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

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Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

The death of your Medical Officer of Health has made it necessary for me to Report on the Health and Sanitary Circumstances of your district for his last year in office.

The Birth rate shows a very satisfactory rise on that of 1936 and is well above the average for the Country. The Death rate remains about the same but the Infantile Mortality figures continue to show an increase on the average for your district and is also above the current rate for the country.

Infectious diseases show a marked drop due to the comparative absence of diphtheria.

Incorporated in this report is the work of the year of your Sanitary Inspector and Surveyor.

# Section B. General Provision of Health Services for the Area.

Public Health Officers of the Authority :-

- (2) Laboratory facilities: Birmingham University still carries out all bacteriological and pathological examination under the County Council Scheme as there is no County Laboratory.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.—A modern ambulance meets the requirements of the town and the Drayton Rural District satisfactorily. Buildings available as Mortuaries are to be found at the Cottage and Isolation Hospitals.

TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS.—There is a modern up-to-date treatment centre for Maternity, Child Welfare and School Medical Service.

HOSPITAL.—The town has a Cottage Hospital and a Local Isolation Hospital meets the needs of the district.

WATER SUPPLY AND SEWERAGE.—Water is supplied by the Market Drayton Water Company. A modern sewage disposal system serves the major portion of the town.

## Section F. Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and other Diseases.

The incidence of infectious diseases in the district shows great improvement on the preceding year-this is due chiefly to the fall in the number of cases of diphtheria. This disease should be further controlled by the adoption of a diphtheria immunisation scheme in the district. Up to date the response to this scheme has been very gratifying and the preventive means adouted should be reflected in future years.
