

GENERAL REMARKS ON VITAL STATISTICS.

The Death Rate shows an increase on the previous year and the Birth Rate is the same. The Death Rate exceeding the Birth Rate by 1. There was no marked epidemic throughout the year and no unusual or excessive mortality. Deaths from Cancer show a marked increase.

Ambulance Facilities. So far, Ambulance facilities have proved adequate. The area is served by St. John Ambulance from Market Harborough (5 miles distance approx.) and from Leicester (10 miles average distance); also the Leicester Fire Brigade Ambulance.

In some villages there is a voluntary Ambulance Scheme by which Ambulance is provided at reduced or no cost to those unable to pay.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION SCHEME.

Owing to a considerable number of cases of Diphtheria, 25 in the Kibworths and Smeeton, it was decided to offer and carry out a scheme of voluntary immunisation to the poorer inhabitants of the district. It was decided that the work be carried out by the patients' own doctor at a charge of 6/- per patient. The material used was Burroughs Wellcone & Co, Diphtheria Prophylactic T.A.F., to be supplied by the Rural District Council.

The method used was 3 injections at weekly intervals.

There was a good response while cases were prevalent and 101 children in the district were immunised.

As the occurrence of cases has ceased so has the demand for immunisation.

The Schick test was not used before or after immunisation.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water. The mains water supplies to Kibworth Beauchamp, Kibworth Harcourt, Smeeton and Fleckney were satisfactory during the year, a copy of analysis being forwarded by the Leicester City Water Corporation upon application. There were a total of 259 applications made for mains water during the year making a total of 544.

A scheme for the provision of mains water throughout the Parish of Lubenham has been forwarded and needs the confirmation

of the Ministry of Health.

There have been shortages at Stonton Wyville, water having to be carted on 2 consecutive days, this it is hoped will be remedied in the near future.

There were 9 samples of water submitted for Analysis during the past year, 3 of which were good, 3 fair and 3 bad. Ten wells were repaired, made impervious to surface soakage, and cleansed.

Drainage and Sewerage. New sewers and sewage works were completed in Husbands Bosworth and Glooston Parishes

- 1. Glooston—tanks and filter ... cost £1335
- 2. Husbands Bosworth-tanks and filter ... cost £4660

Instructions have also been given to Messrs. Coales & Green to prepare schemes for the provision of new sewers and out-fall works at Smeeton, an alternative scheme also to be prepared to include in the out-fall works the sewage from the Parishes of Kibworth Beauchamp and Kibworth Harcourt. The land used in connection with the purification of sewage from the two above mentioned Parishes being insufficient, even without growing crops, to take the quantity of sewage to be dealt with.

There was during the year approximately 300 yards of new 12in. sewer laid in the Parish of Drayton, part of the cost of which was borne by the County Council.

Rivers and Streams. No action was taken to prevent the pollution of rivers and streams during the year apart from constant supervision of all sewage works and out-falls.

Closet Accommodation.

There were 133 privies (middens) and pail closets converted to the water carriage system during the year, and 1 privy (midden) converted to a pail closet. The majority of the above took place in the Parishes of Fleckney and Medbourne.

Scavenging. There is now a weekly collection of household refuse by Contractors throughout the whole of the area, the old open ashpits are being abolished and regulation galvanised iron dustbins substituted. The refuse tip at Lubenham has ceased to be used, the tips in use and under the control of the Council being at Hallaton, Foxton, Kibworth, Husbands Bosworth and Fleckney.

The cost of the carrying out of the collection which is for a contract period of two years is £958 per annum or the equivalent £18 8s. 5d. per week, or approximately 13d per inhabited house per week.

Public cesspools and catch pits are cleansed at three monthly intervals or as often as may be necessary whichever is the shorter.

The methods used for the production of milk. and premises, are steadily on the up-grade. There are 23 producers of Accredited Milk in the area, and in this particular the standard of purity and cleanliness is very high.

Under the milk (Special Designation) Order 1936 One supplementary Tuberculin Tested Milk Licence was granted.

There are 14 registered slaughter-houses in the area and 6 licenced, the quality of the meat slaughtered is exceptionally high. As far as is possible there is 100% meat inspection throughout the area, and the number of inspections for the year amounted to 1214.

It was found necessary to take legal proceedings under the Public Health Acts in the case of 3 persons, two were found guilty and fined £50 and 12 guineas costs and £25 and 4 guineas costs respectively. The third case was dismissed the butcher being reprimanded.
