES IN THE AREA.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

HOSPITALS ARE ADMINISTERED BY THE SHEFFIELD REGIONAL HOSPITAL BOARD AND LOCAL HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEES.

INSTITUTIONAL ACCOMMODATION (PART III) FOR ELDERLY PEOPLE IS PROVIDED BY THE LEICESTERSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL.

HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION FOR ELDERLY CHRONIC SICK PATIENTS IS PROVIDED AT BOSWORTH PARK INFIRMARY. "WESTHAVEN", AT MARKET BOSWORTH HAS ACCOMMODATION FOR BOTH CHRONIC SICK PATIENTS AND COUNTY COUNCIL RESIDENTS. MARKFIELD HOSPITAL, FORMERLY FOR TUBERCULOSIS PATIENTS, NOW TAKES CERTAIN TYPES OF GENERAL MEDICAL AND SURGICAL PATIENTS.

MATERNITY ACCOMMODATION IS PROVIDED AT LEICESTER, KIRBY MUXLOE, AND NUNEATON.

GLENGATE HOSPITAL, AN ANNEXE OF GLENFRITH HOSPITAL IN LEICESTER, PROVIDES ACCOMMODATION FOR MENTALLY SUBNORMAL BOYS.

HIGHAM GRANGE PROVIDES REHABILITATION TREATMENT FOR PHYSICALLY DISABLED PATIENTS.

PART III. NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICES ARE ADMINISTERED BY THE LEICESTERSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL. CERTAIN VOLUNTARY OLD PEOPLE'S WELFARE ASSOCIATIONS PROVIDE COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR ELDERLY PERSONS. CHIROPODY SERVICES ARE AVAILABLE AT SOME OF THE CLUBS, WITH FINANCIAL SUPPORT FROM THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

IN IBSTOCK, THE W.R.V.S. ORGANISE A "MEALS ON WHEELS" SERVICE WHEREBY UP TO 24 MID-DAY MEALS, PREPARED BY A LOCAL WORKS CANTEEN, ARE DELIVERED TO ELDERLY PERSONS IN THEIR OWN HOMES. THE DELIVERY IS ENTIRELY VOLUNTARY. THE DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILS SHARE EQUALLY THE SUM REQUIRED TO FINANCE THE MEALS, IN EXCESS OF THE 1/- PAID BY EACH RECIPIENT.

VACCINATION AND IMMUNISATION.

WHOOPING COUGH, DIPHTHERIA, TETANUS, POLIOMYELITIS.

UNDER THE COUNTY COUNCIL SCHEME, IMMUNISING PROCEDURES FOR INFANTS AND SCHOOL CHILDREN ARE UNDERTAKEN BY THE FAMILY DOCTORS. WHERE THIS IS NOT PRACTICABLE IT CAN BE DONE BY APPOINTMENT DIRECT WITH THE COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT. POLIOMYELITIS VACCINE IS AVAILABLE FOR PERSONS UP TO 40 YEARS OF AGE.

SMALLPOX.

SMALLPOX VACCINE WAS MADE AVAILABLE TO PRACTITIONERS BY THE PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY AT GROBY ROAD HOSPITAL, LEICESTER. IN 1967 THE COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT WILL TAKE OVER DISTRIBUTION.

TUBERCULOSIS VACCINATION (B.C.G.)

THIS WAS OFFERED TO THE OLDER SECONDARY SCHOOL PUPILS AND THE CUSTOMARY HIGH ACCEPTANCE RATE WAS MAINTAINED. INDIVIDUAL CASES MAY BE VACCINATED AT THE CHEST CLINICS.

VACCINATION AND IMMISATION

Whooping Cough, Diphtheria, Tetanus, Poliomyelitis

Under the County Council Scheme, immunising procedures for infants and school children are undertaken by the family doctors where this is not practicable it can be done by appointment direct with the County Health Department, Poliomyelitis vaccine is available for persons up to 40 years of age.

Smallpox

Smallpox vaccine was made available to practitioners by the Public Health Laboratory at Grosby Road Hospital, Leicester in 1967 the County Health Department will take over distribution

Tuberculosis Vaccination (B.C.G.)

This was offered to the older secondary school pupils and the customary high acceptance rate was maintained. Individual cases may be vaccinated at the Chest Clinics.

ALTHOUGH THE COUNCIL IS NOT NOW A WATER UNDERTAKING (THE LEICESTER WATER BOARD AND THE NORTH WEST LEICESTERSHIRE WATER BOARD NOW SUPPLY THE WHOLE DISTRICT), MANY PROBLEMS RELATING TO WATER SUPPLY AND PUBLIC HEALTH REMAIN. COMPLAINTS REGARDING BOTH QUALITY AND QUANTITY ARE SPEEDILY DEALT WITH BY THE AUTHORITIES CONCERNED, BUT THERE ARE MANY PEOPLE LIVING IN SMALL GROUPS OF HOUSES WHERE IT IS UNECONOMICAL TO PROVIDE A PIPED WATER SUPPLY AND NATURAL SOURCES OF WATER ARE BECOMING MORE AND MORE POLLUTED AS THE POINTS OF WATER DISCHARGE COME CLOSER TO THE POINTS OF INTAKE.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

DAMAGE TO SEWERS IN THE MINING SUBSIDENCE AREAS AGAIN CAUSED CONSIDERABLE INCONVENIENCE.

