Annual Report of Medical Officer of Health for the Year 1921.

TO THE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL OF MARKET DRAYTON.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my Annual Report upon the health of your district for the year ending 31st December, 1921. The Minister of Health has ordered a revision of the particulars to be included in the Annual Reports of Medical Officers of Health by the omission of details as to conditions which do not vary from year to year and the curtailment of information asked for in certain years. Accordingly, this Annual Report is shorter than usual.

The weekly removal of house refuse, and the periodical tar-spraying of the streets have contributed to the improved health conditions of the town. When a scheme has been settled for the sewerage and sewage disposal, and the work completed, still further improvement may be looked for. The establishment of a public abattoir, and the inspection and

more humane slaughter of animals for food, and also the need for a public bathing place, are subjects which should deserve the attention of your Council.

SMALLPOX.—VACCINATION IN 1921

Of the 118 children born and registered, eighty were successfully vaccinated, seven died unvaccinated, two were removed from the district, the vaccination of two was postponed by medical certificate, and twenty-seven remain unvaccinated, because their parents had conscientious objections to vaccination, and made statutory declarations to that effect.

4. CAUSES OF SICKNESS.

The cause of the fatal case of encephalitis lethargica was not ascertained. No epidemic occurred during the year and none of the schools was closed.

5. SUMMARY (FOR REFERENCE) OF NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOS-PITALS, AND OTHER INSTITU-TIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

Nursing in the Home.—The Market Drayton branch of the Shropshire Nursing Federation supply one Nurse for the district. Her services are available for Midwifery and general nursing. Her earnings are supplemented by private subscriptions. Inspection of the housing conditions of Tuberculosis patients notified is done by a County Health Visitor under the direction of the County Medical Officer of Health. The Health Visitor also examines school children and when necessary refers them to their doctor for treatment.

Midwives.—No midwives are employed direct by the Urban Council. The number of midwives practising in the district varies, but five or six are at present available.

Hospitals provided or subsidised by the Local Authority or by the County Council: A Fever Hospital for the 'solation of cases of Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever situate at Little Drayton is available for and supported by the Market Drayton Urban and Drayton and Blore Heath Rural Districts. The hospital contains four wards with sixteen beds.

An ambulance is provided for infectious cases.

6. LABORATORY WORK.

Bacteriological examinations are made at Birmingham University by arrangement with the County Council. The provision of diphtheria antitoxin and its administration has been paid for in the District since the year 1899.