DURING THE YEAR, 82 SAMPLES WERE TAKEN FOR ANALYSIS FROM THE COUNCIL'S SEWAGE DISPOSAL WORKS AND 48 PROVED TO BE SATISFACTORY; A CONSIDERABLE IMPROVEMENT ON 1965 AND A VERY ENCOURAGING REWARD FOR THE DILIGENCE AND ATTENTION GIVEN BY THE SEWAGE WORKS MANAGER AND HIS STAFF.

A COMPREHENSIVE REPORT ON THE EFFICIENCY OF THE 20 TREATMENT WORKS IN THE DISTRICT WAS PREPARED DURING THE YEAR AND A PROGRAMME OF PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT WORKS WAS PREPARED.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

IT IS VERY SATISFACTORY TO BE ABLE TO REPORT THAT A WEEKLY COLLECTION IS NOW BEING GIVEN TO THE WHOLE OF THE DISTRICT, ONLY BEING DISRUPTED AT HOLIDAY PERIODS. UNLIKE MANY OTHER AUTHORITIES NO EXTRA HELP IS EMPLOYED AT HOLIDAY TIMES AND ONLY ON SPECIAL OCCASIONS IS OVERTIME WORKED. COMPLAINTS REGARDING BOTH QUALITY AND QUANTITY ARE SPEEDILY DEALT WITH BY THE AUTHORITIES CONCERNED, BUT THERE ARE MANY PEOPLE LIVING IN SMALL GROUPS OF HOUSES WHERE IT IS UNECONOMICAL TO PROVIDE A PIPED WATER SUPPLY AND NATURAL SOURCES OF WATER ARE BECOMING MORE AND MORE POLLUTED AS THE POINTS OF WATER DISCHARGE COME CLOSER TO THE POINTS OF INTAKE.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

IT IS VERY SATISFACTORY TO BE ABLE TO REPORT THAT A WEEKLY COLLECTION IS NOW BEING GIVEN TO THE WHOLE OF THE DISTRICT, ONLY BEING INTERRUPTED AT HOLIDAY PERIODS. SOME FORM OF CONSULTATION BETWEEN THE PLANNING AUTHORITIES AND THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT IS DESIRABLE TO PREVENT UNNECESSARY DIFFICULTIES WITH REGARD TO ACCESSIBILITY OF PREMISES FOR REFUSE COLLECTION, FOR INSTANCE, ON ONE NEW DEVELOPMENT IT IS NECESSARY TO TRAVERSE TWO MILES TO EMPTY ONE BLOCK OF ELEVEN PROPERTIES.

FOOD AND DRUGS.

ANIMAL SLAUGHTERING AND MEAT INSPECTIONS INCREASED CONSIDERABLY DURING THE YEAR, CONSEQUENTLY THE AMOUNT OF MEAT CONDEMNED AS UNFIT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION ALSO SHOWED A CONSIDERABLE INCREASE.

COMPLAINTS WERE INVESTIGATED DURING THE YEAR, OF FOREIGN BODIES IN MILK BOTTLES, TINNED PEAS AND EVEN IN A CHICKEN LEG. TWENTYTWO 6 LB. TINS OF CORNED BEEF WERE DESTROYED BEING UNFIT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT 1960.

ALL THE PREMISES REGISTERED UNDER THE ACT HAVE NOW BEEN INSPECTED. LIGHTING STANDARDS PROVED TO BE VERY POOR GENERALLY AND SEEMED TO BE ACCEPTED BY BOTH EMPLOYEES AND EMPLOYERS BECAUSE PRESUMABLY NOTHING BETTER WAS EXPECTED. IN THIS CONNECTION IT IS REGRETTED THAT THERE IS NO ADEQUATE MINIMUM STANDARD FIXED BY THE MINISTRY.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT 1960.

NO OFFICIAL PRONOUNCEMENT ON AN ACCEPTABLE STANDARD OF NOISE BEFORE IT BECOMES A NUISANCE HAS YET BEEN LAID DOWN, AND IT IS BECOMING ACCEPTED RATHER SURPRISINGLY, THAT NOISE IS PART OF THE PRICE OF PROGRESS AND IS INSEPARABLE FROM THE MODERN WAY OF LIFE. IT IS DIFFICULT TO OBTAIN LEGAL SUPPORT UNDER SUCH CIRCUMSTANCES. TWO COMPLAINTS OF NOISE WERE INVESTIGATED.

PETROLEUM ACTS.

TESTING OF NEW STORAGE INSTALLATIONS WAS CARRIED OUT IN EACH CASE BEFORE LICENSING AND IT IS PROPOSED TO CARRY OUT DURING THE COMING YEAR, INSPECTIONS OF OLDER TANKS WITH THE VIEW TO APPLYING PRESSURE TESTING.

HOUSING ACTS.

THE NUMBER OF IMPROVEMENT GRANTS ROSE DURING THE YEAR AND IT IS INTERESTING TO NOTE THAT NO TENANT HAS AS YET ASKED THE COUNCIL TO SERVE NOTICE DEMANDING THE OWNER TO IMPROVE HIS PROPERTY.
